

rounds. Central government subsidies are paid on a per capita enrolment basis - an indirect voucher system and loans are available to help families. As a result large elements of competition have developed and nearly half the parents in cities choose private schools. Competitive solutions offer the advantage to lower socio-economic groups in providing the means of improving themselves. It also means that Schools have to perform in such a way that parents wish to send their children to those schools,

If our country is to move from a low growth to a high growth employment economy, New Zealand's low education standards are not good enough. The key, I believe is never really acknowledged, yet studies highlight it time and time again - the crucial factor in student achievement is teacher quality ... and the systems and incentives that encourage teachers to perform well.

The cry was that the 'Tomorrow's' Schools reforms would "improve the quality and standards of our schools" but I don't believe that 18 months down the track there is any evidence at all of this happening. Altering administrative systems in themselves will not necessarily result in any improvement within the classroom. In fact there is possibly chalkface evidence to prove that the pace and stress of the changes have affected the quality of classroom teaching adversely.

Having said all that I have enormous faith in the goodwill of 90% of the people associated with Schools. Excellent people have come forward to work on Boards of Trustees and give so much time to help students - I do hope they will stay. Most teachers work very hard and genuinely have the good of their students at heart. If ever we need good schools we need them now as society changes and traditional family attitudes alter. Good Schools basically mean good teachers and if the system can retain and attract the right teachers the pupils will prosper despite the quality of administrative reforms.

There is no doubt in my mind that we can eventually have most efficient and accountable schools, well resourced and toeing the line to Boards of Trustees, Review Agencies and Ministries of Education. But we won't necessarily have what we really need inside them i.e. the best possible teachers to influence and help young people. Do you parents realize that very very few of the really able secondary students are opting for teaching? John Graham of Auckland Grammar recently reported and I quote 'not one Auckland Grammar leaver has gone into teaching in the last four years' Here at Westlake, if I was to ask for a show of hands right now of our 1990 Prizewinners of those intending to enter teaching as a career, I doubt whether there would be any response. The real challenge for education in the 1990s, I believe, is to change that attitude right around.

To return from the wider educational stage, two of our senior students will shortly report on the cultural and sporting sides of the schools, so I will keep my remarks very brief. Westlake is nevertheless continuing to gain quite remarkable success in a whole range of

sporting activities and this is due to enthusiastic participation and also considerable individual talent. Evidence of this came right at the start of the year at the time of the Commonwealth Games. No fewer than 7 competitors at the Games were from Westlake Boys. Current pupils - John Steel, a Bronze medalist in Swimming, Paul Amey - a New Zealand Junior rep. in the Games Demonstration Triathalon, and recent Old Boys - Kerrin Harrison and Nick Hall in Badminton, Nick Sanders in Swimming, David Wickenden in Boxing (as well as Dr McKay, the Boxing Coach) and Malcolm Cooper, Silver Medalist in Shooting. The question could well be asked, is there another School in the Commonwealth that could boast such a number?

I am hoping that the cultural side of school life is about to receive a real shot in the arm by the addition of new facilities. Most of you will have watched with interest the building, to my right, of the new Music and Drama suites. This new wing, which the Board of Trustees has been pleased to name the Harvey Thompson suite, after the first Headmaster of Westlake Boys, is almost complete and will be ready for use at the start of next year. I am sure our teachers and pupils with special interest and talents in Music and Drama will thrive on the increased space and fresh surroundings and enable this cultural dimmension to flourish in the School. At this point it is appropriate for me to acknowledge publicly the generosity and cooperation of the Ministry of Education and Mr Handas in particular in making the million dollar project a reality and also to Halstead and Adams the Architects for their full cooperation and assistance.

As our school year draws to a close I wish also to thank the various parent support groups operating within the school. The 1990 Parent Teacher Association, led by Mr John Blundell and Mrs Sharon Fordham have at all times been encouraging and supportive. This year has seen a cherished dream of the PTA brought to a successful conclusion. The \$100,000 New Canteen project is within about a week of being fully built, painted and ready to open. It is a magnificent facility, the result of much careful planning and hard work, but a Canteen with the capacity to service and fill the stomachs of thousands of future Westlake boys. Many have helped in bringing this about, but all I am sure, would want me to acknowledge the tireless service of Mrs Margaret Sutherland in coordinating the whole exercise. The PTA are called on for help on countless occasions throughout the year and we thank them for their wonderful cooperation right up to this evening where they have arranged flowers and decorations and have provided the supper to which all are warmly invited at the conclusion of this ceremony.

