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HEADMASTER'S REPORT



HEADMASTER'S ANNUAL REPORT FROM SENIOR PRIZEGIVING

After our Jubilee year in 2012, this year has been about getting back to business as usual. Business as usual here is a busy, purposeful, enjoyable, positive and hardworking school. Certainly this is how I see it and how I want it to be. Let's hope the Education review office agree with us next year when they visit us again.

January saw our academic results for 2012 being published. We repeated our best Scholarship results from twelve months earlier, once again achieving 80, including 11 outstanding. Let's make it 100 this year Gentlemen.

Our Cambridge results in 2012 in Form 5 were our best ever and our results were almost as good as ever in forms 6 and 7. All of these pass rates are close to the 100% mark, again, let's see if we can do even better in 2013.

For the first time ever last year we had our three top students achieving 5 A* grades at A level, an incredible achievement placing these young men at the very top of Cambridge students in New Zealand. Our Deputy Head Boy, Matthew Lie, pipped Prasad Ravi, our Head Boy, for the Dux Award. Our Academic Captain, Pita Roycroft, secured two top in the world A level results in History and Geography.

Twelve months ago I was proud to report our best ever NCEA results. Our young men trumped that in 2012. A 94% pass rate at Level One equaled our best yet. A 6% improvement at Level Two took us to an 89% pass rate and a 14% improvement at Level Three took us to 80%. We can do better and we should be very proud of the improvements here over the last few years.

Our combined NCEA and Cambridge pass rates are now 96%, 93% and 88% respectively. In 2009 they were 78%, 78% and 75%. This is a huge improvement; 18%, 15% and 13 % respectively. Well done to everyone involved in achieving this. It's been a real team effort with hundreds of staff and students contributing to this achievement.

The Executive of the Association of Boys Schools in New Zealand has recently commissioned the NZ Centre of Educational Research to compare how boys are achieving in boys schools compared to co-ed schools. The early findings are quite startling. At every decile level, and at every year level, boys in boys schools are doing so much better than their male counterparts in co-ed schools. Boys do better in boys schools. The 256 families that missed out on a place in Year 9 for next year is relevant to this research.

On Monday in assembly this week I suggested that our senior students would be better focusing on what is still needed to be done this year, rather what has already been completed. A subtle difference in thinking but a powerful one as well. The main academic challenges of the year are still to come, remember that and prepare accordingly and you will give yourself the best chance of success.

Albert Einstein said, 'One should not pursue goals that are easily achieved. One must develop an instinct for what one can just barely achieve through one's greatest efforts.' Worth remembering as you all approach the big ones. Good luck Gentlemen, whatever happens we will be proud of you. What we really want is for you all to be proud of yourselves.

SPORT

Our sports programme has once again been successful this year. We continue to be one of the very best sporting schools in the country.

In Basketball, Table Tennis, Orienteering and Chess we were New Zealand champions, placing second in New Zealand again in Hockey, Water Polo and Squash for the second year in a row. Badminton also fell agonizingly close at the final hurdle. Rowing and Sailing secured third places one ahead of Golf and Volleyball respectively. At the top level then, a good year, top four in New Zealand in twelve different premier sports. I don't think there will be another school in New Zealand that has achieved this range of success.

In Auckland we secured Premier Championships in seven sports and were runners up in a further six. Our 1st XV were once again North Harbour Champions.

A special mention at this point to Marty Davenport and Jack Salt who have both received their Gold Outstanding Achievement Awards this term for competing on a world level in Rowing and Basketball respectively.

Well done to everyone who has represented our school this year. It is great that we are doing so well at local and national level and with an ever increasing number of teams going overseas (at international level as well). As I've said before, it's just as important that we are the best behaved school in New Zealand as well. How we conduct ourselves week in week out will ultimately determine what other schools think of us, irrespective of our results. From this perspective it has been a good year also.

The addition of initiatives such as the Friday night social football league, where over 120 senior players compete against one another at Westlake Girls, shows that we continue to be committed to sport at all levels not just at premier grade.

Well done to Mr Taylor, Mr Buckingham and everyone involved in sport at our school. Thank you for what you do.

MUSIC

Our Music Department has once again proved to be a jewel in our crown. Voicemale, our top boys' only choir were again the top boys' choir in New Zealand, and added to this they achieved their first ever Gold Award at the national finals.

Choralation (our combined choir with Westlake Girls') took out the top in New Zealand prize again for the fourth time in five years.

Our music groups dominated the annual KBB Festival, securing two of the top four awards with our Symphony Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra both placing first. Added to this a second place and third place in the other two categories plus a number of individual awards and we can claim, with Westlake Girls' High School, to be dominant here again.

Adding an Auckland title for our Barbershop Quartet and a New Zealand title for Ray Ong, it has been another year to remember.

A great first year for Mr Robinson and his team as he picked up where Mrs James left off. Thank you.

This is probably the perfect opportunity to acknowledge our relationship with Westlake Girls' High School. Our relationship is a positive one and we both benefit from being associated with one another. We don't need to be a joint school. We both offer the chance for teenage boys and girls on the North Shore of Auckland to have access to a first class state school education. We look forward to maintaining and improving our relationship in the years ahead.

Think about a wide variety of topics and subjects to help you come up with fresh ideas and do things the hard way. GPS makes your sense of direction worse; calculators make you worse at mental arithmetic so while technology can make things easier and faster, our cognitive skills can suffer. Use it or lose it is a phrase normally associated with atrophy and exercise. Your brain is no different. Finally make the effort to meet new people in new places. Every person you meet, knows something you don't so learn from them.

William Pollard said, "The arrogance of success is to think that what we did yesterday will be good enough for tomorrow". Don't presume that what you did last year in the run up to exams will do again this year. Finish the year well and make the most of the opportunity you have.

To our leavers this year, thank you for what you've done in your five years here. You will be missed next year. Go and find what you love doing and are passionate about. You will leave Westlake, Westlake will never leave you.

I absolutely love being the Headmaster of this school, thank you to Mr Sclater and the Board of Trustees for giving me the opportunity to do this job. I will continue to do my very best to make us the best school in New Zealand. Gentlemen, you know what your part of the bargain is: Go and be brilliant at everything you do.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

Westlake Boys High School has had another very busy and successful year. As a school we continued to have tremendous success in all areas of school life including Music, the Arts, Business Enterprise, Sport and most importantly in the Academic area. Last year our students achieved 79 Scholarships and our 5th, 6th and 7th Form students all achieved a better overall pass rate than in previous years. Of particular note was the performance of our 5th Form year group. This cohort achieved a 96% pass rate in NCEA or the Cambridge equivalent examination. Outside the classroom our students won numerous Auckland and National titles across a wide range of Sports, Music, Cultural and other activities.

All of these things form part of our goal to be the No. 1 boys' school in New Zealand.

It is 36 years since I left Westlake and this year my eldest son leaves the school having started in 2009. In looking back over the past 5 years since then it is interesting to note:

- School roll has increased from 2,153 to 2,288 students.
- Teaching staff has increased from 120 to 128.
- 96% of all students now pass Level 1 or the equivalent examination compared to 77% in 2008.
- In 2008 there was a 50% chance of getting into the school from out of zone – now there is a 10% chance.
- Scholarships have increased from 68 to 79.
- We now have over 1,500 students involved in sport and over 400 students involved in music. We have 35 basketball teams, 23 football teams and we have 121 staff involved in sport.

All of these achievements do not come without an extraordinary level of commitment from the 196 staff at the school. Westlake has an extraordinary group of staff members headed by Mr David Ferguson. I am continually impressed with the professionalism, dedication and ambition of all the staff to improve the education of our students. I would like to thank David and all the staff for the work they have done this year. Without you there would be no Westlake way.

As in previous years we have continued to upgrade the property assets of the school with the refurbishment of B Block and the re-clad and extension of the Science Block. The upgrading of our property assets is a key strategic focus of the Board and will continue in 2014.

The purpose of the Board of Trustees is to ensure the school is properly managed, financed and complies with the educational and legal requirements of the Ministry of Education. We also set the strategic direction of the school.

The current Board of Trustees members are Andrew Nicoll, Jeff Moore, Donna A'Beckett, Jan Gumbley, Gary Rohloff, Tracy Houzet, Suzanne Skeens and Matthew Canham. During the year Paul Zaia and Keryn Wright retired from the Board and Tracy Houzet and Suzanne Skeens were elected onto the Board. I think the Board is an extremely talented group of people who work tirelessly to create a better Westlake. They always have the interest of the school at heart and spend a significant amount of time and energy on Board matters. On behalf of the school I would like to personally thank all the Board members, and their families, for their work this year.

Finally, I would like to mention the students of Westlake. Thank you for the part you have played in making Westlake what it is today. I would encourage you all to make the most of the opportunities Westlake has presented to you.

I would like to leave you with a quote from Winston Churchill, the famous British politician. He once said: "You only live once, but if you do it right, once is enough". Please remember this as you head into exams and life after Westlake.

TAKAPUNA RSA AWARD FOR WORK IN THE SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY – MATTHEW CANHAM

Matthew is an excellent role model for the students in our school and is highly respected by staff and students alike. Matthew has been a successful student in the classroom, achieving a Top in the World in his IGCSE ICT examination, and passing his other subjects with distinction and he has represented the school in Cross Country, Road Running, Motor Cross and Water Polo. Just for fun, he's also been the school's Student Representative on the Board of Trustees.

Matt is the wizard who has so often made things work in our Auditorium and has done far more than any other student to arrange the lighting, fix the sound, and just generally make things work well. He runs school productions, and has coordinated Chinese and Korean evenings over the past three years. He ran a national conference for Deputy Headmasters from boys' schools all around the country; he creates videos for assemblies and large events and, although he has his own business, he never asks for payment.

HEAD PREFECT – JESSE MEDCALF

The first of our two winners of the Pricewaterhouse Coopers Career Assistance Grant – and Head Boy for 2013 – is Jesse Medcalf; a most committed and driven young man. He is a talented academic, in the top 10 of students in his year group, and impresses in all he does.

Jesse is a member of our first group of Academic Institute students and took some of his IGCSE subjects a year before other students, reaching A* or A grades in nine separate subjects by the end of Year 11. A year later, in his AS Levels: he managed exceptional scores of 95% in English Literature, 93% in History, 93% in Economics, 85% in Geography and 90% in Business Studies: that's an average of nearly 92%. He has also managed the remarkable feat of achieving an NZQA Scholarship in English on two occasions before even reaching Year 13: indeed, he is one of only two students ever to gain a Scholarship at Westlake while still in Year 11. He was won school prizes in English, Economics and Geography.

Jesse has been a strong Head Boy this year, setting a great example to the other prefects and leading in the best possible way by taking over the school's wide-reaching Peer Tutoring programme, which provides close to 300 junior students with free tutoring from our senior students. He has captained tennis teams, rugby teams and a variety of commerce-related teams to great success. Jesse is one of the best high school debaters in the country, a semi-finalist in the recent national tournament whilst representing Auckland and part of our Advanced Premier team, winning tournaments in each of the last two years, and now Auckland champions. Jesse has also won the national Monetary Policy Challenge in Wellington, been selected for the New Zealand International Trade Challenge team to compete in Hong Kong and run a successful Young Enterprise company.

THE DON JOHNSON TROPHY FOR FIRST IN FORM 7 – KIHUN KIM

The Don Johnson Trophy for the top student overall in Form 7 is given to the student who has achieved the very highest average score in his two sets of internal examinations at the highest academic level our school offers. The trophy this year is awarded to Kihun Kim.

Kihun achieved at an exceptionally consistent level: in his end of year exams, he scored 91%, 91%, 90% and 88%, and he performed very similarly in his mid-year examinations, giving him an average mark in his internal examination of just shy of 90%.

THE ARTHUR SCHUBERT AWARD – BENNY ZHANG

This year's winner of the Headmaster's Prize for Personal Academic Excellence and the Arthur Schubert Award for Outstanding and Selfless Contribution to Westlake Boys High School is our Deputy Head Boy, Benny Zhang. Benny is a multi-talented and determined young man, and is equipped with a sharp mind, a willingness to work hard, and an engaging personality.

Benny has consistently performed at a level well above that of his peers. In his IGCSEs, he averaged over 94% in his subjects – 94% average! In 2012, he managed exceptional grades in his AS Level examinations: 82% in English Literature, 93% in Geography, 87% in Chemistry, 89% in Physics and 87% in Mathematics. And in his internal exams this year, he scored so highly that he was second overall. He also won 'Top in the World' in IGCSE Geography in 2011. A founder member of the Academic Institute, Benny is an exceptional academic.

Benny is also one of our most committed musicians. He is currently our Music and Cultural Captain, plays both trumpet and piano in many of our award-winning groups. He is also a key part of 'Voicemale', named the top boys' secondary school choir in the country last year, and of Choralation, our combined boys' and girls' choir.

He has played Basketball to U19A level for the school, as well as excelling in Athletics, coming second in the North Harbour Intermediate Triple Jump competition in 2012. Benny also chairs the school's Cultural Committee, and was the driving force behind the Chinese Cultural Evening, a large event requiring diplomacy, energy and complete reliability. He is a Peer Tutor, and was an active participant in the Study Breakfast Programme.

