

HEADMASTER'S ANNUAL REPORT, 1973

ROLL:

The school roll at the beginning of this year was 1,040, a figure showing practically no change from the previous year. The very buoyant labour market has tended to give us more leaving school during this year than has been the case in the past, but enrolments for next year show no dearth of further customers. Several of those who have left early have not fulfilled the two year pre-apprenticeship requirements, so one can only assume that either the regulations are being severely stretched, or many boys will be unable to gain their trade certificate, in-spite-of promises made.

EXAMINATION RESULTS, 1972:

School Certificate: of 233 candidates, 161 obtained a group pass entitling them to 6th Form entry. (69% of total).

University Entrance: Of 190 candidates, 131 were accredited and 6 passed the Examination, some 72% of the total.

Scholarship and Bursary: David Crawley, Brian O'Hagan, Stephen Strother and Stuart Gardiner all gained Scholarships, and there 19 'A' Bursaries and 32 'B' Bursaries - an award rate of 73%.

All of these results represent some 15% or more above the national average which should help to dispel the gloom emanating from those prophets who are quoting academic decadence for the younger generation.

STAFFING:

The stability of our staffing has been maintained over the past twelve months with few changes to record. Mr. E.T. Huang left in March and his position was filled by Mr. T. O'Keeffe in Term 2, and in this term by Mr. C.A. Anderson.

Mr. J. Sealy has been on exchange in Britain, and his position has been ably filled by Mr. M. Tomlinson who will be returning to Britain in December. Mr. N. Wooding has been relieving since the beginning of the second term in place of Mr. J. Horner who has been overseas on study leave. Mr. S. Valentine who has been in long-term relieving work will be reverting to part-time teaching next year. At the end of this year we will be losing the services of Mr. M. Kelly who, over the past two years, has given excellent service to Westlake as Head of History Department and master-in-charge of Rowing. His place will be taken by Mr. S. Nield, at present on the Staff of Mt. Roskill Grammar School. Mr. L. Dwyer will replace Mr. C. Ralfe who has been relieving in the Science Department during this year. Other new appointments are Mr. G. Lindsay and Mr. D. Tyler. Mr J. McGuinness will be leaving to a position at Glenfield College.

I would like to express to those teachers who are leaving our thanks for their service, and to all staff members my thanks for another year of loyal and valued service to our school. In-spite-of the difficulties and adverse publicity sought for and gained by a few of our students, I regard this as a school where a very large majority of our students gain a tremendous amount from the work carried out, both in the classroom and in the wide range of extra-curricular activities which we can offer, and this is made possible only because of the extensive contribution made by many of the staff.

GROUNDS AND BUILDINGS:

Extensive drainage has been carried out over our main fields, and improved conditions were noted through the winter. Extra top-soil is at present being brought in to the soccer fields in order to provide a better grass cover and playing surface.

The addition of two new art-rooms has recently been completed, and is proving a tremendous asset compared with the previous unsuitable suite of rooms which served our Art Department.

Additional office space is enabling us to re-organise our main office, and Mrs. Lightbourne can now handle telephone calls without the discordant accompaniment of the duplicator, and the extra space is giving added efficiency.

The provision of terraced seating near the Pavilion represents a valuable asset to the School, and we are indebted to Mr. Phillips, President of the Parent-Teacher Association, and parents, for several working Saturdays in providing this amenity.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Our Board was re-elected in May for a three-year term with Dr. Shepherd replacing Mr. Finer who retired from Office. A further term as Chairman by Mr. McIntosh is something welcomed by Staff and Students who recognise the liberal guidance given by Mr. McIntosh to the Board in arranging frequent meetings of Board members with Staff and Students. The recent invitation to a Staff Representative to attend Board meetings is a further move to strengthen lines of communication within the School.

The School has had a sub-committee of Board, Parents, Staff, ex-Pupils and friends who have raised some \$4,000 for rowing equipment, and I wish to thank Mr Darlow and his committee for their generosity in making the impossible happen in the form of a new Rowing Eight with necessary trailer.

SPORTING AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES:

A very full range of sporting activities has been offered this year with widespread pupil participation. I would record the following high honours gained during the year.

- The Senior Soccer XI has won the Auckland Secondary School's Competition for the second year running.
- The Cricket XI is leading the Senior 'A' Competition with two matches still to be played.
- Michael Craven, of Form 6, has gained the highest honours as a cornetist in being selected for the New Zealand National Band for

its extended tour next year.

