

On the wider educational stage, this year has seen the publishing of several significant reports such as the Picot Report 'Administering for Excellence' and then 'Tomorrow's Schools' which the policy position the Government has reached following its consideration of the implications of the Picot Report. More recently we have also received the report on Post-compulsory Education and Training in New Zealand known as the, 'Hawke Report. No doubt over the next week or two there will be Principals up and down the country thundering to their audiences at Prizegivings with regard to these educational policy statements.

It would not be hard to guibble over features in 'Tomorrow's Schools,' such as the composition of the Boards of Trustees, the requirements for school to formulate charters, the redefinition of zoning, proposed recognition of teachers of 'outstanding merit', discretion on spending priorities between teaching salaries administration. Personally don't believe that we have anything to from more efficiency administration and more accountability; after all, we in schools are probably more open to public scrutiny than many organisations are at the present time anyway. Basically I believe we should approach October 1st next positively, knowing that we will cope and cope well.

There are however two areas which cause me real concern. Firstly although in many parts of all the reports there are phrases stressing the great need for equality of educational opportunity an objective I certainly agree with - I believe that with the devolution of decision making to the local level, the opposite could well be the case. Frankly, I don't believe that Westlake Boys has anything to fear in this regard. We have a very supportive and involved community with many outstanding people prepared to give the necessary time and expertise to making the school run well. 
Changes in the Staffroom


The majority of fundraising for the Arts Block was gathered at two events during the festival week; A P.T.A. Cabaret Rock 'n Roll evening and a Proms concert.







his home country Canada.

Most noticeable changes between the two countries is the educational system says Sab. 



Tramping Club


The Tramping Club started in the third term and is run by Mr Hayden and Mr Tisdall.


The first tramp was held in good weather on the 15th October and was through Goldies Bush. There was a good turnout from both the Boys and Girls Schools.





Interest in competing in outside Mathematics Competitions was again high this year. Particularly pleasing were the 159 entries for the Australian Mathematics Competition.

Unfortunately it was held at a time which almost coincided with our school August exams and only ten of our 6th and 7th formers elected to sit. All ten won certificates, 7 distinctions and 3 credits.

From the 3rd, 4th and 5ths, a further 39 distinctions and 67 credits were won by our boys. Thirteen of our students were in the top 2% of the half million competing throughout Australia and one, Gary Wong, earned the rare but coveted Prize certificate as well as coming second in the Auckland Mathex.

In all the contests they entered, Gary Wong and Neil Waldock were again placed very close to the top and together with Stephen Woodfield and David Thexton, came second in the 4th form Mathex team competition, but a new arrival, Henry Bolton, a 3rd former, joined these two with outstandingly successful performances.

Henry won the 3rd form section in the nationwide National Best Junior Maths competition from 2000 entrants, was first in Auckland from 650 entrants in the Northland Maths competition where he was competing against 3rd, 4th and 5th formers and was second in Auckland in the annual 3rd form Mathex at the Museum.

European Tour

Sixteen months of fund raising, of selling raffle tickets, chicken fingers and dance tickets, of begging and cutting firewood were over; finally the 8th December arrived and the Westlake Rugby Team's tour was under way.

A 12 hour flight and the party arrived in Los Angeles for a three day stopover. That afternoon was one of the highlights of the tour - our visit to the 'Spruce Goose'. At 7am we roused out of bed, packed up, and piled into the bus for Calais, Dover, and London - and for most of us 2 or 3 more hours sleep.