THE JOHN PATTERSON MEMORIAL AWARD – JAMES RANKIN

The Yang Award for Excellence in Commerce, the Pricewaterhouse Coopers Career Assistance Grant, the Lex Lewis Memorial Trophy for Debating and the John Patterson Memorial Award for Effort, Involvement and Loyalty was awarded to James Rankin, our Academic Captain of 2013.

James is exceptionally talented. He is a scholar of the very highest quality, a gifted public speaker and debater, a young entrepreneur, and a top sportsman: he is a School Prefect and Academic Captain of the school this year, and was named the country's 'Top Speaker', debating for the Auckland team, in the National Schools' tournament in Wellington.

James' academic achievements have been remarkable for their range, scoring over 90% in all of his IGCSEs and following this up with some cracking AS Level results. When he was in Year 11 he achieved an NZQA Scholarship, one of only two students ever to do this in Year 11 at Westlake, and in Year 12 he followed this with an Outstanding Scholarship in English, still a year ahead of his peers. I would expect James to achieve a number of Scholarships this year, and to be in the running for a Premier Scholar Award. He was part of the team who won the 2012 Auckland Impromptu Cup, were runners up in 2013, the 2013 Auckland Winter Tournament and the Auckland Premier title. He won the Lex Lewis Memorial Award for Debating in 2012, and it is no surprise that he has won it again in 2013.

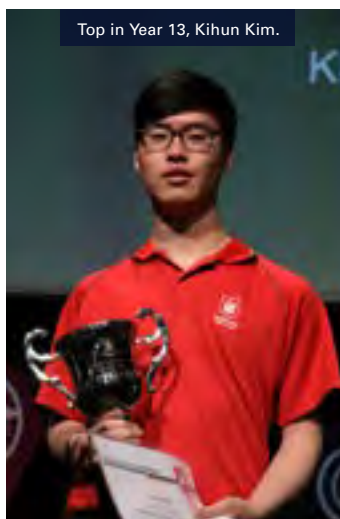
As Academic Captain and Chairman of our Academic Council, James has had a huge impact through his organisation of our Breakfast Study Club: offering hot breakfasts and tutoring on early Thursday mornings. He also tutors other students in school as part of our voluntary Peer Tutoring scheme.

He travelled to Hong Kong as part of the New Zealand International Trade Challenge delegation, having been selected earlier this year in the national competition, and he helped win the MPC title for Westlake this year.

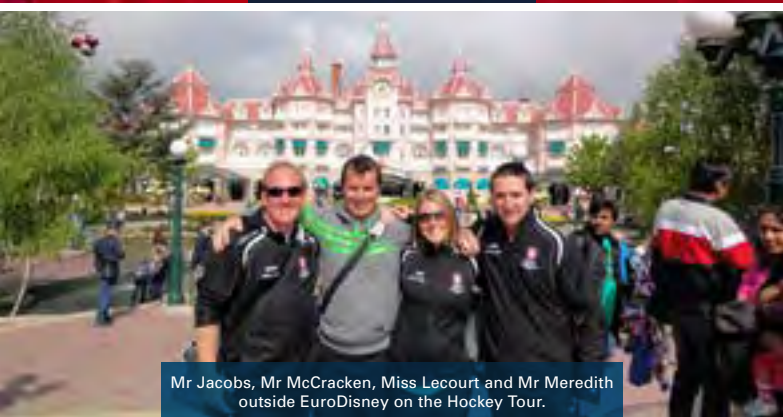

CAREERS

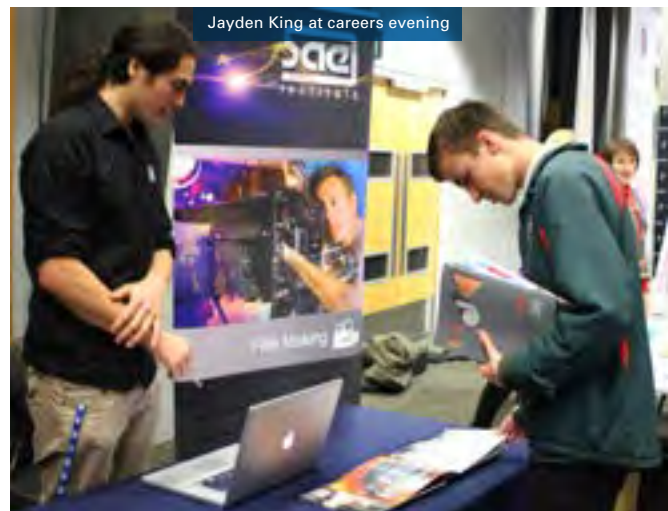
Every year I think it cannot get any busier – but it does! In May I was fortunate enough to attend a two day conference in Sydney as part of my professional membership to CDAA and CDANZ. The conference had an international flavour, with speakers from the U.K, Canada, Finland and Australia and it was reassuring to know that we are providing good quality career counselling and provisions here at Westlake.

This year we developed a careers council; made up of 12 senior students who assisted me hugely with promoting careers research, encouraging students to use the careers 'ilearn' page and developing a careers facebook group. These boys were very committed and enthusiastic and an enormous help in organisation and at the annual Westlake Boys and Girls careers evening, one of our biggest ever with over 62 providers present on the evening.

Our careers assistant, Mrs Baker, has been extremely busy with our year 10 students, enrolling them on the Dream Catcher careers program. These were run in small sessions of six students at a time with Mrs Baker. In this period they began to look at their personal and career goals, complete self-assessments, began some career research and started looking at subjects that relate to their career ideas. Students were also able to work on the dream catcher program within the careers week in social science. This programme is accessible at home for students and also for parents to have a positive input.

COMMERCE

This year the Commerce Department were very pleased to welcome Mr Tyrrell-Baxter into our Department in place of Mrs Keen who has had a gorgeous baby boy, Owen.

We started the year with excellent examination results gained by students in their external examinations. All CIE students had an 100% pass rate with NCEA students gaining a 62% pass rate in Year 13, 75% in Year 12 and 92% in Year 11.

Students taking Commerce subjects in 2013 have enjoyed a diverse and interesting year. The world economy has provided great scope for practical learning, from the Cyprus banking crisis, and Fonterra hiccups internationally to our domestic challenges of house price inflation, asset sale debates and the fluctuating exchange rate. All these events have assisted Westlake Boys in learning and applying Accounting, Economics and Business theory to the real world.

This year we introduced NCEA Business Studies to Level 2. This was a popular choice for Westlake students with four full classes choosing this as an option. In the strong business environment of Auckland's North Shore Commerce is regularly a favourite subject amongst our students.

The year has not been without stress. We had initially planned to move into our renovated classroom block early in Term One. However, the Mainzeal receivership provided more practical application of commercial theory and we finally moved into a warmer, safer and better looking B Block in Term Three. We are grateful to our students for their robust and enthusiastic assistance in both putting up with the temporary classrooms on the field and in helping us move furniture and boxes into the new block.

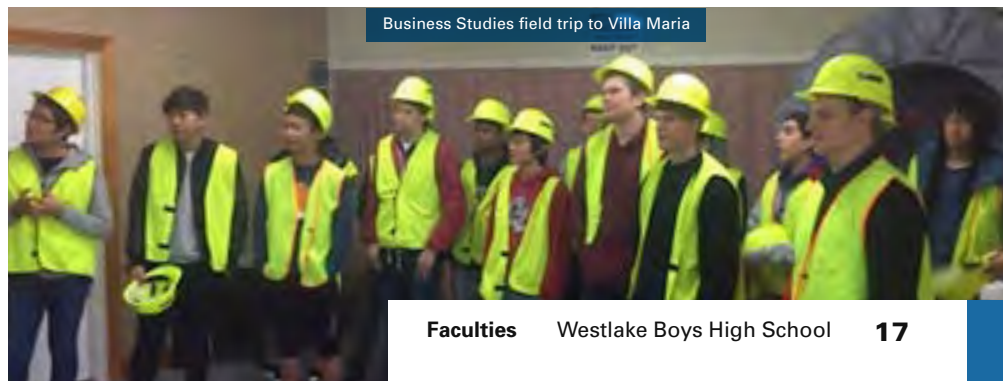

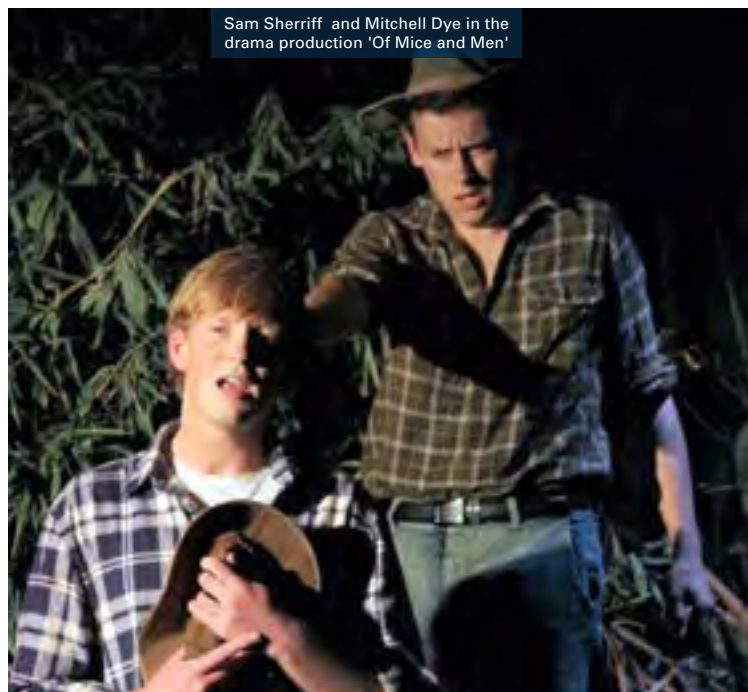

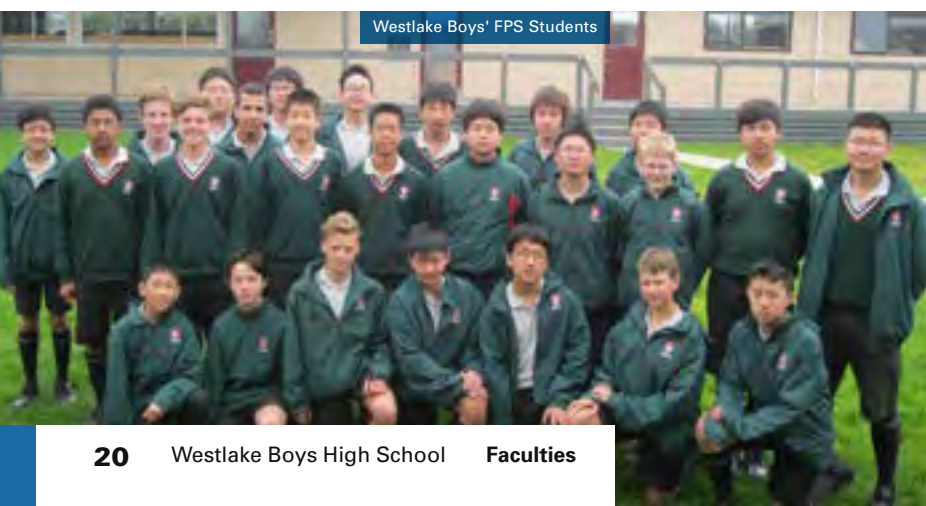

2013 saw the introduction of two timetabled Gateway classes and we welcomed Mr Masterton and Miss Jung onto our team, both of them bringing a creative edge to the programme.

The year began with the important job of preparation skills – CV preparation, dress and appearance, interviewing techniques and goal setting. The CV task helps the boys collate all their skills and experiences into a suitable format that employers find easy to read. Students find this exercise enlightening as they realise how many skills they actually have and how marketable they can be. Suitable work placements were only sought after the CV was completed – taking some students longer than others. Several students were placed early and the remainder during term two and the beginning of term three. Gateway classes focused on students catching up missed work, due to students being in their workplace, broadening their world view and ensuring industry units were being completed, as well as liaising with employers and the various industry training organisations who work alongside the programme. Towards the end of the year we looked at saving for retirement taxation and the advantages and disadvantages of buying on credit – an eye opening task!

