## HEADMASTER'S ANNUAL REPORT:

### ROLL:

The School roll at the beginning of this year was 1,035 - a figure almost unchanged now for several years, despite what was a very buoyant labour market earlier in the year. Whether present uncertainty in the business world will give us a higher retention rate for next year remains to be seen, but it is already very apparent that demands from employers for higher academic qualifications are again with us.

The third form enrolments for 1975 are 280 and this will give us the largest third form since 1968.

### EXAMINATION RESULTS, 1973:

School Certificate (candidates) gained 159 group passes from 228, a 70% pass rate.

University Entrance gained 119 passes from 170 candidates, also a 70% pass rate. John Hosking and Peter Hos gained Scholarships, and there were 23 'A' Bursaries and 25 'B' Bursaries from 75 candidates, a 67% pass rate.

All of these results represent a standard well above the National average, and reflect a very high attainment level in the School.

### STAFFING:

There will be several staff changes for next year: Mr. Salter will be overseas on leave of absence for 1975, and Mr. Matthews and Mr. Mathewson will be leaving to travel overseas. Mr. R. Smith will be moving to Christchurch, and Mr. Mitchell, Mr. Dowling and Mr. Dwyver will go on promotion to other schools. Mr. Calder and Mr. Horne will go to country service positions, and Mr. Davies to University studies.

Teachers who have been in relieving positions with us during the year and who will be leaving, are Mr. Lister and Mr. Maskell.

New teachers commencing next year are Mr. Byrne from Gisborne Boys High School, Mr. Ross from Pakuranga College, Mr. Reynolds from Mt. Roskill Grammar School, Mr. le Mesurier from Lynfield College, and Mr. Ward from Bruce McLaren Intermediate School. From Auckland Teachers' College will come Mr. Peter Rea and Mr. Graeme Bean, both ex-pupils of Westlake, and we extend to them a special welcome.

There will be two further appointments pending.

To the Staff who are leaving I would offer our Best Wishes for a successful career in the future, and to all Staff members, my thanks for another year of loyal and valued service to the School. A large majority of our students can and do look back, I am sure, with gratitude for a very successful balance between academic attainments, and a wide range of extra-curricular sporting and cultural activities which have involved most staff members in a great deal of voluntary effort.

The end of this year will mark the retirement of our Deputy Headmaster, Mr. Tweedie, after sixteen years of service to Westlake, and earlier service at Stratford, Greymouth, Northcote and Waipu, and overseas with the New Zealand Expeditionary Forces during the War.

All of this service has been characterised by a dedicated and total willingness to give of his services in all facets of school life, and the wide coverage we have been able to offer in both the curricular and extra-curricular fields owes a great deal to the leadership and enthusiasm displayed by Mr. Tweedie - if a professional attitude means leadership by example, then many of us are much richer for having worked with him. Mr. Tweedie, we wish you a long, healthy, and well earned retirement.

Mr. Tweedie's place will be filled by Mr. Charles Loretz, at present Head of Mathematics Department at Rangitoto College, who has had a wide experience in School administration.

### GROUND AND BUILDINGS:

Although no changes have taken place, the School has recently received from the Education Department the School's Development Plan which will enable further planning to proceed. This will eventually include a further six classroom block, an audio-visual room, a drama room, a manual workshop, a second music specialist room, and conversion of present facilities to give two Science laboratories, technician and laboratory stores, resource rooms, and additional office space.

The grounds are showing a gradual improvement with the drainage scheme giving at least some relief, and re-sowing is giving a better surface.

A sub-committee of the Board, P.T.A., Staff and Pupils is at present doing preliminary planning for a proposed student centre to provide additional recreational facilities and a cafeteria for the school - a project which would provide badly needed amenities to improve the quality of leisure time for our students.



#### BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Mr. Potter, the Auckland Education Board representative, has resigned after four years service which has been sincerely appreciated, and his place has been taken by Mr. O. Rutledge to whom we extend a cordial welcome.

Both Staff and Pupils are grateful to the Board for their continuing close interest and active liaison in all matters of common concern.