- 4. Rex Lamb has won national representation in the O.K. Dinghy Yachting Team competing in Australia in January next.
- Pieter Hos has won First Prize in the Alliance Francaise Competition for senior secondary students - a very coveted honour in the language field.

These highlights can only accentuate the considerable $dep_{\,th}$ on a wide front of our academic, sporting, musical and dramatic activities. I cannot speak too highly of the tremendous contribution made by Staff, Parents and senior boys to these activities.

* * * * * * * * * * *

This year marks the completion of ten years that I have had the privilege of being Headmaster of this School - each year in itself a challenge and with its own rewards of loyalty and successes, and its frustrations and failures, with fortunately, the former group outweighting the number in the latter.

Over the years, we have made concessions to liberalising our policies and curriculum. but also we have held firmly to the features of the past which have stood the test of time, and I make no apology for this policy. In the field of Student Government we have, this year, combined the orderly administration of a group of Prefects on an equal status with a Student Council which has brought through policy recommendations and has fostered cultural and extra-curricular activities. I would commend the prefect group for their valuable assistance in keeping this School functioning smoothly, an attribute which I know is valued by the majority of the pupils, and at the same time the Student Council has prepared a varied programme ranging from a highly successful and educational motor week, to Socials, and to the fostering of interest in a Student Recreational Centre for Westlake, which has to date, with the co-operation of the Parent-Teacher Association and the senior students of the Auckland School of Architecture, produced plans which will be on display in the near future.

The key to the success of this year has been the co-operation and mutual respect of the two student groups, together working out constructive measures for the good of the school. I hope it has set a worthwhile pattern for the future. One would only hope that comparable progress could be made with the long promised staffing ratios and improvements from a Government which is enjoying the most prosperous years that New Zealand has ever known. I continue to remind the Minister of Education that this School of over 1,000 has only one administrative assistant, whereas all co-educational school even of one quarter of the size have two such assistants. The Minister has not told me how he expects one such person to cope with all the difficulties presented by 1,000 boys - I am glad that he recognises the need in all co-ed schools, but would hope for equality of recognition and acknowledgement of a large problem in a large school.

"TECHNOLOGY AND THE ENVIRONMENT"

Speech of Mr R. Norman to Senior Prize-Giving

It is usual on an occasion like this for the visiting speaker to praise the virtuous and the successful, to commiserate with those of you who have yet to suffer the slings and arrows of the outrageous fortune of the examination room, to wish well those of you who are leaving, and to inflict on all of you the traditional homilies and exhortations concerning your future place in society.

But I have something else to talk about. This is Technology and the Environment, and perhaps I could start with a true story.

Back in 1949 I was a Construction Engineer engaged in building a steel rolling mill in South Wales. It was a massive undertaking, involving several large contracting organisations, and the bill for the lot was about 100 million.

My particular job in this work was supervising the erection of some 15,000 tons of structural steelwork. One day I was inspecting a line of columns on top of which were being welded some heavy steel girders on which would run the over-head gantry cranes. This day I found that one of the columns had not been welded to the Girder system. So next time I saw the welding foreman I said "Jimmy, you haven't welded up the girder bearing at column A39". James Aitken was a hard-bitten scot, and I hardly expected the sort of reply he gave. "But mon, ah canna weld the bearin'!"
"Why Jimmy?"
"Cause there's a wee biride settin' on a nest on the bottom flange

I went along with him to have a look. All around column A39, construction was in full swing. The noise from pneumatic wrenches, chipping hammers and construction equipment was deafening. Yet there, right behind the stiffener, on the bottom flange on the girder was a Robin in a nest with three eggs.

o' the girder!"

That bearing remained unwelded until the late spring. Thus, in the harsh metallic glitter of this technological age, there is still room for sensitivity and compassion. And really that's what this talk is about. Technological development is transforming much of our environment. That it is essential in our continued quest for a better living is hard to refute. But there are ways of doing this, having regard to such things as dignity, humility and sensitivity. Somehow we must achieve this reconciliation between development and conservation.

But first, let me dwell for a moment or two on the quality of some of our technical work in New Zealand. Here on the stage I have an instrument known as an Optical Theodolite - this is used in surveying. It is a good instrument in its class, but it is by no means a rare one, and many such theodolites are in daily use by engineering organisations. You may be interested to know that this instrument is capable of reading angles directly to one second of arc. Put another way, this theodolite can split the horizon into a million parts and measure them all, and it can define an object one inch in size from three miles away.

You may well ask the question "so what, why the need for all this accuracy,, this sophistication?" Well I'll give you one reason.