Our partnership with North Harbour rugby continues to flourish with boys learning and experiencing the realities of being a referee, controlling a field of youngsters to taking photographs of important 1st XV matches and having their pictures and reports produced in the local papers. 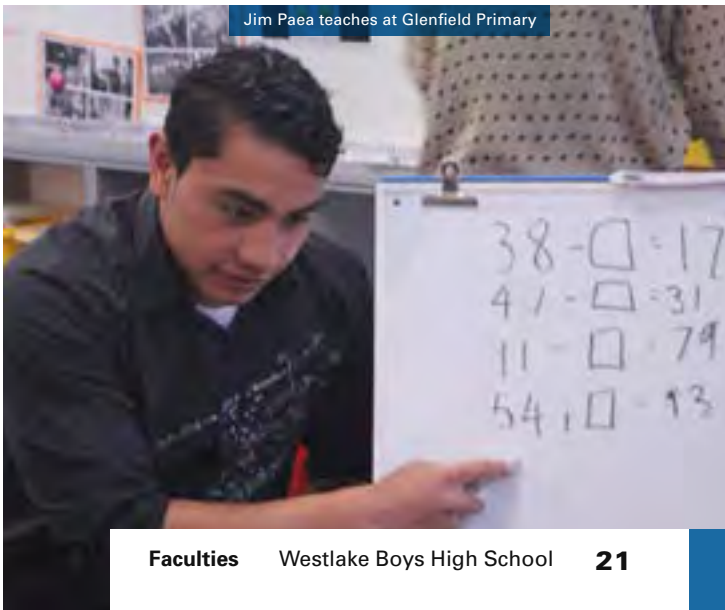

In Chinese, Jae Ho Shin, Su Hyun Hywang, Jiyong Lee, Mac Jordan and Yoon Ho Cho received Excellence Awards in the Confucius Institute Essay Writing Competition. In German, Andrew Thompson and Kevin Jo won the second and third prizes respectively in the annual Goethe Exams. Tony Guo, Yea Kang Chu, Cale Tu'inukuafe and Jun Hong Lim also received Diploma of Excellence from the Goethe Society. Andrew Thompson also won

a national German competition and will be one of the two students to represent New Zealand in 2014 in the International German Olympics. Our school was comfortably placed in the top 10% of all participating schools globally.

All classes participated in activities such as bakery days, cooking lessons, trips to the cinema, restaurants and a Buddhist temple. MATHEMATICS

What a successful year we have enjoyed as a Department. 2012 saw another fine set of Level One results with the pass rate of 84%, up a little on 2011 and with an increased number of Merit and Excellence grades. One of our Departmental goals was the focus on Level Two and I am pleased to report that we had an 11% improvement to an overall pass rate of 81%. Another of our goals, that of improving our Level Three Calculus pass rate to 75%, was also achieved. Our students provided a 77% pass rate and a much improved 6% Excellence Endorsement pass. Finally, at Level One we attained a 20% Merit Endorsement pass, at Level Two a stunning 21% and at Level Three Statistics a rewarding 13% Merit Endorsement pass rate.

Our Cambridge results continue to be very strong. We are particularly proud of our 100% pass rate in IGCSE for the second year in a row. A goal for this year has been to identify and support our lower-end AS students. We are looking forward to success in this area and expecting our overall AS pass rate to reach the 93% mark again. Our A2 students provided an impressive 97.3% pass rate, which included 17 A* grades. 32% of the cohort scored an A grade or higher. Also impressive were the 21 scholarships in Mathematics and Statistics for this year. I would like to thank Mr Nobel, Mrs Van den Heuvel and Mrs Clarke for the extra work and programmes they have put in place this year to ensure our top students work towards this goal.

This year 251 of our lateral thinkers took to the challenge of the Australian Maths Competition. The results were the best in many years with 45% of our boys gaining either a High Distinction or a Distinction. - Jia Hao in Year 9 and Weber Wang year in Year 10 received prizes by finishing in the top 0.3% in Oceania.

The shining light, however, is on George Han who scored a near-perfect mark to place him first in New Zealand. An incredible feat! George flies down to Wellington to attend the New Zealand Prize Ceremony where he will receive his medal for this outstanding effort. George, for his efforts, has now been invited as a member of this year's AMOC Mathematics School of Excellence at the Melbourne University. We are hoping that this leads him on to the World International selection in 2014.

Congratulations should also go to our two junior Mathex teams who finished in the top ten teams, out of 100, in the greater Auckland Competition. Thanks once again to Mr Davies and Mr King.

It is with sadness that we bid farewell to Mr Patel this year. Mr Patel has decided to retire after dedicating 16 years to Westlake's Mathematics Department; he will be sorely missed as co-coordinator and expert in the Year 10 Maths curriculum. He has been a pillar of loyalty and a wonderful colleague – we wish him and his wife Padma all the best as he moves into the next phase of his life.

We wish Mr Waller, who re-joined our department at the start of this year, a hearty congratulations as he leaves us for a second time and takes up a post as Deputy Headmaster at Takapuna Grammar School in 2014. Congratulations should also go to Mr Bailey who becomes a full-time member of the Maths Department from 2014. We have been very fortunate to welcome Mr Wills to the team and have all been astounded by his positive approach to everything, especially in the field of Statistics.

A sincere thanks to our wonderful staff who are so dedicated, committed and determined to provide the best possible Mathematical experience for our students. We wish our students well for their upcoming Finals and look forward to another set of great results to be proud of.

from the Samoan community.

This year's awards haul at the KBB festival was one for the record books with 5 of the 8 top awards being given to Westlake groups. The Westlake Symphony Orchestra gained a Gold award and the coveted Most Outstanding Orchestra award, in part due to a spellbinding performance of a movement from Dvorak's 9th Symphony; they also gained the award for Best Performance of a New Zealand Work. The Westlake Chamber Orchestra mirrored this success, gaining a Gold award and the Most Outstanding Chamber Orchestra award and the Best Performance of a New Zealand Work for their rendition of Larry Pruden's 'Dances of Brittany'. The Westlake Concert Band also won Gold as well as the Best Performance of a New Zealand Work for playing a challenging piece called 'Skirmish in Seven', written by our itinerant clarinet teacher Yvette Audain. The Westlake Big Band finished 3rd overall in the Jazz Band Category; perhaps the most hotly contested section of the festival. Our other entries in the festival, Camerata, Symphonic Band, Taharoto Orchestra and Stage Band received either Silver or Bronze awards. Conchordia, our junior string orchestra, also participated in the festival for the second year running. In 2014 the combined Westlake High Schools will host the KBB Festival as the Holy Trinity Cathedral Parnell will be unavailable due to renovation. Finally, thanks to our itinerant rock band tutor Matt Stone this year Westlake Boys had four school-based entries in the North Shore heats of the Smokefree Rockquest. Gabriel Everett and two other students from Western Springs College & St Kentigern College were the Auckland regional winners of the 2013 Smokefree Rockquest and went on to be placed 2nd overall at the National final. Their band 'The Moots' are an alternative funk-rock three piece in which Gabriel plays guitar and lead vocals.

Next year all of our Premier Music Groups, Westlake Symphony, Chamber Orchestra, Big Band and Concert Band and Choralation will be travelling to Europe in July to take part in the Summa Cum Laude International Music Festival in Vienna. The group will then continue on touring for a further 12 days through Germany and Hungary. In total we will take over 150 students and staff, making it the largest Westlake Tour ever undertaken. We have had a very successful year and the Music Department looks forward to what 2014 will bring.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

2013 has proved to be an exciting and busy year, with record numbers in Outdoor Education classes and changes being made to the programme. Streamlining between the Outdoor Education programme and Outdoor Education Marine programme has smoothed things over, enabling the majority of the same units to run at the same time. Adding new Unit Standards such as Kayaking and introducing the Day Skippers qualification to all Year 12 classes has given many boys the opportunity to gain this extra qualification. These changes have been a stepping stone for the changes we have made to the course for 2014. We have made the move away from Unit Standards and delving into the world of Achievement standards and the boys will have the chance to gain more endorsed credits at Merit and Excellence level. It also widens our options of what we can do practically on fieldtrips, which is very exciting!

Highlights this year have included striking the end of the brilliant summer on the rock climbing trips down to Wharepapa. The hot weather meant for great climbing conditions and many of the boys

pushed themselves out of their comfort zones. A particular mention goes to Cesare Saseve-Niuelua for getting up to a grade 20 and Simon Thongmeesuk for pushing the limits in Lead Climbing.

The Year 12 Caving trips were amped up this year from a half day trip to a three day epic in the Waitomo with each class. The boys climbed up slippery cliffs, abseiled into different levels, ventured into extremely tight spaces called 'The Muddy Crawl' and 'The Horrid Place' and navigated underground for up to eight hours per day.

The final Year 13 camp is heading to the Coromandel for a four day Extreme Survival Challenge. This will be the first time going to this location and the boys are in for a treat. Some of the challenges will include building their own solo shelter, lighting signal fires, making animal traps and an adventure challenge race.

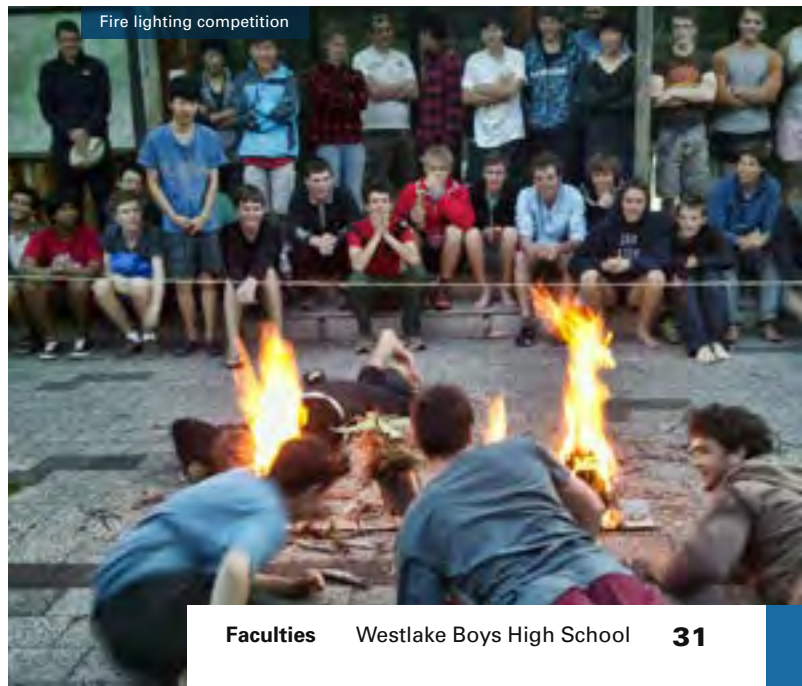

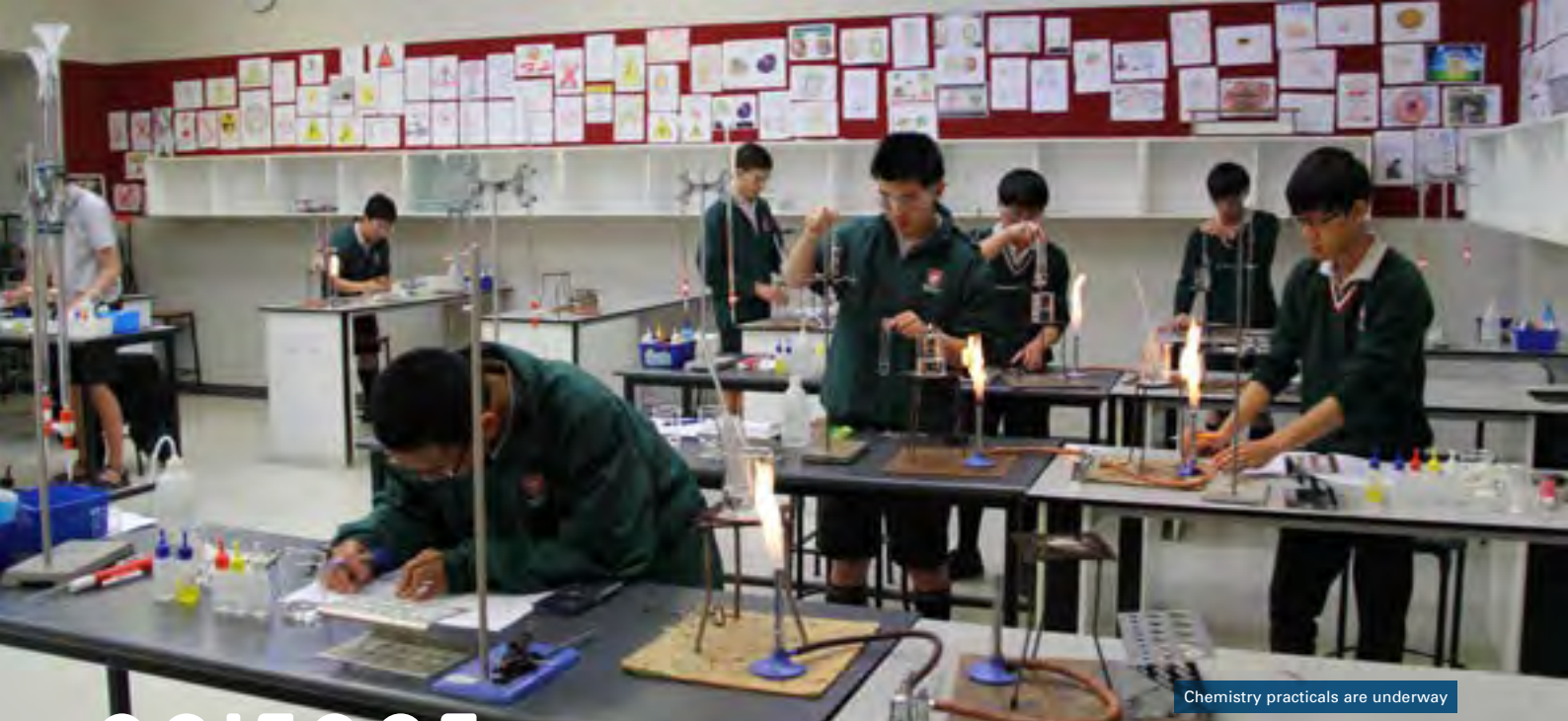

The start of the year began with much upheaval as the entire collection of Science equipment made the trek back into our re-clad and partly refurbished block. The addition of three brand-new Physics specialist laboratories was part of the project. Many thanks are owed to the dedicated Science Technician team of Barbara Naylan, Michelle Bedwell and Linda Metcalf, whose careful watch and hard work saw everything back where it belongs. We also said farewell to two senior teachers; Mr Simon Pastiroff who left for a position as Head of Science at St. Kentigern College, and Mrs Diane Rolls who retired after 27 years at Westlake.