#### SPORTING AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES:

The School has again participated in a very wide range of sporting activities involving extensive staff supervision of weekend activities.

Honours have been gained by our Senior Rowing VIII in again winning the Head-of-Harbour Event for the sixth time in the past nine years, and several teams have gained placings in inter-school competition in other sports.

Our School Orchestra and Band have gained widespread recognition, and second place in provincial competitions during the year. The Band carried out a very successful tour of Northland Schools. Scott Colhoun gained the honour of first place in the Junior Cornet Solo in the National Bands competition.

The Business Management Team gained first place in the provincial competition, and second place in the National final.

Merit awards in the Auckland Secondary Schools' Art Exhibition were gained by Mark Hampson, and a team effort by Stephen Weaver, Lyall O'Brien and Stephen Maxwell.

In the Auckland Secondary Schools' Science Exhibition, Derek Taylor of the 7th Form won the Senior Individual Physical Science Prize. Chris Barrett was awarded the Highly Commended Technological Prize.

The Junior School earned \$2,300 for the "Save The Children Fund" during their second term fundraising, an effort which drew widespread commendation, as it resulted from productive effort rather than sponsored futilities - a new innovation which has given considerable satisfaction to a group from our senior Liberal Studies Course which has been a Community Service programme of assistance to the aged and infirm.

The Student Council organised a very well presented display and programme during Environment Week last term. It showed a mature depth of awareness and organising ability which brought favourable comment from all who were able to see it.

Time does not permit this report to give detail of a large number of other activities which form part of a well balanced educational programme, but I cannot

speak too highly of the tremendous contribution made by Staff, Parents and senior boys to these activities.

Over the past two years, the Educational Development Conference has been considering a widespread broadening of the syllabuses in Education, and much of this has been directed at Secondary Schools. In addition the Education Review Committees have been under organisation in Secondary Schools where, at professional level, teachers are to be asked for a self examination of their aims, objectives, and teaching programmes. The Minister of Education has directed that schools are to be closed for two full days for this to take place, and consequently junior classes will not be held on two days between now and the end of the year.

It would seem to me that any radical change in curriculum is unlikely while the senior work in Schools remains dominated by the external examinations of School Certificate and University Entrance. Liberal Studies programmes have met with only limited success because our students understandably give them only a second priority in their efforts, and any broadening of this programme will remain restricted while the status quo pertains.

However, much is being done, and can be extended, to give a more imaginative and exploratory approach to many areas of the curriculum. In the field of adult education our district would appear to be well served by an evening class roll greater than that of our day school, and this field is capable of further extension.

STUDENT COUNCIL REPORT - 1974.

Throughout 1974, in contrast to previous years, the Student Council seemed to adopt a more responsible attitude towards the role it plays in school affairs. Many of the trivial matters which have plagued earlier Councils were swept aside in an attempt to tackle more urgent problems such as the shortage of sports equipment, and of course student apathy. I am happy to say that by the end of the year both these problems were in fact well on the way to being solved.

This year saw the creation of an efficient sports committee which, with the aid of a \$300 grant, improved the school's sporting facilities tremendously. As this grant is to be made annually, (we hope that 1975 will see at least \$500) the future looks bright.

However, it was the Social Committee which made the most headway. Under the Chairmanship of Peter Kingett the Social Committee did much to foster inter-school ties. Apart from the usual dances, the Social Committee organised coffee evenings, weekend trips and a number of 'pop' groups for lunch-time entertainment. These have proved so popular that I would consider them an essential part of next year's social calendar. The highlight of the social scene was of course, the Ball. The Ball this year not only made a substantial profit, but was also undoubtedly the most successful in the School's history. Special thanks must be given to Mr. Nield who was the Staff overseer for this year's Ball. Without Mr Nield's wise judgement and constant encouragement the Senior Ball would not have been the tremendous success it was.

Mention must be made of Environment Week which was a project conceived and supervised by Zane Burdett. Environment Week was a display showing Man's effect on his native environment and how we can preserve what we still have.