When we build a large hydro-electric dam across a river valley, I think you would agree that the system needs to be reasonably watertight. The dam must fit into the country so that there is a good seal against leakage all around. But what happens when the lake fills up behind the dam? The earth's crust deforms with the weight of water. Take Benmore Lake for example. It weighs two thousand million tons, and it did not exist ten years ago. The rock of the earth's crust is only 10 to 20 miles thick and it bends under such a load like any other material. This has a considerable influence on the design of the dam and we need to know what deformations to expect. But how do we measure them? If we are working close to the dam all our measuring points move with the rest of the country, so this does not help. So what we have to do is set up stations many miles away and measure very long distance with extreme accuracy.

We have just experienced a very interesting problem in this precision survey work. At present we are establishing base measurements in the Waitaki basin so that movements can be observed when the massive hydro-electric development is completed. To get these measurements, we are using Electronic Theodolites known as Geodimeters which measure distance by determining the time it takes a beam of light to do the return journey between two survey stations several miles apart. And we found we had a problem. When we did the measurements at night, the answers always came out a little bit longer than the same measurements taken in the daytime. It was only a centimetre or two in a distance of ten kilometres, but it was quite definite and well outside the limits of experimental error. Quite a bit of head-scratching went on until someone lighted on the answer. You probably all know that the speed of light in a vacuum, or in space, is 186,000 miles per second. In air it is very slightly less than this, and in water considerably less. In fact its speed depends on the density of the material through which it passes.

Now at Waitaki it was found that at night-time a mass of cold dense air descended into the valley, only to dissipate with the heat of the sun next day. Consequently the electronic impulse at night took longer to do its return journey, and the instrument obligingly gave a higher reading.

Now we know better. We measure the air temperatures en route. But there is sure to be some other little green man lurking around the corner, ready to dole out the next problem!

"All right" you may well say "but what has this got to do with the environment?"

Before I answer that question, let me tell you another true story from my travel diary.

In 1956, when in Los Angeles, California, I visited a construction project where the highway department was putting in a \$220 million interchange complex between two freeways - a bit like the spaghetti bowl in Newton Gully; Some years later I was back in California and I asked the same engineer how the job worked out. His reply was a classic:
"Well Bob, you recall that spot of traffic congestion we ran into that day

"Well Bob, you recall that spot of traffic congestion we ran into that day in Downtown L.A. at 17th and M? why, since we put in that interchange, that congestion has gone. In fact, it has moved on down to 23rd and Q: It looks as though the operational was successful but the patient died."

What does this imply? Does it mean that Americans drive too many motorcars or that civil engineers are a bunch of "nongs"? I won't argue that, but what it does mean is that notwithstanding the advanced state of the art, technology still remains a step or two behind the needs of society. We solve problems, only to produce others.

This is how it is with the environment. The Los Angeles traffic interchange is an example of the continual influence of the dynamics of technology. Nothing is ever really totally solved, and the hallmark of survival of both primitive and sophisticated societies is the need to go on struggling and to chart unknown territory.

We are learning too that many problems of our environment arise not only from scant disregard of our obligations, but also from the most altruistic of motives, backed up with the best and latest of scientific resources.

When you come to look at things, this is the way mankind has operated for thousands of years. Man has striven to improve his lot, to solve problems, only to produce further problems in turn, yet all the time moving forward in his cultural and social development.

Now we have an additional factor - a greater degree of public awareness about our environment. No longer are people prepared to accept without question the product of the technologists' skills and labour. This is certainly how it should be, and those of us who are engaged in public works and development must accept this as a fact of life.

But there is another side to this question. Public criticism must be more than simply the strident voices of protest groups and doomsday prophets. What the technologists are entitled to expect is properly reasoned, soundly-based, unselfish criticism. This doesn't always happen, and there are occasions where works of national importance have been prejudiced by pressure groups with limited objectives.

Now where do you fit into this environmental scene?

You are about to move into a society which is struggling with many conflicting pressures. It will not always be easy to gain a full understanding of the issues involved. Yet in my opinion, two facts stand out clearly.

First, technology must not stand still, there are times when you will be discouraged by failures or by criticism. These are not the times to opt out of the system and sigh for the horse and buggy days. These are the times for challenge, inventiveness and superb technical effort. History has shown again and again that the big break-throughs in scientific endeavour have happened when things have been the blackest. The very technology which has produced our environmental problems is capable of solving them, and it's up to you to see that it does.

Second, if you are on the other side of the fence, don't be too easily satisfied with what the technologist has to offer. Remember that in the long run the standard which technology achieves will be the standard that society demands of it. In other words, as a client you will get exactly what you deserve, neither more, nor less. Many of the poorer features of our environment have resulted from the fact that nobody has cared or because any criticism offered was uninformed and thus unhelpful.