There were a number of new staffing appointments in the Faculty. We welcomed Miss Beattie to the Chemistry department, and Mr Webster to the HOD Chemistry role with Dr Burnett as his assistant. Mr Bithell was appointed HOD Junior Science. All are thriving in their new roles.

Results in 2012 were excellent, exemplified by an 87% A*-B average pass rate at IGCSE level across the three departments. Excellent individual achievement in scholarship from the following students is worth mentioning: Prasad Ravi (four Sciences scholarships);

Matthew Lie (outstanding Chemistry scholarship); Jae Ha Lee (three Sciences scholarships); How-Shin Tsao (outstanding Science scholarship); Kevin Howe, a scholarship in Chemistry in Year 12.

2013 has been busy, as usual, with CIE practical exam preparation and NCEA internal assessments. The Biology department has been active with field excursions to the Waitakere Ranges with Level 2 students investigating stratification, forest structure and the effect of pests on the area. Level 3 Biology, as part of the Human Evolution topic, went on an outing to Auckland Zoo to observe different primate groups in relation to taxonomy and behaviour.

As I conclude my inaugural magazine report, I must thank everyone in the Faculty for another successful year. To the teachers of Science who constantly show their enthusiasm for the subject, thank you for your support and continued excellence in the laboratory. To the students, I hope your examination results and experiences this year exceeded your expectations. Good luck to those who leave us on your chosen career path, and to those returning. I look forward to 2014.

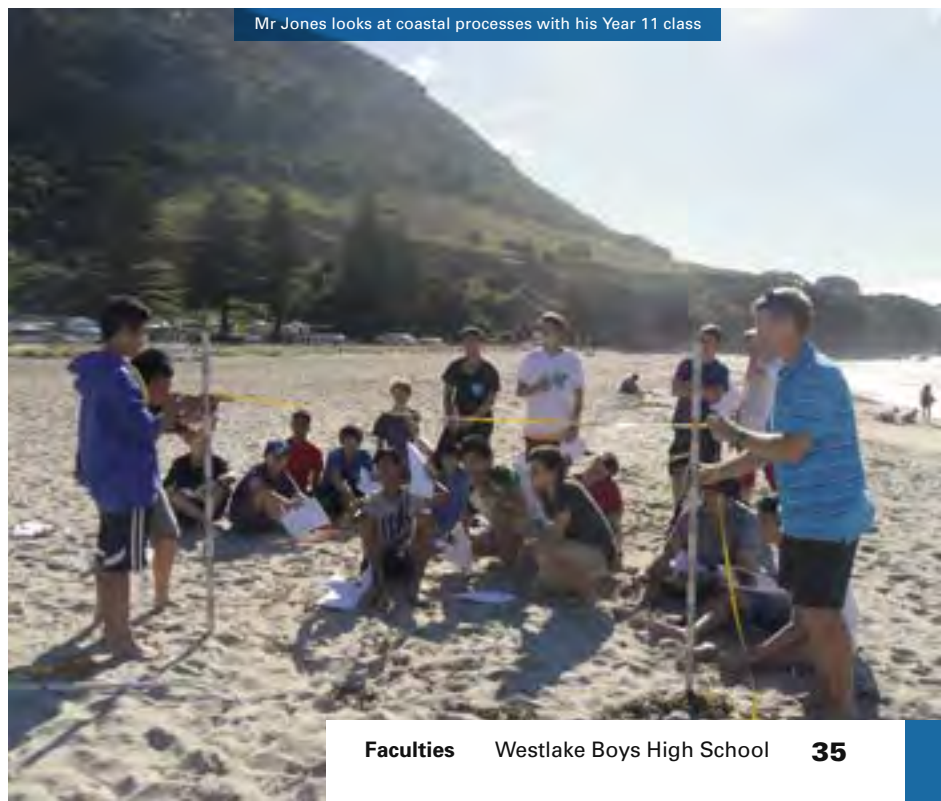

TECHNOLOGY

John Norris retired at the end of 2012 and we wish him a long and happy retirement and thank him again for his years of dedication to Technology at Westlake Boys High School. Kajai Lang, Head of Food Technology, also left us at the end of 2012 to pursue other interests and we wish her every success in her endeavours. The new faces for this year are Mr Clark as Head of Faculty and Miss Birch, teaching Food Technology. Ms Trotman also stepped up to take the role of Head of Food Technology.

Along with the new faces came a new coat of paint on the walls and an exhibition of "Kiwi Innovators". We are still welcoming any suggestions for our hall of fame with high resolution images that we can print to at least A2 size.

In the classroom, students continue to design and make high quality problem solving outcomes, whatever the specialist material area. In Food Technology this was recognised at the National Culinary Fare. The fare is held at the ASB Showgrounds, under the close scrutiny of top NZ chefs. Our boys did extremely well in their first ever competition. In Materials Technology, a wide range of products have been designed and developed following the theme of storage. Making and modifying street luges has been an enjoyable and a challenging focus of Mechanical Engineering in year 11. The faculty has also purchased a 3D printer and we are looking forward to introducing this exciting piece of equipment to the students next year.

Graphics has adopted the NZQA standards name change of DVC, (Design and Visual Communication) and we have had another year of high quality Young Designer entries. We also had a very successful in-house design competition for year 9 DVC students, both organised by Ms Groves.

The Cambridge programme has gone very well this year and students have yet again come up with some fantastic project work. The programme is quite open ended in what the students can produce for their final projects. This year we had a real range of items; a very unique lazy susan, a chicken coop, a change room locker, an expandable shelf unit, a desk light/lamp made from drain pipes and an adjustable bicycle stand that is used for the servicing of bicycles. Many of our A2 students are now going to pursue a university course in design and hope to turn this into a career.

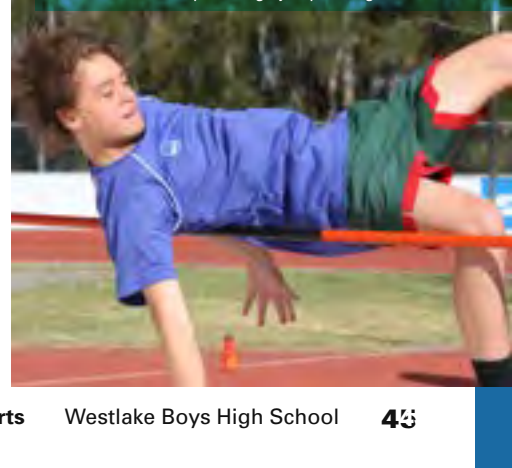

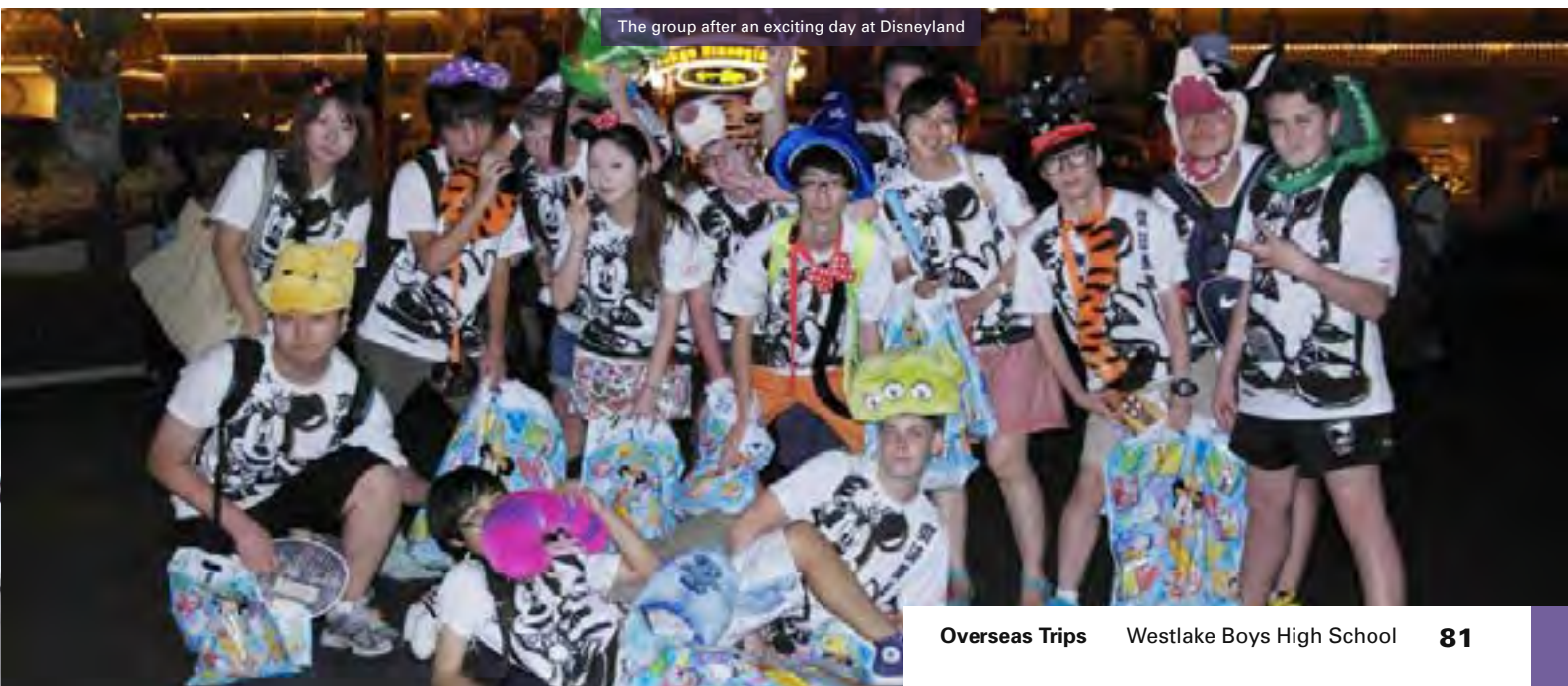

DISTANCE RUNNING TOUR TO SOUTH AFRICA

Date: 13 July – 4 August 2013

After many months of planning, fundraising and training the tour party comprising of fourteen Year 11 runners and two staff embarked on the schools fourth distance running tour of South Africa.

After twenty one hours the team touched down in Cape Town and after a few hours' sleep we scrambled out of bed to do the first team run on African soil, with the magnificent Table Mountain as the back drop.

Apart from the daily training runs including the world famous Chapmans Peak Drive and a Time Trial with Atlantic Harriers we also visited Cape of Good Hope, Table Mountain, Robben Island, an orphanage in the Masiphumelele township and Century City, the biggest shopping complex in the southern hemisphere.

The late afternoon time trial at the Atlantic Athletic Club took us on a fast, flat route along the beautiful Sea Point Promenade. The Westlake runners were dominant taking out the first four places with six boys in the top ten. The locals were extremely impressed with the times and the club, for the first time, recorded times under 15mins on the 5km time trial.

After five exciting days in Cape Town the team flew to Johannesburg where we would spend the next week training, racing and visiting some of the local tourist attractions. During our stay in Gauteng we had the opportunity to visit Gold Reef City, Rosebank African Shopping Plaza, Sun City and the Lesedi Cultural Village, where we were treated to a magnificent traditional African meal of tasty crocodile and ostrich meat.

Our second race was in Soweto where we raced some of the top school athletes in South Africa. The course was a typical African Cross Country course, flat, fast and hard underfoot. Our boys struggled with the heat and altitude but still gave good account of themselves, with the best performances coming from Finn Mason, Louis Abplanalp and Angus Nicoll.

One of the highlights of the Gauteng leg of our tour was the visit to the High Altitude Performance training centre at the University of Pretoria for some serious fitness testing. No other elite facility on the African continent can lay claim to a comparable reputation or range of expertise. The Institute offers a range of services from biokineticists, sports vision trainers, high performance specialists, sports medicine doctors, dieticians, physiotherapists and psychologists. We opted for the anthropometric evaluation and Vo2max testing. On completion of the selected test battery our boys were presented with a comprehensive report that can be used as a base measurement for future training and testing.