Regular meetings were held throughout the year with the Board of Governors to discuss the most important issues put forward by the Student body. It was apparent that a greater level of understanding was reached this year between both parties, almost certainly a result of the Council's more responsible attitude referred to earlier. The most notable achievements here include optional uniform and optional attendance for 7th Formers.

Progress on the building of a Student Cafeteria was, however, disappointingly slow in getting under way, due mainly to the uncertainty of what type of facilities such a centre should provide. Nevertheless, by November much of the ground work had been completed, paving the way for the completion of the cafeteria plans some time in March or April 1975. The subsequent fundraising which will be required will create an unprecedented opportunity to bring the school closer together, thus ending forever the stigma of student apathy.



As in previous years, close co-operation was also maintained between the Students and Prefects resulting in many well organised activities such as the Westlake v Takapuna Grammar Raft Race.

To name each individual who contributed to the smooth running of the 1974 Student Council would be an impossible task; but I feel I must mention one: Mr. Lewis who is the staff member on the Student Council Executive. Mr. Lewis' sound advice and direction given throughout the year cannot be over-emphasised and I am sure that that advice and direction is by far the most valuable asset treasured by the Student Council.

## RUGBY FOREWORD.

As in 1973, nine teams represented the school in regular Saturday competition. The 3B1 team finished runners up in their grade, when Selwyn College defeated our team 6 - 4 in the final play off. This was a good effort as Selwyn didn't field a 3A side. All other teams performed with credit and if grade players concentrated on the fundamentals of the game and a higher degree of fitness, the Rugby future for the school should be bright.

The Fifteen played twenty-one games between April and August winning thirteen, drawing one and losing seven, finishing up about the middle of the 'A' grade competition. Smith who has coached Rugby at Westlake for the last nine years. He has contributed a lot to school sport - rugby in particular - and will be sorely missed. Our thanks go to these five and we wish them well for the future, also to all other coaches for giving of their very valuable time to make 1974 another good year for school rugby.

A very special thank you goes to the parents of the 1st Fifteen players, who did so much for the team. We all look forward to seeing you in 1975.

## 1st XV FOREWORD, 1974.

The 1st XV enjoyed a season of mixed success. The team showed great potential in their pre-season games with victories in all fixtures, including the defeat of eventual competition winners, Mt. Albert Grammar. ## RUGBY NOTES - 1st XV

## AUCKLAND GRAMMAR v WESTLAKE

This was Westlake's first competition game which was played in good Rugby conditions hampered only by slight drizzle in the latter stages of the game.

This was one of the XV's finer efforts in the '74 season. After much preparation, Westlake was very keen to win this game because it could have been the deciding factor in the competition. The game was very tense, fast, exciting and abrasive, played in an excellent spirit.

Auckland Grammar opened scoring in the first 15 minutes with a fine orthodox back try. The Westlake XV responded rigorously and for the next 15 minutes continually probed and broke the Grammar defence. But to no avail.

The Westlake forwards, although slightly smaller, excelled in their tasks and completely contained the larger Grammar 8 but unfortunately the backs' performance was hampered by basic handling errors and misjudgement of tackles - thus the Grammar backs were quick to capitalise on their mistakes. Play fluctuated from end to end and Grammar was rewarded with a penalty goal late in the first half resulting from a previous infringement. The score remained 7 - 0 until late in a physically demanding 2nd half. Westlake were more dominant in this 2nd half and consequently dictated most of the play - keeping the ball in front of the forwards. A few prospective scoring opportunities were lost because of handling and basic tactical errors. Westlake were finally rewarded 90 seconds from the end with a brilliant 25 yard try initiated by D. Harris who ran from a ruck and passed to Aron Heath who miraculously dived into the corner without going out. The conversion attempt was abandoned and play resumed at half way, but no score resulted. The score remained 7 - 4.

## WESTLAKE v KINGS.

This was by far, Westlake's worst performance this season. Westlake approached this game far too confidently, and consequently were soundly beaten. Played in uncomfortable conditions, Westlake elected to play with the conditions in the 1st half. Kings, from the kick-off elected to play 10-man rugby, something Westlake were not expecting.