So there it is.

We must go on building things, growing things and fetching and carrying things. And it is soon going to be your job to do this wisely and with proper regard to our environment. Your parents and grandparents worked hard and solved many problems - problems of poverty, disease, lack of communications, lack of shelter or comfort. Now these are largely solved, they have been replaced by problems of the environment, and these are being handed down to you.

How will you cope with these?

Your success will depend on your own personal attitudes and involvement. You will hardly be effective in applying the best of skills to environmental care if you litter the streets with paper, or the beaches and picnic grounds with broken glass. But if you are sensitive and are aware of the response of the environment to everything you do, then half the battle is won. Technology will catch up with the rest.

And so my message to you, is simply this - anything which science and technology can achieve will come to naught, unless you yourselves show two basic qualities - sensitivity, and humility - sensitivity, because in the long run, it is the little things that count - humility, because in influencing the environment, you are dealing with someone else's garden, not your own.

To those of you who will be returning next year, may I say: Be proud of your college, but, more important, put something into your college of which you can be proud.

To those of you who are leaving to travel hopefully with the rest of society, let me pass on to you the words traditionally spoken by the Maori Chieftans of old when they handed down to their successors their robes of office:-

Be Strong, Be Brave, Be Steadfast. Kia Kaha, Kia Toa, Kia Manawanui.

Good luck - New Zealand is waiting for you, and now, it is to be -your turn.

STUDENT COUNCIL 1973


The Student Council has, I think, had its best year in 1973. This can be atributed to the fact that it knew where its place was and what its functions were. The two-body, Prefect-Student Council, system operating in the school worked extremely well and was assisted immensily by the character of person in both bodies and strong ties amongst executive members and prefects.

As I mentioned last year the Student Council needed to widen its sphere of influence and take on an organising and running role rather than one of actual change. This it has done and throughout the year their have been many examples of functions organised and run by the council. The most obvious ones are the swimming sports, motor week, culture week, various pop groups for lunch time entertainment, various bus trips away supporting sporting functions and of course the usual dances. These have I think been genuinely favourably accepted and in many casses offer themselves for expansion and platforms on which new and better forms of school activities can be built next year.

There were several highlights throughout the year and the Student Council Conference for all Auckland Schools organised by Westlake and held during the August holidays was perhaps the most important. The number of schools represented and the number of delegates present was disappointing but it did make quite a few suggestions on a variety

of subjects which went to the Minister of Education. It has been planned that a similar conference and possibly more frequently held social functions be organised for 1974. Westlake has volunteered to organise the conference for 1974. Highlight of a more general nature has been the very successful and often controversial cultural assembly speakers who have included Sir Dove Myer Robinson, debate on the Springbok issue and speakers from the Gay Liberation Front.

Several long-term aims have been reached or furthered this year. During the latter part of the year David Rankin and myself have been attending B.O.G. meetings and the B.O.G. have agreed to having observes from the councils of both the Boys and Girls schools attend meetings starting from the beginning of 1974. The B.O.G. has also agreed to allow the council to open its own bank account which it will do in 1974 with money earned from lunchtime entertainment and Motor week totaling \$150. Perhaps most pleasing is the progress made on the building of a student complex with the establishing of a committee comprising two council members, two B.L.A. and two B.O.G. representatives and the Headmaster. This committee has already discussed, informally, the matter with Education Department officers and have been lucky enough to have senior architectural students produce their impressions of what the complex could look like.

The school's thanks go to all coaches, parents, players and supporters for making 1973 a good rugby season.

THE FIRST FIFTEEN

This year's 1st XV was more successful than many people thought it would be, mainly because of the excellent team spirit which developed during the season. After losing to Mt. Albert and to St. Kentigerns in the first two competition games the team pulled itself together and won the next four in a row, and in doing so defeated Kings for the first time. However in the next three games we became a little overconfident, and as a result suffered two losses and a draw, the latter against the bottom placed team - Rutherford. Then for the last two competition games the team produced its best rugby of the season; beating two of the hardest teams in the competition; Auckland Grammar (which was probably the highlight of the season) and last year's winners St. Pauls. The performance of the team was all the more creditable as it was one of the youngest XV's that Westlake has fielded. including many fifth formers - with only Geoff Ball and Chris Hunt returning from last year's XV. However most of the credit must go to our coach, Mr. Butt, whose enthusiasm and willingness to help the players, especially the more inexperienced members, guided the team to many satisfying wins through the season.