Mr Nicoll has outlined some of the tasks and responsibilities of the Westlake Boys High School Board of Trustees. We are extremely fortunate to have such a talented and experienced group of Trustees because the commitment of time and ultimate responsibilities of Board members are considerable. I would not wish to let this occasion pass without paying

tribute and publicly acknowledging the outstanding work of the late Mr Peter Stuart, Finance Chairman of the Board till earlier this year. The Board of Trustees has had to face changes of systems eminating from the Tomorrow's Schools procedures and have coped admirably, so on your behalf I would like to express to Mr Warwick Nicoll our Chairman, Mr Alan Yorke, our Secretary and all Board members our very sincere thanks.

To all parents, Old Boys and friends of the school by their attendance and support of Report evenings, P.T.A. meetings, remedial reading groups, assistance with new immigrants, sporting and cultural activities and prizegivings our sincere appreciation and thanks.

We would also pay tribute to our Senior Community School Supervisor, Mr Stan Tait, and his assistant Mrs Betty Pierce. Mr Tait has directed the Evening Class programme with efficiency and understanding, and I am sure many parents and boys would be surprised if they knew the extent to which our classr-



ooms, Gymnasia and Assembly Hall are in regular use in the evenings. This will be Mr Tait's final year in the Community School area and so we would wish to specially thank you, Stan, for administering so ably this thriving side of our school.

The Schools Library, Clerical, Caretaking and Grounds personnel under the direction of Executive Officer, Mr Pat Underwood have also made a most valuable contribution to the efficient and harmonious functioning of the school this year. In these days of school fires and wilful vandalism, vigilance and constant patrolling of school grounds is a must, and in this regard can I specially thank one of the real 'unsung' heroes of Westlake Mr Brian Jones, our School Caretaker.

I would also like to acknowledge once again the energy and professional commitment of the whole Westlake teaching staff and to my secretary Mrs Howe, Mr Ready, Mr Johnson and Mr Rivers in particular. The school is certainly very well served by these three experienced and very hard working senior administrators.

Finally I wish to congratulate all our prize

winners this evening and to offer our best wishes to those students who are leaving us at the end of the year.

2300 years ago Aristotle wrote 'The youth of today have no respect for their elders - they ignore their parent's good advice and treat their teachers with scorn. At the table they show no manners. They laugh loudly. They are lazy and have no thought for the future!'


The Old Boys' Award and Plaque for Head Prefect has been won by Paul Boyle.

"I did like going down to the Garden Centre".








Maybe it was the fresh air and it did not feel like school and more of the same class work.



His performance was superb and his song, "Younger Than Springtime" was delivered with style and sensitivity.




The producer apologises for the late start to this production but he was away, somewhere in the desert, with a bout of malaria.

FRENCH

GERMAN

1990 has been an interesting year for pupils learning. German with all the immense historical changes taking place in Central and particularly. Eastern Europe and with the emergence of Germany as the strongest economic power in Europe. The developments

have been avidly followed and it is to be hoped that with the increasing awareness of German influence in Europe more people will take advantage of the chance to develop closer links with Germany. The opportunities for pupils to actively further their German studies in Germany have never been better and this is borne out by the fact that three pupils from WBHS will be visiting Germany in 1991 (William Browne for 2 months, Simon Patterson for 3 months and Damon Wills for 1 year - gute Reise und viel Spass!). JAPANESE

Japanese has been growing steadily in the school with one 3rd form class in 1988, two in 1989, three in 1990 and 1991, ??. This is reflecting the growing awareness that we live in an increasingly 'international' world, and that we must in future develop an ability to communicate better with our overseas markets, especially those around the Pacific rim, Although there seem to be few openings for the pure language specialist, there are unlimited opportunities for those with other professional qualifications who also have some knowledge and understanding of the Japanese

language and culture as well. The culture is certainly very different from the European cultures and the Japanese themselves often feel misunderstood, but the growing numbers of Japanese language students are gaining insights into the culture that will help to bridge the gap and will possibly help them in their future business careers.

We have been privileged to have some Japanese nationals enroled at school this year. Jun Honma now resides permanently in New Zealand and participates in senior language classes. He has been of great assistance and also often has time to tutor boys who need extra help. Yu Sakakibara and Yukihiro Tsugane who were in New Zealand to improve their English, also joined the senior classes in Terms 1 and 2. They returned to Japan in August to prepare for University Entrance exams, and we wish them the best of luck.