Heading into the final week of our tour we travelled to Mpumalanga Province and the Kruger National Park. We stayed in a private bush camp in Marloth Park for two nights. Early morning runs surrounded by wild game was an experience we would never forget. Getting up close to zebra, giraffe, baboons, impala and warthog was unreal and planned 30 minute runs turned into enjoyable hour runs. The camp fire at night under the African skies, sleeping in a safari tent, game drives, boerewors for lunch and wildlife outside our bedroom doors all contributed to the real African safari experience.

Our final race took us back to Pretoria for a unique and memorable 10 kilometre running experience around the Medunsa Campus and surrounding township areas. Although very challenging because of the high altitude, hilly course and fatigue we all loved it, as the scenery was something very special.

A special thanks to all the parents and supporters who followed our progress enthusiastically and for giving us this fantastic opportunity – it truly was a once in a lifetime experience.

STAFF TRAVEL AWARDS

THE KENYAN DISTANCE RUNNING DOMINANCE

In March, I was fortunate to make a two week trip to Iten, Kenya to spend time studying, analysing and immersing in the famous Kenyan running scene. As teacher and distance running coach the trip was aimed at gaining insights and information that would enhance our running programme at school, making sure we stay at the forefront of distance running in New Zealand.

The extent of the Kenyan domination in the distance events around the globe is unmatched. This is even more profound when you look closer and uncover the fact that most of the top Kenyan runners are from a very small region in Kenya's rift valley. The opportunity to live, listen and learn from these super runners was an amazing opportunity and the trip itself exceeded all expectations.

Iten is a small farming village about 320 kilometres northwest of Nairobi in the heart of Kenya's high-altitude, mountainous region of the Rift Valley. The seven hour drive from Jomo Kenyatta International Airport in Nairobi is spectacular. Sitting in a fully-packed matatu (taxi) I quickly learned that matatus are the most daring of drivers on the Kenyan roads. The sidewalks, small ditches, and opposite lanes of the road are fair game as long as they continue to travel in the right direction.

Iten is running haven for some of the fastest athletes on the planet. There are runners everywhere: on any given time of day you will see runners in Iten, running alongside the road, on trails or walking around in sponsor's tracksuits and sneakers. Iten has a population of 4000 of which around 25% are professional runners. For Kenyan children it is normal to run to school. On training runs children, often barefoot, run alongside you for as long as they can keep up – often cruising easily at four-minute per kilometre tempo in bare feet on uneven ground, with heavy school bags draped over their shoulders. Role models were everywhere and we were training alongside various Olympic medallists, World champions and even World record holders with remarkable little restriction and I had the honour to meet Wilson Kipsang, Abel Kiriu, Asbel Kiprob, Wilson Kiprob,

Jonathan Mayo and Lorna Kiplegat. Running is a way of life in Iten and being good at is a natural expectation for the athletes with so much precedent for success.

The Kenyan motto "Harambee" means "all pull together" in Swahili and it was really good to see this motto in practice. Most athletes no matter how successful and wealthy now, have come from poor families and great hardship. An understanding and compassion for those around them, particularly in their training groups, is common. Running at the top level pays well and with heroes like David Rudisha who holds the 800m world record, runners see that athletics can be the escape from poverty. Much off of the development in Iten is relatively new and could be directly related to investment by successful runners from the region. World Marathon Record holder, Wilson Kipsang has just completed construction of a Hotel in Iten and I was staying at the High Altitude Training Centre, a training camp set up by Lorna Kiplegat former World Half Marathon and Cross Country Champion.

The highlight of my visit was meeting up with Brother Colm O'Connell. Brother Colm first arrived in the Rift valley from Cork, Ireland in 1976 to teach at Iten's Catholic boarding school, St Patrick's. O'Connell prefers to train his athletes by feel, not by numbers – and it's hard to argue with the results. Since he began working in Kenya in 1976, 25 world champions and four Olympic gold medallists have come through his programmes, making him, by almost any measure, the most successful running coach in history. Kenyans themselves think very little about why they are so fast. They work very hard, put in heaps of mileage, take care of their bodies and sleep a lot. They understand that there are no short cuts to success.

I am sincerely honoured to have been selected as the recipient of the staff travel award and want to thank the Board for their generosity, which has allowed me to travel to Kenya.

CITY OF LONDON SCHOOLS

During my visit to London in March this year I had the opportunity to investigate, observe and learn from fellow professionals

The first school I visited was Mossbourne Community Academy, which was opened in 2004 and located in Hackney, one of the lower socio economic areas of London and has 900 pupils aged 11 – 16 years. At the perimeter gates I had to identify myself and confirm to a security camera and remote voice that I had a scheduled appointment. The large iron gates closed behind me and I walked towards the school reception in trepidation. More security and identification was required before the doors opened and I entered this school, feeling unsure what to expect. Suffice it to say that, after spending time in some classes, just like our school, academic success is a priority for their staff and students, and that sporting and cultural activities play an important role in developing well rounded young people. Safety for the students and staff was the reason for the level of security and reminded me how lucky we are at Westlake.

My next visit was to the City of London Boys School which was such a significant contrast. It is a boys' independent school, founded in 1442 and has 900+ students aged between 11- 18 years. Again the focus on the Academic, Sporting and Cultural arenas is significant and is celebrated with the same enthusiasm as at Westlake. The importance placed on academia is evident as 100% of the students continue onto a university within two years of leaving school. A tour of the school revealed their amazing indoor facilities but no playing fields like we have at Westlake, their boys have to travel to other sporting facilities to play sport.

I also visited High Wycombe Royal Grammar School, which is a boys' state school of 1450 students aged between 11 and 18 years. It was founded in 1562 and so last year they celebrated 450 years compared to our 50 years! While there were many differences, the similarities between our schools is apparent – the focus on academic, sporting and cultural achievement and success as well as the importance of pastoral care. I was given a tour of the school by one of the prefects – a polite, well-presented young man who spoke with confidence and enthusiasm about his school and once again I found myself comparing the two schools and the student body and the overall impression presented to a visitor and Westlake shines.

My trip gave me the chance to share something of the Westlake Way, the staff, students and families. Who we are, what we do and what we achieve at Westlake makes us unique and it was a privilege to be a Westlake ambassador.

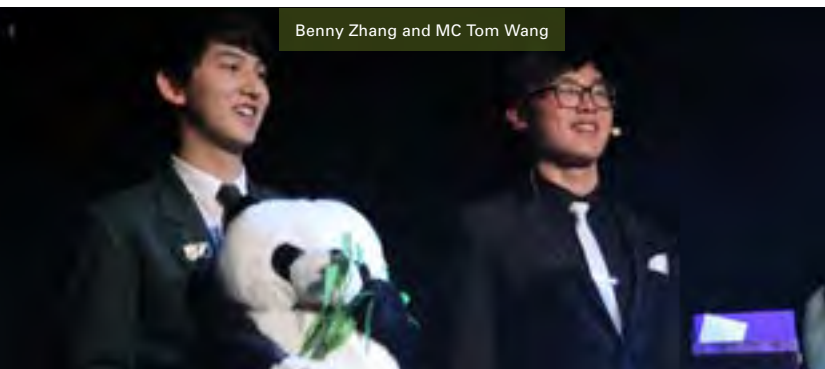
CHINESE NIGHT

KOREAN NIGHT

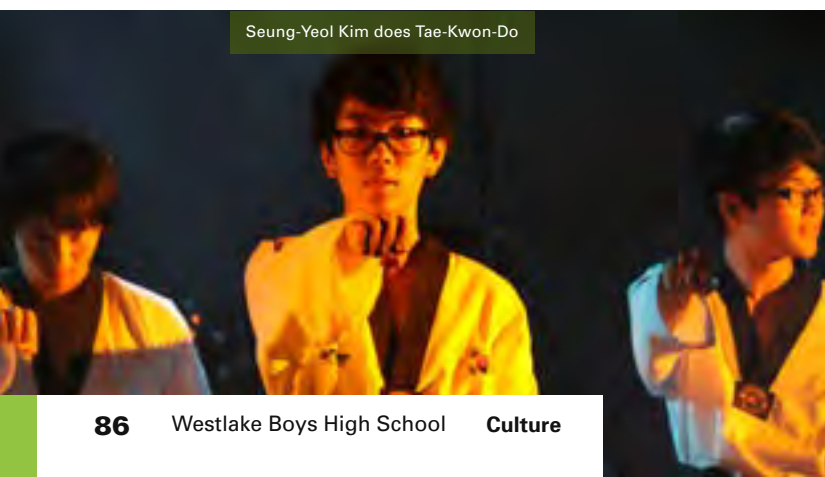

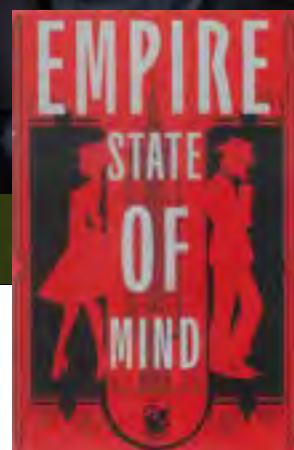

Westlake Boys has had its most successful season ever in debating, with teams making their respective finals in every senior level of the competition, consisting of the Advanced Open, Senior Open, Premier Junior and Premier Advanced grades. This was complemented by victories in the Seasonal Championships, Impromptu Cup and Thorburn Cup, the trophy haul being one that has never been achieved by any school in the history of Auckland Schools Debating.

This was the first year since 2007 that Westlake has clinched the Premier Advanced title; beating Orewa College in the final of the Auckland wide competition. James Rankin, Jesse Medcalf and Matthew Bilton affirmed the motion that the 'war on terror has failed'; arguing that America's post 9/11 invasions have caused more harm than good. This success came after competing in seven preliminary rounds followed by quarter and semi finals. WBHS 2, comprising Jono King, Caleb Gemmell, Mac Jordan and Nathan Regal also performed very strongly, with the team of 6th formers reaching the semi-finals where they narrowly lost.

Westlake's Premier Junior team of Liam Rawlings, George Han and Ian Lim also had success with winning the Premier Junior title for the 3rd consecutive year, beating Diocesan Girls in the final.

James, Jesse and Matt also represented Auckland at the New Zealand Schools' Debating Championships held in Wellington in August. Jesse and Matt were members of the Auckland White team that reached the semi-finals where they were unfortunate to lose to Wellington Black; whilst James' Auckland Blue made the finals, held at the Legislative Chamber in Parliament. Although his team lost to Wellington in the final, James was subsequently named as the winner of the Russell McVeagh Cup for the Best Speaker at the tournament. National Excellence Award, which they will receive in Wellington at the National Awards dinner in December.

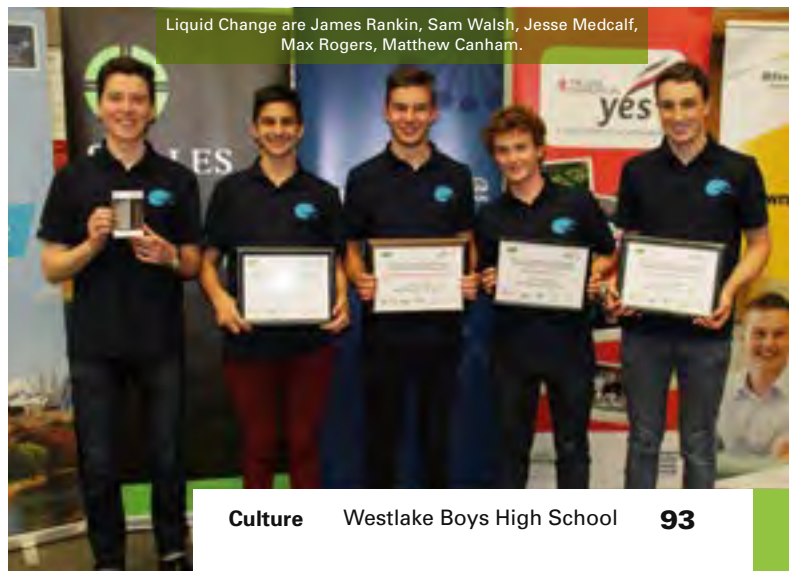

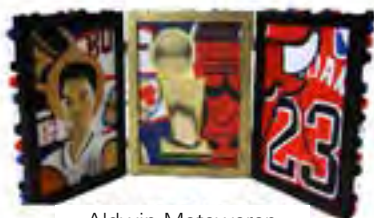

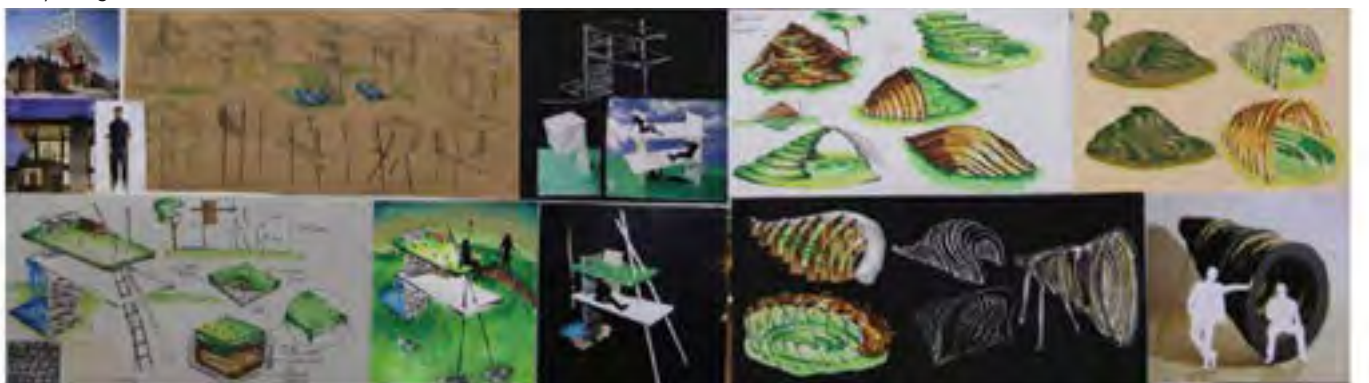

1ST XI CRICKET

The competition started with a one-dayer against Rangitoto College with five new debutants: Luke Steyn, William O'Donnell, Brett Bakerus, Nick Montgomery and Stefan Baumgatner joining new captain, Mitchell Atkins and vice-captain Jarrod Baker. Westlake won the toss and elected to bowl on a soft green wicket. Rangitoto were bowled out for 73, after Wesley Healiss (3-10), Clayton Floyd (3-8) and Luke Steyn (2-10) spun their magic. The target was chased down in the 19th over by the top 4 batters to give Westlake a convincing 6 wicket victory. Next up was Rosmini where Westlake bowled their local rivals out for 113. Then at Sacred Heart, Westlake once again chose to bowl and toppled SHC over for 125, where opening bowler Tamati Harris proved to be the stand out with 3-19.