The final record of 16 wins, 6 losses and 1 draw and above all our placing of fourth in the competition (one point off second place) gives a good indication both of Mr. Butt's ability as a coach and of the team's spirit. This surely must have been one of the most enjoyable seasons on record.

W.B.H.S. PRACTICE MATCHES

The first XV played five pre-season games. In its performance the team did not come up to expectations but showed promise and above all spirit. The games played were against Rangitoto - won 16-8 (school scores first), Rosmini - won 25-4, Penrose - won 33-13, Northcote - won 62-0, Glenfield - won 13-3 and later on in the season against Takapuna 3rd Grade a good game which we lost 9-16. These served as good buildups for our later matches.

WESTLAKE V. TAKAPUNA GRAMMAR

This season with only 2 members of the previous year's 1st XV back, we though we might be in for a tough time against Takapuna Grammar who had 9 members back. This annual blood match turned out to be a thriller with Westlake just managing to hold on to a slender 16-13 lead when the full-time whistle blew.

The weather was fine and hot as the two teams ran onto the field. Most Westlake supporters were a little apprehensive with the XV's untried and unproved combination. However, their fears appeared to be unfounded as first Neil St. Clair, then Brett Garea scored tries in the first half. Richard Falwasser converted one and with Takapuna scoring only a penalty the half time score was 10-3.

Soon after the start of the second half, Richard Falwasser ran the blind side close to Grammar's line and with a deft dummy crashed across to score in a handy position for the conversion attempt. He converted with little trouble to make the score 16-3. It was at this point that the trouble started for Westlake. The team started to get loose, with forwards lacking unification in rucks and singleness of purpose in the loose. The backs tackling too became shabby. This allowed Grammar to display its fighting ability and with two tries and a conversion came back to only 13-16 down. The play fluctuated from end to end with both teams defending stoutly. However when the full time whistle blew the score was still 16-13. Overall Westlake had the edge over Takapuna Grammar and the combination used in this game proved to be good basis for what was probably Westlake's most successful ever 1st XV.

WESTLAKE V MT. ALBERT GRAMMAR

This was our first competition match and it was played in perfect Rugby weather. Although Westlake lost this game it should be mentioned that the team played outstanding Rugby, with special credit to the team's fine defence during the second half.

Westlake kicked off and immediately went on the attack. But it was Mt. Albert who drew first blood with a fine backline try, which was converted. From the restart Westlake again attacked and was finally rewarded with a penalty. For the next 5 minutes the game see-sawed up and down the field with both teams narrowly missing scoring opportunities. With 10 minutes till half time Falwasser kicked another penalty. Our lead was shortlived, for from the kick off Mt. Albert scored their second unconverted try. It was almost half time when flanker B. Purvis running from a ruck in front of Mt. Albert's posts placed a perfectly time grubber kick over their line, which C. Hunt pounced on to score. With the conversion Westlake led 12-8 at half time. The only bad point of the match was the loss of Steven McCulloch, our fullback, who was dropped by a head-high tackle and had to retire in a semi-conscious state.

The second half was all Mt. Albert's. They played with fire in the forwards and speed in the backs. Mt. Albert ran into two more tries (both unconverted) plus a penalty in the second half but it was only Westlake's great defence that kept the score at a decent level. Late in the game Westlake threw away a couple of scoring opportunities by electing to kick from penalties instead of running it. The game ended with Westlake kicking a penalty, ending the game 23-15. Scorers: C. Hunt, try. Falwasser, 1 conversion, 3 penalties.

WESTLAKE V ST. KENTIGERNS (At Westlake)

A strong breeze was blowing from the south for the second competition game of the season and Westlake elected to play with the conditions. The home side played well during the first half with Chris Hunt scoring a runaway try which covered half of the field and was converted by Richard Falwasser. The score was 6-0 when the whistle blew for half time. But in the second half, with the wind behind them, St. Kents. attacked with more purpose. Westlake had trouble containing their inside backs and eventually they slipped through to score two tries. The star of the match was Captain Geoff Ball and the final score was 8-6 to St. Kentigerns.