The Kings' forward pack were far too superior for the smaller Westlake pack and it was some patchy defence that prevented Kings from running away with the game. Westlake was outdone in every facet of the game, and to add to this R. Falwasser had an unhappy day with his kicking. At full-time Kings had run out the winners by 13 - 3. A try and 3 penalties, to a penalty.

## WESTLAKE v OLD BOYS.

This game was played on Monday, Queens Birthday weekend. The 1st XV went on the field with the express intention of running the ball. The Westlake pack, although out-weighted and less experienced than their opponents, nevertheless managed to gain enough ball for the backs to run.

The Old Boys were attacking and some good work by Greg Payne, Grant Taylor and David Stanley almost saw them open their account. Westlake, however, replied with a 30 yard penalty from Steven McCulloch. The 1st half ended with Steven Rae losing the ball over the line for Westlake after determined work by forwards and backs.



The 2nd half opened with Westlake fielding a re-shuffled forward pack. Soon, however, the backs needed re-shuffling when Aaron Heath had to leave the field with a broken collar bone. Steven McCulloch moved to full-back as the Old Boys made every attempt to penetrate the Westlake defence. The defence held and Westlake ran out reserved winners over the Old Boys, 3 points to nil.

#### WESTLAKE v RUTHERFORD.

This game was played at Eden Park, No. 2 ground and was the team's first competition win of the season. The game was played in fine spirit with Westlake showing through as the superior team. Nick Scalgione scored our only try which was converted by Steven McCulloch who also kicked two penalties. This brought the score to 12 - 0. Falwasser sealed the victory for Westlake late in the second half with another penalty 15 - 3. A sterling effort by the Westlake forwards was just too much for the keen Rutherford pack. Our backs looked confident with points on the board which combined to make a good team effort. Good conditions prevailed.

#### WESTLAKE v MT. ALBERT.

This was Westlake's first introduction to wet weather rugby in the Senior 1A1 competition, and laid the foundations for probably the most successful wet weather rugby team in the grade. Although there was a strong northerly blowing in the team's favour, unfortunately Westlake got off to a bad start and went down 4 points after 5 minutes of the first half. For wet weather rugby the team was terribly loose and the Mt. Albert team was taking advantage, of the untidy ball. After 20 minutes the team was 8 points down. If the team was going to improve, the forward pack would have to tighten up, and the ball would have to be played from ground. No-one was falling on the loose ball and inevitably the Mt. Albert players were pouring through. At half-time the team was still points behind and playing against worsening conditions, but after some strong words from the Coach, Mr. Butt, the team pulled itself together and played some terrific wet weather rugby which set a high standard for the rest of the season. Playing the ball at toe, the situation had turned and now the Westlake pack pitched itself into the Mt. Albert twenty-five for the rest of the game. With bustling tactics from the loose 'trio' and the drive of the pack coming from the tight core, the Mt. Albert line was crossed several times, but only rewarded by a drop-out twenty-five or scrum. It was not until late in the game that a try was awarded to Bruce Purvis, after relentless pressure had been applied to the Mt. Albert team by the now fiery and capable Westlake pack. Unfortunately, that was to be the final score, giving Mt. Albert a lucky 0 - 4 win over an up-and-coming Westlake XV.

#### OTAHUHU v WESTLAKE.

Westlake lost this game because of the reluctance of its backline to tackle their strong opposites. This failing let Otahuhu through for two tries in the first half, one being converted. Westlake came back and dominated the 2nd half with the forwards winning a feast of possession, which the backs squandered because of bad handling and indecisive running. Westlake spun the ball well, but was only once rewarded with a try. Applying pressure, the forwards got a quick heel from a ruck. The ball sped along the line (including the fullback) to give Stephen Rae enough room to sprint in at the corner. The match was marred by some very unsavory play from the Otahuhu team. The two worst examples came from a vicious head high tackle which left Fred Schaumkel in no condition to carry on, and a blatant late tackle on Bruce Purvis which put him out for the rest of the season with a broken wrist.