Onto St Peters College, where Westlake's decision to bowl again, had St Peters 28-4 initially before a century partnership took the home team to a comfortable batting position. In two consecutive overs, Brett Bakkerus ended the half centurion's onslaught to restrict the opposition to 191. Tamati Harris with 3-26 knocked off the top and Luke Steyn(2-4) cleaned up the tail. In reply, Nic Montgomery with a composed 56 and another responsible knock of 70* by captain Mitchell Atkins led Westlake to a comfortable 6 wicket win.

Visiting traditional rivals Kings College in the last round of the 1 Day Competition proved to be a rare privilege. Captain Atkins lost the toss and the 1st X1 were put into bat for the first time this season. Vice-captain Jarrod Baker led the top order with a well played 69 and Tamati Harris steered the rear-guard with a polished 24* to help the team reach a respectable total of 194-9. Westlake then played MAGS in the Marrayatt One Day Cup Final at Keith Hay Park no 2. MAGS won the toss and made 210-7 with Brett Bakkerus, Luke Steyn and Wesley Healiss taking a couple of wickets each. The Westlake batsmen got off to a good start with Nic Montgomery getting 21, but soon the wickets tumbled to a miserable total of 76, to record an embarrassing loss of 134 runs.

The semi-final of the Gillette Cup against Auckland Grammar was always going to be challenging. Westlake batted first and made 197, with Clayton Floyd top scoring on 48. Grammar chased down the total with 5 wickets to spare, to be disappointingly knocked out of the Gillette Cup.

The season resumed on the 19th of October in a two day championship fixture against Rosmini College on a superb Westlake wicket. After sending the opponents into bat, the Westlake quickies

failed to make good use of the new ball as Rosmini batted out the first 55 overs for 55 runs with 4 wickets down. The Rosmini batsmen then decided to take it to the Westlake bowlers, who failed to bowl in the right areas and paid for it as Rosmini developed a 90 run partnership before losing their next wicket. Captain Atkins used 9 bowlers as Westlake eventually bowled out their opponents in the 84th over for 194. Westlake were 67-2 at the end of play with the game evenly poised. Day two turned out to be a batting disaster when Westlake were bowled out for 91 runs, losing 8 wickets for 24 runs.

Westlake needed to bounce back and they did against Sacred Heart College, who were dismissed for 80 in the first innings. Ross ter Braak led the bowling attack with a magnificent bowling display of quick bowling taking 5-25 off 9 overs and he was supported by Wesley Healiss and Tamati Harris who took 2 wickets each. At the end of the first day's play, Westlake were dismissed for 196, thus ensuring a first innings lead of 116 runs and first innings points. On Day two, the Westlake bowlers toiled on a hot day at Sacred Heart and were unable to bowl the opposition out, who declared on 296/7. Set 180 to win within 30 overs proved to be an unrealistic and the game ended with Westlake on 86/4..

The last game of the season against Championship leaders MAGS took place on a superb Westlake wicket. Westlake batted first and amassed a decent total of 254, mainly due to a fine batting display by William O'Donnell (77) who rescued the team after another fragile top order batting display. He was well supported by Dylan Steyn with 48. At close of play, MAGS were 35/2 with the game evenly poised.

The last day produced the most exciting cricket of the season as the upper hand changed between the two teams throughout the sessions. The first session was won by Westlake who reduced MAGS to 103/6 at lunch. However, the next session belonged to MAGS as they plundered the runs with a hundred partnership bringing them to within 50 runs off a victory. Westlake missed a few narrow run outs and dropped catches as the game heated up, but they never gave up. Brett Bakkerus stepped up to break the vital partnership and pressurise the MAGS tail to succumb to his accurate bowling. Westlake runners put in a splendid performance at the Auckland Regional Cross Country Champs held at St Kentigern College. The largely flat course, with a few sharp undulations thrown in, was in remarkably good condition considering the volume of rain that had fallen leading up to the race.

Westlake fielded a near full strength team of 38 runners for the Junior Boys race. The team was led home by Rawiri Wilson, his 7th place indicating just how fierce competition is at the top table of Auckland regional cross country running. Rawiri was followed by Joe Clark 12th, Joe Jackson 13th, Tommy Shiferaw 14th, a resurgent Ryan Williams 16th and Sam Hagan 26th who edged out Oliver Heal, 27th, by just one place.

A total of 83 points in the six man team competition meant we finished first on the day and comfortably in front of Sacred Heart in second place on 113 points. In the three man team we managed second, only one point behind winners Macleans College.

The Intermediate team finished first in the six man team after an impressive display of quality and depth. In the Junior race Dan Hoy had an amazing run finishing 2nd overall after falling 150 metres from the finish line while leading

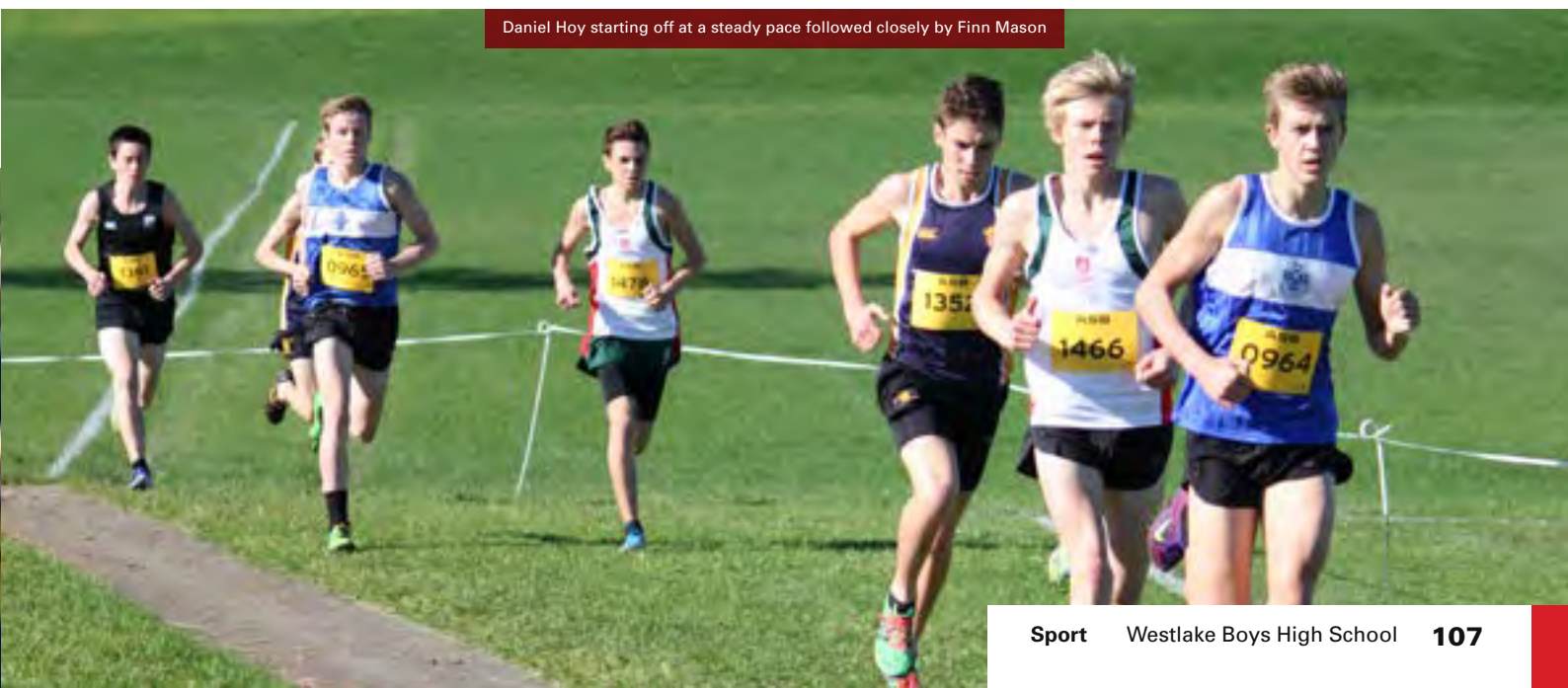

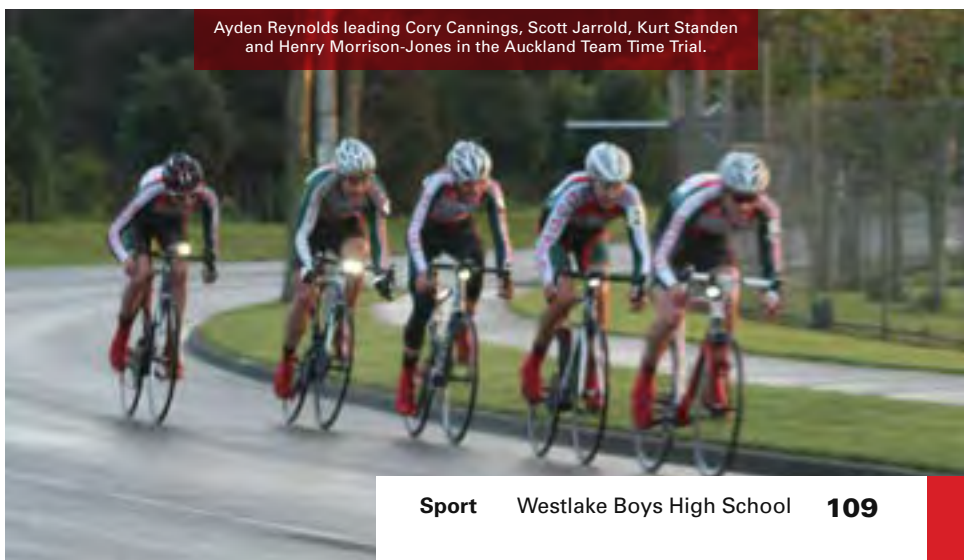

FIRST XI

The first XI of 2013 could best be described as the great entertainers. They played 29 games across four competitions and scored a remarkable 116 goals at an average of four goals per game. In a roller coaster ride of a season they became the first Westlake side to win silverware (the ASSFA knock out cup) at elite level in eight years but finished a disappointing 9th in New Zealand at the Lotto Premier National Tournament.

The team was a mixture of experienced players, six of whom were part of the NZ U17 World Cup squad, and emerging young talent. This may explain why they took some time to unite as a team. The season began with a promising but short-lived run in the ASB Chatham Cup with the team beating two senior men's teams, Kerikeri AFC (5-3) and Manukau city AFC (7-0) before bowing out in an epic cup encounter to Papatoetoe AFC (4-4 after extra time and 3-4 on penalties).

The team's form in the Auckland Premier League was inconsistent with eight wins and six defeats. An attacking philosophy was reflected in their goal difference of 48 scored (at an average of 3.5 per game) and 39 conceded (averaging 2.7 per game) but importantly a fourth place finish ensured they would compete in the top 16 at the national tournament. Some memorable league wins included a double over Sacred Heart and a dramatic 3-2 win over eventual national champions St Kentigern College.