WESTLAKE V WHANGAREI BOYS HIGH SCHOOL (At Whangarei)

This year's annual match against Whangarei Boys was played on Rugby Park, Whangarei in very hot and tiring conditions. In the first stages of the match the run of play was fairly even with both sides making good breaks. Towards the end of the first half Westlake began to dominate the play. The first points came when En Wikiriwhi picked up a loose ball near the line and dived over for a try. Richard Falwasser converted the try. Soon after Whangarei retaliated with a try, making the half-time score 6-4 in our favour. From the start of the second half Westlake again applied the pressure. From a scrum about five yards out from the Whangarei try line, Michael Stanley picked up the ball and dived over for a certain try. But unfortunately the Referee did not see it and it was consequently not awarded. Whangarei led for the first time when they scored another unconverted try. Westlake now trailing 6-8 began to put everything into their game. Richard Falwasser who was playing a great game banged over 2 penalties, both from difficult angles. At full-time Westlake came out winners, by 12 points to 8.

WESTLAKE V HATO PETERA (At Westlake)

The paddock was firm and the weather good when Westlake and Hato Petera ran onto the field. The home side, playing on turf well known to them, and spurred on by good spectator support, felt confident of success. Hato Petera would have no chance of clinching a certain victory from them the Westlake side thought. However the visitors had excellent morale and a team spirit that would carry them into a game where it would be tested against the powerful Westlake opponents. A stalemate ensued for much of the game both sides suppressing attempts to charge for the line. When Hato Petera did make a break, the players with the ball lacked the support they so deservedly needed. Westlake had a chance at last won the ball was charged down by Chris Hunt on halfway. Retrieving it he hurled himself through the shattered defense to the goal line to score the only try of the match. Both sides kicked two penalty goals of which Falwasser kicked both for Westlake enabling Westlake to come out on top 10-6.

WESTLAKE V OLD BOYS

The annual Old Boys match played during Queen's Birthday Weekend was fought in a fine spirit. The Old boys eventually came out on top with an intercept try towards the end of the match. They deserved to win as they scored 4 tries to the schools 1. The final score was 13-16. Scorers: G. Ball, Penaltry, Try, C. Hunt, 3 penalties.

WESTLAKE V KINGS (At Westlake)

This was the first wet game of the season and the school XV played wellcontrolled wet-weather Rugby to beat King's College 13-10 in a hardfought game. While the ball was dry both teams tried to spin it but on the wet field the lighter but determined Westlake pack dominated the forward battle. The half-time score was 6-3 with Westlake's points coming from Richard Falwasser. Attacking well in the second half, Westlake were still willing to run the ball, even on defence. S. McCullough proved this by running from inside the school 25 to pass on to M. Lonie, who ran well to put G. Ball in under the posts. The try was converted by R. Falwasser, taking the score to 9-6. Westlake forwards pushed the King's opposition back in both tight and loose scrums, winning most possession of the ball. The final points for Westlake came from a try by M. Stanley who forced the ball after Kings was pushed over the line from a scrum 10 yards out. Kings fought back well to score a try in the corner, taking the final score to 13-10. Special mention must go to S. McCullough who fielded the wet ball brilliantly, and whose performance throughout the rest of the season was excellent on both attack and defence. The team was more than pleased with the win as it was the first time a Westlake side had beaten a King's team.

WESTLAKE V SACRED HEART

The 1st XV gained its 3rd win in a row with a 14-9 victory over S.H.C. A large band of supporters was on hand to see a well-deserved win. Though conceding three early points, the first half was dominated by Westlake, with both forwards and backs combining well to run up 11 points. A good supply of ball from the forwards was put to great effect by the backs, who made very few mistakes and were always dangerous. Set off by accurate service from M. Nichols - who played his best game of the season - the backs applied the pressure with S. Rae making many determined and dangerous runs. Sacred Heart rallied well in the second half and probably had the best of this half. Attack, counter-attack and good defence by both sides characterised play, with the only points scored coming from a Westlake penalty. The player of the day was undoubtedly Geoff Ball, who had an outstanding game. Stephen Rae and Austin Harris scored tries, while R. Falwasser and C. Hunt kicked penalties. Sacred Heart scored a converted try and a penalty.

WESTLAKE V OTAHUHU

After being up 10-nil at half time, with tries scored by M. Lonie and a conversion by R. Falwasser, a strongly-combined Otahuhu side found holes in Westlake's defence, and their big winger Saseve was put over for 2 tries. Soon after 4 more points was added to Otahuhu's score and Westlake found themselves down 12-10. With only minutes remaining Westlake turned from defence to attack, with two determined breaks led by R. Falwasser. The second of these ended in a penalty in our favour, and nail-biting supporters were relieved by the decisive right boot of R. Falwasser.