#### WESTLAKE v HATO PETERA.

This was a game Westlake really wanted as they had lost all their previous games and needed a win to keep the team spirit up. As both teams took the field, the Hato Petera supporters began their customary Haka and with this over Westlake kicked off. The 1st half was very even with both sides making fundamental mistakes until about midway through the 1st half, then Hato Petera scored a good running try from their backs. With our defence split open, Hato Petera ran the ball along their backs, the left winger scoring in the corner, no conversion. Four points up, Hato Petera lifted their game and were thankfully relieved by the half-time whistle.

The 2nd half came and we were still making mistakes. Our forwards were not winning enough ball from set play and our backs could not penetrate the solid Hato Petera backline. This resulted in a good forward try by D. Hamis to Sacred Heart's sole penalty, leaving the half-time score at 4-3. A slow start in the 2nd half gave Sacred Heart some close chances but Westlake soon gathered control and precision scrummaging and rucking saw the ball spin quickly to send winger F. Schaumkel over to score 8 - 3. R. Falwasser sealed the match with a penalty and the victory of 11 - 3 revitalised the XV for later games.

#### ST. KENTIGERNS v WESTLAKE.

## DRAMA.

As well as drama within the classroom, it was felt that pupils had developed the ability to write their own plays for the major production. Hence Harry Sinclair and Richard von Sturmer wrote successful plays, very different from the ordinary.

### "CHEWING A TULIP"

At the beginning of their 4th form year, Harry Sinclair and Scott Colhoun decided to write and produce a major musical production for the Westlake Arts Festival, to be held that August. Scott Colhoun began writing the music as Harry Sinclair worked on the script, and lyrics for many of the songs. By June the play was ready for production, and with the assistance of Mr. Mitchell, Harry Sinclair started rehearsals with a group of actors. Scott Colhoun got a 5-piece band together and produced the musical side of the play.

The play centred around a series of events in the life of a pupil at Westlake Boys High School. It was a satire of New Zealand daily life, emphasizing the lack of communication, apart from the mass media, in our society. Neil Baudinet played the schoolboy, a naive character, constantly mistreated by his father, played by David Courtney. The Headmaster was played by Harry Sinclair. Dawn Holland played the boy's mother, who spends most of her time on the telephone. John McCartie and Catherine Garret took the parts of dinner guests. Kerry Wyatt played the schoolboy's girlfriend, who goes off with Bruce Fowler, as a long-haired tough. The last scene is within a church, with Roger King playing a Minister.

The play was, in terms of school productions, rather unusual because, firstly, the play was not one already written, but entirely concocted out of the minds of school pupils. Scott Colhoun's band, which played a song between most of the scenes, also made the play rather different. It was not a musical in the ordinary sense of the word, however, because none of the actors did any singing. The script itself was not along the lines of a normal play of this length as there was no specific plot, but simply a series of events, which did not lose continuity but held the audience's attention extremely well, and also put across the intended message.

A capacity crowd filled the school hall for the two performances. The audience greatly enjoyed the play and generally it was very successful. The amount of audience participation was incredible, at some points making it difficult to tell the actors from the audience.

### "A PASSION PLAY"

Being a Medieval drama of the last hours in the life/death of Jesus Christ/Everyman, and demonstrating the supreme clash between God, God's power through Jesus, and Evil, represented by a female Satan.

The play opens on the eve of Christ's suicide, through his disillusionment with life and himself. After cutting his wrists he descends to the outskirts of Hell to face the Devil, who tries to tempt him, in different ways, to come with her! Finally, Jesus overcomes Satan with the help of God and is reborn, triumphant, on the cross.

Both Medieval music and ritual were used with electronic sounds and experimental effects - lighting and dry ice.

## MUSIC, 1974.

Although unplaced in the final, the group played extremely well, and the trip to Wellington was a high point in the year's activities. The Chamber Orchestra was invited to perform as guest artists at a concert given by the North Shore Youth Orchestra conducted on this occasion by Juan Matreucci, and their programme included a double Trumpet Concerto by Petrônio Franceschini in which the soloists were Kevin Wood and Scott Colhoun. Several members of this group will be leaving at the end of 1974, and we wish them well in all their new endeavours.