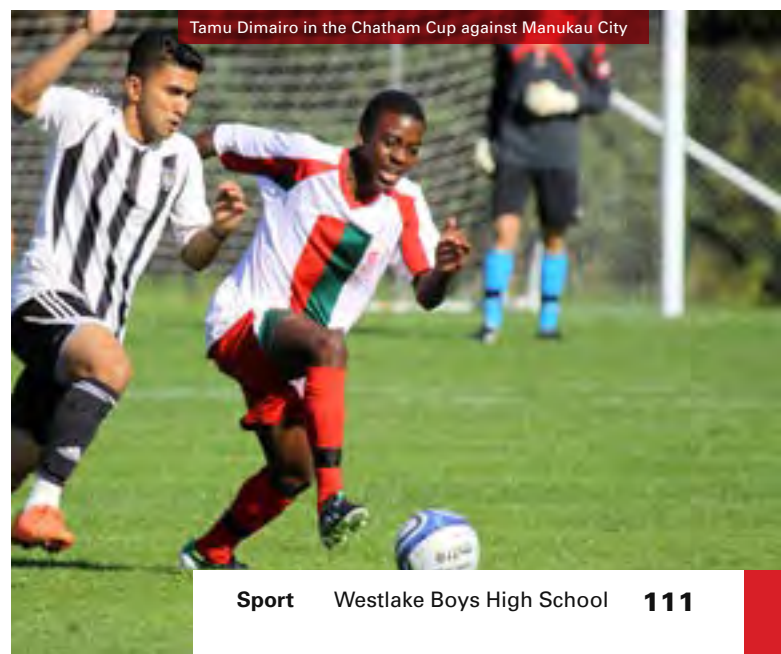
In early September the team headed off to the Lotto Premier national tournament in Taupo hopeful of a good showing. Fate, and a propensity to concede goals while dominating games, proved to be their undoing. After a slow start the team came from two goals down to salvage a 2-2 draw with Hamilton Boys. A convincing 4-1 win over St Patricks Kilbirnie followed, which meant a draw against old foes Sacred Heart would ensure a quarter final berth. In a rugged encounter only a wonder goal from Sacred Heart separated the two teams and when Stu Holthusen's free kick hit the inside of the post the team knew the football gods had were against them. Having missed out on the quarters by a goal difference, the boys rallied

impressively to win their next four games and beat Nelson College 3-1 in the Bowl final, but ultimately a 9th placing was disappointing.

The season ended on a real high as the team returned home to defeat the newly crowned national champions, St Kentigern College, 5-3 in a pulsating knock out cup semi-final and then went on to a record a spectacular cup final victory, 3-0, over MAGS at Bill McKinley Park.

This was the last year for seventh formers Denis Kim, who had a great year as captain, Nick Sugden, our longest serving player, Stuart Holthusen, who scored an impressive 23 goals and Matt Snelling. Special thanks must go to Head Coach Mr McBride and his assistants Mr Berry and Mr Buckingham and physio Richard Baylon for all their efforts over the season. Thanks also to the parents for their support throughout the year.

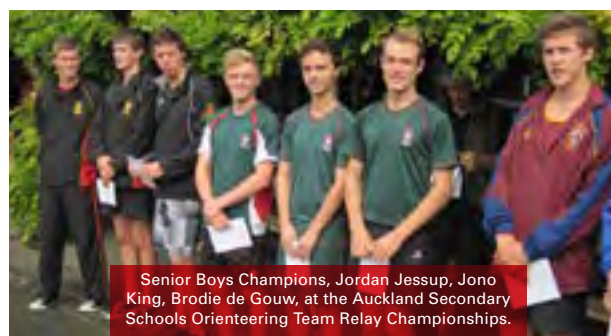

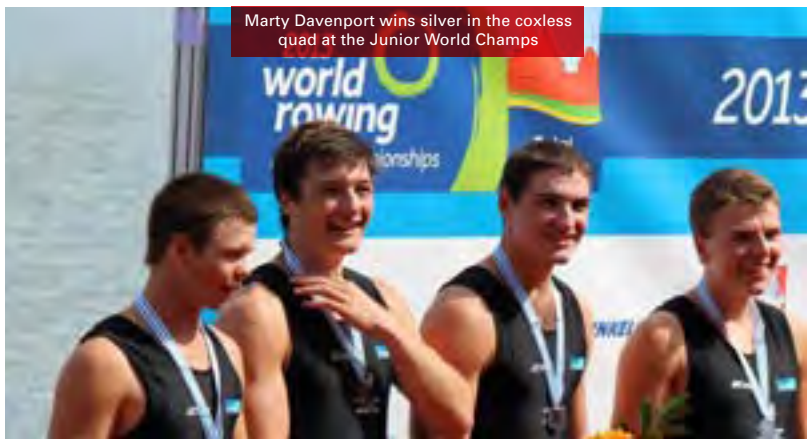

1ST XV RUGBY REPORT 2013

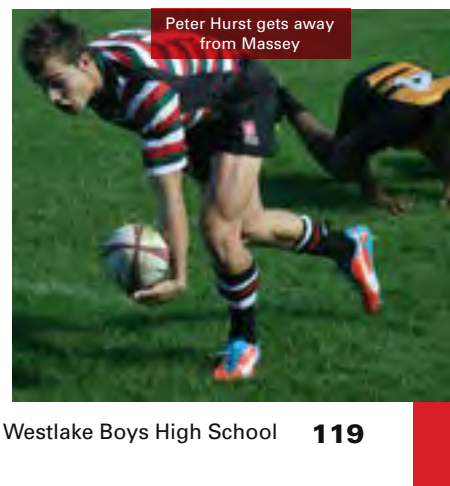

RUGBY LEAGUE

2013 saw Westlake Boys High School participate in the inaugural Auckland CRL Competition. It would begin as a year of uncertainties as prior to this year WBHS had always competed in the North Harbour competition and dominated. It was thought by some that the squad would struggle in this competition, but the coaching squad of Mr Nola and Westlake Boys High School old boys Jamie Williamson and Jamaica Whaanga knew the talent that existed within this team. The campaign officially started in March with early training sessions to ensure that the boys were fully prepared; this early work was evident in the boys' first game of the season when they came out on top over Avondale College 12-0 in atrocious conditions in a brutal game. Mr Nola and Jamie Williamson were also rewarded for all their hard work and effort by receiving the Coach of the Year award. The school also received positive media coverage on SKY Sports 40/20 show, which pushed the boys efforts further into the spotlight.

Making the top six in Auckland saw the boys automatically qualify for the New Zealand Secondary Schools Nationals. A tough pool meant having to battle the likes of St Pauls and Tokora, where unfortunately early losses to these two squads knocked the boys into a playoff for the cup which they lost 28-24 in extra time to Southern Cross. The boys ended up finishing 10th in the tournament, which was a little disappointing but it was a huge learning curve for the boys in their first year in the competition.

2014 will be a rebuilding year for the team with 19 of the 22 squad not returning but with the success of this year several young players are now emerging and are keen to get involved in the next chapter. 2013 will go down in the history books for WBHS Rugby League, finishing 5th in Auckland and 10th in N.Z. in the first year is an amazing achievement, and hopefully this will only be the beginning of new era in the sporting horizon at Westlake Boys High School.