WESTLAKE V KELSTON BOYS HIGH SCHOOL (At Kelston)

In a match marred by the conditions Kelston Boys ran out the victors by 16-11. In the first half when the conditions were near perfect Westlake played some of its best Rugby of the season to be up 11-0 at half time. Michael Stanley scored a good pushover try and M. Nicols an early try after a brilliant passing movement up the field where

most of the members of the team handled. Richard Falwasser also kicked a penalty. In the second half it was a different story. A strong wind came up very unexpectedly with Westlake playing into it. Kelston lifted its game considerably and Westlake found itself defending for the first time. A lucky 50 yard drop-kick by Kelston's half-back enabled them to get back into the game. Westlake's game dropped rapidly and the score changed till the final whistle where Kelston won by 16-11. Pick of the Westlake forwards was Geoff Ball and Steven McCulloch played his usual first-class game at fullback. Scorers: M. Stanley, M. Nicols, tries; Falwasser penalty.

WESTLAKE V THE REST

This match always turns out to be a hard-fought encounter and this year was no exception. A possible reason for this was the vying for some 1st XV positions by opposite numbers in each team. The Rest made up of teachers and pupils put up a spirited display against the XV eventually going down 11-3.

WESTLAKE V RUTHERFORD (At Rutherford)

Played on hard turf in ideal conditions Westlake was lucky to draw with the low-rated Rutherford XV. Through lack of determination and respect for the opposing XV, Rutherford were able to run Westlake into basic mistakes. Maybe the School Ball was still imprinted on the player's minds but nevertheless there was no excuse for the way the team performed. Rutherford played with the utmost dedication and capitalised on a bad pass to score their only try. The halftime score was 0-4. The second half produced no better results. Westlake subsided under pressure and the Rutherford backs were quite dangerous at times. Westlake soon got the message and was saved by a last-minute try by Chris Hunt making the final score 4-4.

WESTLAKE V ST. PETERS COLLEGE (At Westlake)

St. Peters, having just been promoted from the B Grade this season, were determined to make their promotion warranted. The two forward packs were evenly matched and it was only the determined kicking by St. Peters in the second half that gave them the good to put up the necessary points which gave them a 17-6 victory. For Westlake S. McCulloch kicked 2 penalties. If we had played with the conditions in the 1st half it would possibly have been a different result.

WESTLAKE V FAIRFIELD (At FairField)

After a long and tedious bus journey the Westlake XV had an uncertain beginning, playing 10-man Rugby in which tightheads were lost, lineout ball was fumbled and rucking was poorly executed. In the backline what ball was secured by the forwards was poorly utilised and kicks were misjudged. It was during this period that Fairfield played their best Rugby, but misdirected passes and sheer bad luck stopped them from scoring in the first half.

In the second half after a hard team talk from Mr Butt the team began to play Rugby as they were trained to, scrummaging improved, line out ball was controlled and contested for, and rucking began to produce results. The backline was rearranged and with crisper passing and harder running opportunities for scoring were on. The game ended well for Westlake with a 17 point lead which although not totally deserved was satisfying.

From that point until just before halftime the game was very even, but St. Pauls managed to score an unconverted try to give then the lead at halftime. In the second half Westlake started to take control of the game, with the forwards winning some good ball. It wasn't long before Chris Hunt was successful with another penalty goal to make the score 6-4 to Westlake. Mid-way through the second half Westlake scored again when Geoff Ball broke from a ruck on St. Pauls' 25 yard line, passed to Brett Garea who was in position to crash over for a try, which was unconverted. 





DRAMA

1973 has seen new developments in Drama at Westlake. An interested group worked with Richard Brooke exploring improvisation and movement. As this group (including David Mahon, Adrian Hart, Colin Hawkes, Glen Spurdle) worked, the idea for a production emerged. Previously, there had been dissatisfaction with competitive festivals such as that run by the Theatre Federation and the "showpiece type" major production. Hence it was refreshing to see a production in which all contributed instead of being just directed by a producer. "Son of Man" by Denis Potter formed the basis for this production - however only the basis - parts were adapted and lines modified as felt fit. The prime concern was that the cast were involved and that through them the audience would leave still thinking about what they had experienced. Once staged it was certainly different from the run-of-the-mill school play - simple set, action taking place within the auditorium, simple, stark costumes, much mimed movement. Although the whole cast was totally committed to this production mention should be made of David Mahon as a very human Christ and Adrian Hart as a simpering Pontius Pilate.

Classroom Drama has continued to be important ranging from scripted plays to improvised scenes and dialogues. Thus, while apparently a quiet year for public performances, many exciring developments have happened.