The School Orchestra continues to develop its standard of playing, and although the string section diminished in size, several valuable woodwind players were recruited from families who had come from overseas.

The annual Arts Festival in August involved all music groups in both schools, and in addition, continued the trend of involving pupil compositions as a part of the musical activities. This year the highlights were a Sonata for Cello and Piano by Lyn Davis, and a composition for Cymbal and Electronic Tape by 6 Music, Westlake Boys High School. ### MR. L.E. TWEEDIE:

After 40 years of service to schools Mr. Tweedie retired in December, 1974. His teaching career involved service at Waipu District High School, Northcote College, Greymouth Technical High School, Stratford High School, prior to his appointment in July, 1958 as Deputy Principal at Westlake. His teaching career embraced mainly Mathematics, Physics and Science, except for a period from 1940 to 1945 when he served with the 2nd N.Z.E.F. in the Middle East and Italy with the Engineering Section in Radar and Radio work.

Characteristic of Mr. Tweedie's work was a thoroughness of approach to everything he undertook, and a wide extension of his extra-curricular work to coaching and administration of Soccer, Chess, School Cadets and in earlier years, athletics, swimming and cricket. One could say that he expected the same standards of dedication from those with whom he associated, both teachers and pupils, and if he had differences with any, they were based on his high and uncompromising personal standards.

Westlake farewelled Mr. Tweedie with a deep sense of gratitude for his long and dedicated service to the School. We wish him a long, active, and enjoyable retirement.



It was with deep regret that the staff, pupils and ex-pupils of Westlake Boys' High School received the news of the recent death of a staff member, Mr. David Soanes. Born in Christchurch in 1925, Mr. Soanes completed a BSc degree in physics and maths at Canterbury College.

He taught at Linwood High School, Christchurch, Queen Elizabeth High School, Palmerston North and Morrinsville College before he joined Westlake in 1961.

A year later he was appointed to the post of head of the mathematics and physics departments and later he took over additional and applied mathematics, retiring from his position in the maths department. He continued in these positions until his death from complications during a sudden illness.

A number of Mr. Soanes' ex-pupils have maintained their association with him over the years and would like to see a tribute paid to the man for his dedicated involvement in his work.

They feel it should be known that Mr. Soanes gave much of his spare time to developing equipment for an effective teaching system for his classes - in particular, the complete construction of the modular units for alternating current theory and transistor studies so necessary for senior school physics work and the modification of other laboratory apparatus to suit the constantly changing syllabus.

A notable feature of his teaching technique was his encouragement to students themselves to develop laboratory equipment. In this way the school obtained such apparatus as a linear air track, signal generators, strobe light, lab power supply, d.c. amplifiers, torsional pendulum and others, many of which would have been outside the normal purchasing ability of the school.

The students, working on these projects under Mr. Soanes' supervision, also benefited considerably by receiving a thorough grounding in the subject. Associated with this practical work, Mr. Soanes spent a great deal of his time preparing effective classroom aids such as overhead projector transparencies and problem worked examples.

The effectiveness of Mr. Soanes' teaching methods has been demonstrated by the successful performance in external examinations and later at university of many of his pupils.

The enthusiasm Mr. Soanes displayed at school carried over to his private life where he was active in the sport of fencing (he had represented two provinces in the national championships and was responsible for introducing the sport to Westlake) Chess (he was in charge of the chess club at Westlake) and badminton (in which he had also been active at school).

In addition to these sparetime activities, he cultivated at his home in Sunset Road, a first class landscape garden on a formerly clay area which would be the envy of many horticulturalists.

As a mark of respect to Mr. Soanes, Westlake Boys High School will establish a memorial fund in his honour, the proceeds of which will be used to buy physics prizes for school students. Ex-pupils and friends of Mr. Soanes are invited to support this fund with donations.