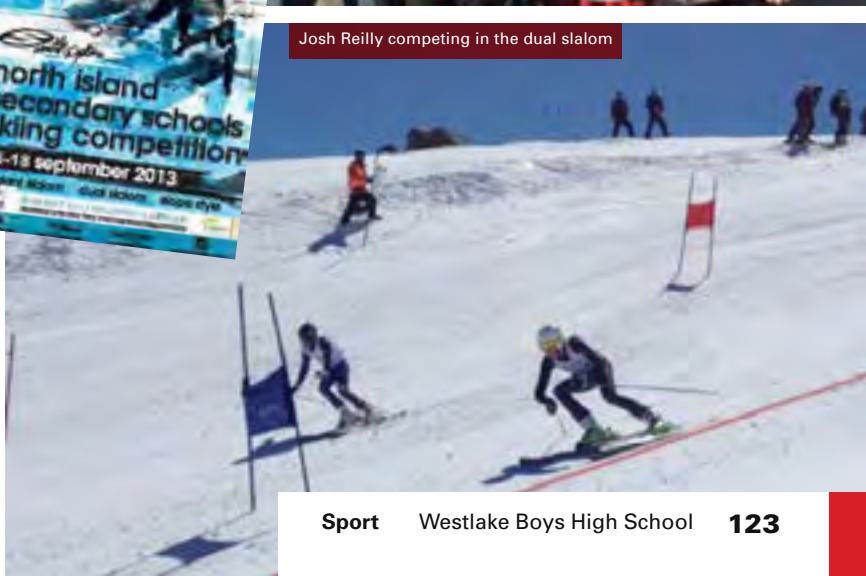

AUCKLAND CHAMPS

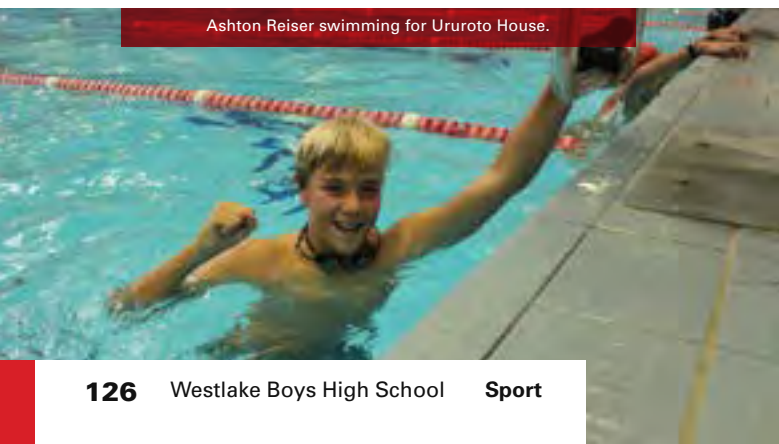

NZ AGE GROUP

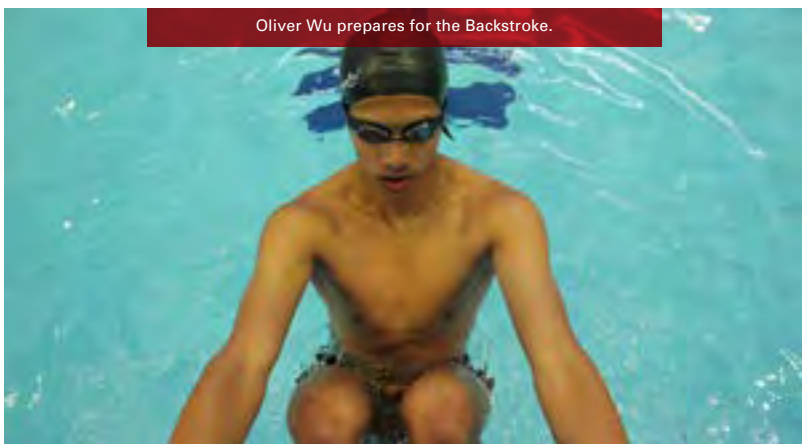

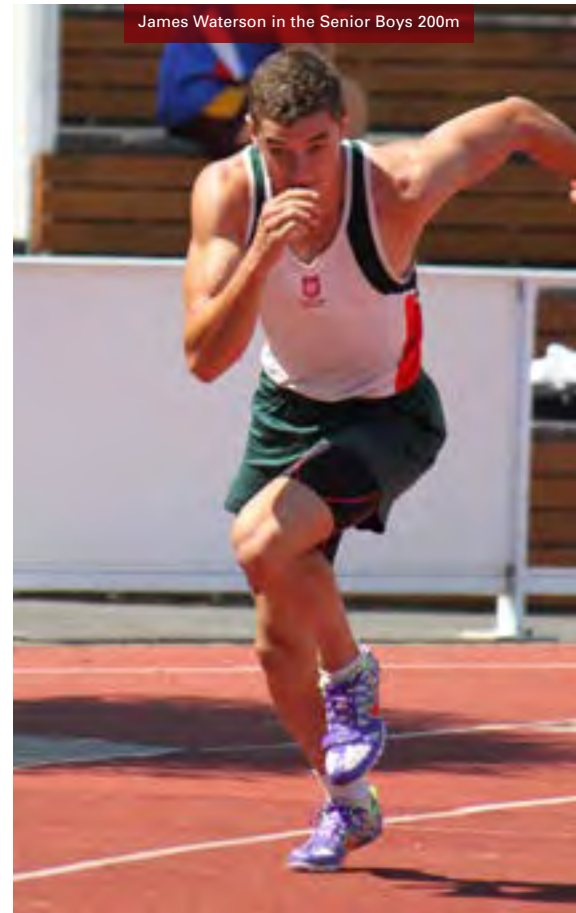

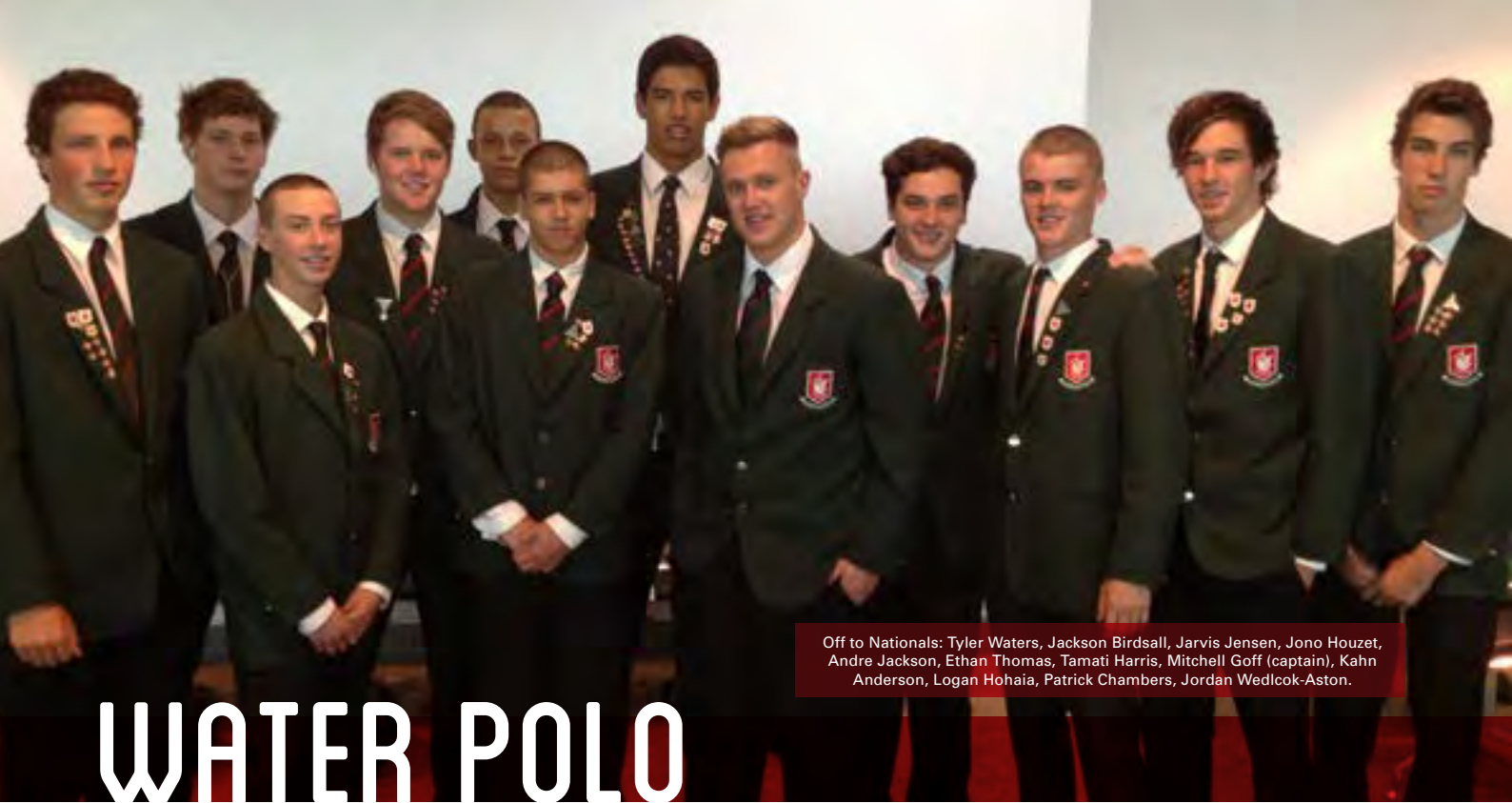

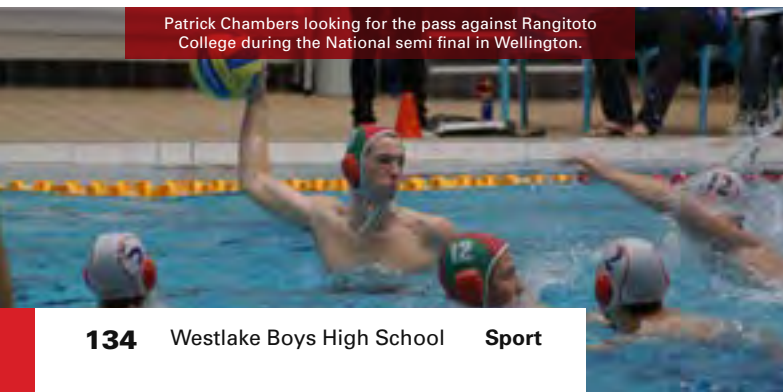

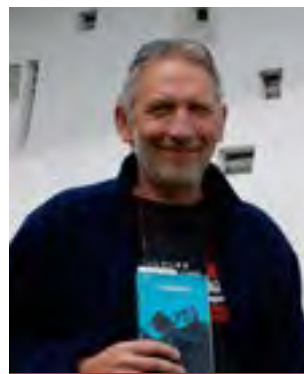


JEREMY NICOLL

ROY STEVENSON
1968-1971

I graduated from Westlake in 1971 and went on to Auckland Secondary Teachers College from 1973-1975, while also attending Auckland University. During my time at Westlake I was the junior, intermediate and senior cross country champ and international and senior mile champion. I led the Westlake cross country team to victory in 1971 over King's College, while finishing second behind Roger Simmons of King's in that race. I recall that our principal, Rod Macmillan, was particularly pleased with that effort as it showed that Westlake runners could mix it with the big boys at King's and Auckland Grammar.

In my last year at school I placed 4th in the 3000m steeplechase in the inaugural North Island Athletics Championships in Waikato. I also won the Auckland 3000m Steeplechase Championships in 1974 and set a New Zealand junior record for the marathon in 1974 of 2:42:28 in the Calliope Marathon. I competed in numerous New Zealand championships in athletics, cross country and road races.

I taught PE at Massey High School (1976) and Mount Albert Grammar (1978-80) before leaving to pursue graduate studies at Ohio University in the USA. I graduated with my Masters in Exercise Science in 1982 and then studied towards a Ph.D. at the University of Oregon in 1983.

After moving to Seattle, Washington State, in 1986 I founded the

"Fitness Specialist/Personal Trainer" at Lake Washington Technical College (now Lake Washington Institute of Technology) in Kirkland, and taught there until 2002. Then I accompanied my wife to Singapore on an expat assignment for three years, followed by 2.5 years in Brussels, Belgium.

Since returning to Seattle I have been a full time professional freelance travel writer and have had more than 800 articles published in 180 magazines, newspapers, in-flights and onboard magazines. I also do advertising copywriting for corporations and small businesses. I am on the road 150 days each year, and have travelled through 50 countries at last count.

I go on about 15-20 press trips each year. This year, for example, I spent eight weeks in Singapore, Borneo and Bali. The final four weeks were spent in 12 different luxury resorts in Bali. I recently spent six weeks in Europe working on various travel assignments, attending five Diamond League Athletics Meets in Birmingham, London, Monaco, Paris and Lausanne on assignment for Track & Field News and American Track & Field magazines.

One of my European assignments was a week-long cruise along the Burgundy Canal in a 126-foot long luxury hotel barge. I was also the guest of the German National Tourism Board for 12 days, while travelling around South West Germany, and six days in Wales courtesy of Visit Wales. I also spent two days exploring York courtesy of Visit York.

On returning to the USA I spent a week in Fairbanks, Alaska, a week in Boston, and am currently on a three week tour of five luxury resorts and spas in Arizona, on assignment for a travel magazine.

Fellow Westlaker, sculptor Jeff Thomson is a good friend of mine. I was one of several volunteers who helped provide "filler" for his concrete piece outside the library. Jeff was given a limited budget to make the artwork and could not afford to pay for the concrete he needed to make it. Being the creative person that he is, he press ganged several of us runners to fill the base in with empty beer bottles (that we naturally had to drain first). I can't remember how many beer bottles there are in that base, but it is a substantial number.



RYLEY WEBSTER
2000-2001

I attended Westlake Boys in 2000 and 2001 for Years 12 and 13. The opportunity to come to Westlake, from nearby Takapuna Grammar, was a pretty exciting one. It created the opportunity to advance my ambitions as a footballer and to be in the same school as some of my good mates.

Some highlights of my time at Westlake would definitely include beating the Kevin Fallon coached MAGS 1st XI regularly over my two years and our Year 12 Geography class Rotorua field trip (maybe not a highlight for the teachers in charge...). In Year 13 I was lucky enough to be included in the New Zealand U17 Football team that travelled to Vanuatu and Australia for World Cup qualification - an opportunity I

believe was made possible due to my move to Westlake.

Following my time at Westlake I studied Tourism and Media Studies at Otago University looking at how advancements in tourism infrastructure affected indigenous communities. The desire to travel and experience such interactions first hand took me to South and Central America for a little over a year where I undertook a number of volunteer postings - including working on sugar cane farms in Colombia as well as caring for and walking pumas and jaguars through the Bolivian jungle.

These days I work for a New Zealand based charity, Sustainable Coastlines, together with three friends from university. We set out to educate people from all sectors of society on the impact that littering behaviour has on our coastlines and oceans. Over the last four years I have helped to coordinate educational projects and coastal clean-ups involving over 73,000 people. Highlights of my time with Sustainable Coastlines have included setting up the systems for and managing all volunteers to clean-up the resulting oil after the Rena ran aground off Tauranga in 2011 as well as launching community education and training programs around New Zealand, Vanuatu and Papua New Guinea.

I have many great memories from my time at Westlake, in time I hope you enjoy the ones you have created as much as I do.



TONY EVANS
1957-1961

I was fortunate enough to attend Westlake High School from 1957-1961. My parents emigrated to New Zealand in 1951 and I remember turning up at Milford School aged 7 in my long socks and tie. It didn't take long to resort to bare feet and open shirt ... a far cry from school in England!

Going to Westlake as a foundation pupil was a big step in my life and I only have fond memories of the place - despite getting the cane a few times. Like the time I put clay in the art master's pipe and the class roared with laughter when he tried to light it. I had to own up otherwise there would have been a class detention. Or the time I climbed on the classroom roof to get my cap back as some urchin had thrown it up there. I wonder when the cane and caps finally disappeared.

In the days I attended, being part of a mixed school was fun despite having to put up the cricket nets as a temporary barrier around the court yard of the school hall during school dances... this was to prevent couples wandering off into the night. How times have changed!

Apart from the excellent education in the classroom it was the extra-curricular activities that were cherished and I will always be grateful to the teachers who gave up their time to run them. I remember Messrs Bailey, Buckley, Kelly, Stevenson and Butt for rugby and Mr Black for cricket as well as many others who helped with athletics and the Comic Opera The Pirates of Penzance. They are all fond memories of the policeman's chorus. These activities made academic work tolerable

and finally getting University Entrance was testimony to the professionalism of the teachers who never gave up on my academic trials and tribulations.

One of the highlights of my sporting life at Westlake was being part of the 1st XI playing in the Senior Auckland Competition and getting selected for Auckland Schools along with future test players like Mark Burgess, Hedley Howarth and Terry Jarvis. To get to training on a Sunday morning involved a bike ride to Devonport, the ferry across the harbour and a bus to Eden Park. It was rare to get lifts to matches in those days. Playing in the 1st XV (Alfie Butt's first year) and gaining promotion was another highlight as was finishing runner-up to Peter Burn in the school athletic championships.

After school I joined the ANZ Bank and studied part time at Auckland University. I played cricket for North Harbour and Takapuna Cricket Club and I played rugby for North Shore and was selected for the Auckland U23 XV. I was fortunate enough to play cricket with Brian Wood for two seasons for North Harbour who was a teacher in my last year at school. It was extremely sad that he died in an avalanche fall when mountaineering in India where he worked as a missionary. Mr Black, another teacher I had great respect for was tragically killed by a deranged pupil when he was Principal at a school in Taranaki. Mr Kelly, another fine teacher died when he was electrocuted by accident. These fine men will always be remembered by me.

In 1967 I went to England with some old school friends with the intention of travelling and working for a year. That year turned into many more and I am still living in London. Fortunately, I married Penny in 1970 and this year we celebrated our 43rd wedding anniversary by going to see West Side Story at Sadler's Wells in London. Our son Matthew is married and working in the city and Lise our daughter married last year and lives in Richmond between the Athletic Ground and Old Deer Park - very fortunate if you like rugby. Matthew played cricket for British Universities and had a season playing for Parnell in Auckland after University. He loved New Zealand and it was a great experience working and playing cricket there. It was nice for me that he met many of my old friends and played cricket at the grounds I knew so well.

My sporting life continued in England and I played league cricket in Surrey, Kent and Hertfordshire at different times as well as becoming a playing member of the MCC. I played for Saracens rugby club from 1967-70 and after that Streatham and Croydon, Tabard and finally Harpenden. I have been fortunate that my family have always been interested in sport and we have always supported each other in our endeavours.

I worked in the city until 1991 for HSBC and enjoyed my role as a Project Manager from 1983. From 1991 until 2006 I worked in a Preparatory School teaching geography and not surprisingly took the 1st XV and 1st X1. I still coach cricket and play golf but my arthritic run precludes me from more active pursuits.

Over the years many friends from my schooldays have stayed at our home in Harpenden when visiting England and I still value these friendships greatly. In 2007 I attended the 50 year celebrations with foundation pupils and this summer went to the Westlake London Reunion. It was great to re-new old friendships and meet other Westlakers. Certainly I consider myself fortunate to be a past pupil as the school gave me a good platform for life and some great friends and experiences.