MUSIC ACTIVITIES FOR 1973

The Carol Concert for 1972 followed the trend established over the past year, in which contemporary music and pupil participation were combined to present a Twentieth Century approach to the annual Christmas Festivities. The readings for this performance were specially chosen from writers of all literary styles and periods, and included several N.Z. works. Subdued lighting and effective use of candles gave a reminder of past more traditional Carol Concerts.

The major musical activity of any year comes about when instrumentalists and singers combine efforts and talents to produce an Arts Festival. The Westlake Arts Festival is one eagerly awaited by pupils and public alike, and each year presents the ever present problem of maintainence of a high standard of performance and a variety of new and attractive works for both performers and audience. This year was notable

for the compositions by pupils - a "Song Cycle" by Adrienne Jacka, "Piece for Flute and Harpsichord" by Lyn Davis, and a beautiful song for four part choir, flute obligato, and piano, "To Mary" by Richard Bonsall. The lighter side of musical entertainment was revealed with a performance of the "Toy Symphony" by Haydn in which music-making toys were played by a team of well known soloists - staff from both schools. Additional Arts Festival features were the Westlake Chorale under the direction of Miss Rhind, and a Baroque Trumpet Concerto by Torelli with Michael Craven as soloist: accompanied by the Westlake Chamber Orchestra. The rousing chorus "Ecce Gratym" from "Carmina Burana" by Carl Orff rounded off a thoroughly enjoyable 1973 Arts Festival.

The Chamber Orchestra performed at the opening of a District Rotary Conference in March, and continued to develop in skill and technique throughout the year. The annual chamber music competitions exposed considerable talent, but the Torelli trumpet concerto was not up to the standard of other groups performing. Concerts for the Milford Harmony Club and the Library presentation rounded off a happy and enjoyable year.

Perhaps the most dramatic development on the musical scene has been within the field of band music. The Reizenstan Band grew from about 15 players to 32 and ended the year playing Carols at the request of the Takapuna City Council. After several most successful school performances, the band played twice for patients at the North Shore Geriatric Hospital, and then represented the school at the Secondary Schools' Music Festival in October. Their final official school function was the Senior Prizegiving where the evening was rounded off with a rousing version of numbers from "My Fair Lady".

The tour of Intermediate Schools by the combined orchestra, was replaced by a visit from the Band, playing well known marches and folksongs and the ever popular 'My Fair Lady' selections. New sounds from within the band are produced by newly acquired saxophones and a bassoon. The continuing success of all instrumental work in the school is due to the support given by the itinerant teachers who produce a constant stream of instrumentalists. Our thanks go to Mrs. D. Smith, Mrs. L. Davies, Mr. R. Brinsden, Mr. A. Webster, Mr. C. Ainsworth.

At the end of 1973 Mr. McGuinness leaves Westlake and after several years of playing assistance in both orchestra and band, his services will be greatly missed.

Two new features in the library this year-the Xerox copying machine and the paperback section.

The Xerox machine has had a lot of use, from both staff and students, and once the initial interest, bringing crowds of spectators everytime the green light shone and the buzzer buzzed, died down, it has fitted in reasonably unobtrusively. It perhaps breaks down a little too often, but then it is always repaired quickly; and it does not function consistently off one cent coins, which some might consider an imperfection. Nor does it produce canned samparilla, but even in the technological seventies one can't have everything.

The paperback section has been popular: here books of all types - poetry, novels, non-fiction, are bundled next to each other with no attempt at a classified order. The idea is to approach something of a bookshop appeal (although our shelving unfortunately makes cover display difficult), and encourage people to look at books and subjects they might not otherwise consider as being of possible interest to them. We hope to add two hundred or so books to this section each year,

It is good to see the Library being more widely used for activities other than reading and borrowing. The Film Club has had most of its screenings here this year; the P.T.A. have used it for a display of plans for the proposed student complex, a display of technical drawing has come over from the Technical Department, and poetry reading and music evenings have been held. We would like to see this use of the library for a wider range of cultural activities extended further.

It is necessary to thank all the school librarians who give up so much of their spare time throughout the year for the work that they have done. Not necessary as a matter of mere routine, but because, quite certainly, without them a library of this size could simply not function. Greg Pirie has been a thoroughly competent, helpful and reliable Head Librarian, and will be missed. Special thanks go to other librarians who are leaving this year.

Until fulltime Librarians are appointed to school libraries, and more adequate clerical assistance made available, so much of what a library should be doing in this age cannot be done. It is hoped that all the talk there has been over the past year about improved staffing for Libraries will lead to some action very soon. A library probably represents the single biggest financial asset in a school, and it is essential that it be properly and professionally staffed and organised.