In 1991, Ashley Hughes of Form 5 will go to Japan on a year's exchange through NZIIU (New Zealand Institute of Understanding). Ashley was one of ten chosen from throughout New Zealand to participate in this exchange and has a very interesting and challenging year ahead. So, Ashley, 'Omedetoo. Gambatte ne!'

Each year in November, four students are

selected at each level to represent Westlake at the Auckland Speech Competitions. In 1989,Richard Millington, as a 4th former, gained 6th = place, but he was in fact only one mark behind the 1st = placings, and a 1/2 mark behind the 3rd = placings. Well done, Richard! Taihen yoku dekimashita.

Planning and fundraising are now under way for a trip to Japan in May 1992 for the boys studying Japanese. This will include a homestay, as well as language lessons and sightseeing, and will put everything learned in the classroom into an unforgettable cultural context.

MUSIC

1990 has been a very messy year, trying to cope with the shambles created by the building of the new suite. The removal of one of the old music rooms necessitated all the gear from that room being stored in what was left of the building. 
The field will mean little to me and many others, as rain has closed it day after day. But wait until summer comes, when wood on leather will make this place my home.

SPORTS COORDINATOR'S REPORT

The year demonstrated the Schools traditional strengths in team sports and highlighted the growing international arena our sportsmen and teams compete in.

John Steel was winning a Bronze Medal in the 4X100m Freestyle relay in the 1990 Commonwealth Games as the school organized itself for Term 1. Our other representative at the Games, Paul Amey, competed in the Junior Triathlon which was a demonstration sport in Auckland. Undoubtedly we will see these two, amongst others presently at Westlake, featuring in future international competition.

The international flavour continued with visits to Australia by our Cross Country and Yachting teams. By the completion of competition the Yachting team was able to call itself Auckland, New Zealand and Inter-Dominion Champions - a distinction they share with last year's team.

Visits from Japanese Rugby teams indicated the growing appetite for this sport in Japan. Japan is a possible venue for a reciprocal visit from Westlake teams in 1991.

Chronologically the year had many highlights. Westlake dominated North Harbour Athletics and Swimming with some of our strongest teams in recent years. Our Rowing teams returned from Karapiro as Under 19 and Under 16 North Island Champions and later from Twizel as runners-up in the Maadi Cup and New Zealand Under 16 Champions.

Winter sport began with an early exchange against Kelston Boys High School. Highlight was the Moascar Cup Challenge which saw us narrowly lose this coveted trophy. Narrow losses also dominated the North Harbour Championship for the 1st XV. As top qualifier for the final round there was disappointment at not winning the Championship. This was balanced by four of our fifteen Grade teams winning North Harbour Championships. Obviously Rugby at Westlake is in good heart.

Our Soccer teams can be delighted with their year. The 1st XI battled to the Senior A title and promotion back to the Premier Division for next year. Of the ten other teams playing the Auckland competitions, four teams picked up championship titles.

Our Hockey teams continue to benefit from regular competition on the "turf" at Rosedale Park. The 1st XI took out the North Harbour Championship but would not match last years 4th place in Rankin Cup, finishing 13th.

There seems little dispute that our current Cross Country Squads are the strongest the School has seen. The Senior and Junior teams





claimed North Harbour, Auckland and New Zealand titles. The Greater Public Schools of new South Wales witnessed the ability of our runners when they took out Senior and Junior GPS titles.

Racquet sports have maintained their popularity and success. The Senior Squash and Badminton teams are both Auckland Champions and Runners-up in the National Knockout Competition. The Senior Tennis team finished Term One at the top of the Auckland Table but in term 3 succumbed to AGS in the final match.

Improvement in the organisation of Basketball has paid dividends. The Senior A team only occasionally captured the form they were capable of, but it was the 4th and 3rd Forms teams who took out the Championship titles.

By the end of Term II, sport exchanges against Kelston, Kings College, Tauranga Boys High School and Whangarei Boys High School had been completed. These exchanges continue to give our teams valuable practice and are a yardstick with which we can measure and help maintain our own standards.

Cricket opened and closed the 1990 sport year and remains popular and competitive. The 1st XI finished 7th out of 14 teams and with many fine young cricketers in our grade teams, a bright future is assured.

The year brought into focus two on-going issues.

Westlake is privileged to have so many staff who are willing to participate in extra curricular activities. The Board of Trustees have moved to give extra support to Staff contributing in this way. Trends in other schools suggest a growing resistance to extra curricular participation and Westlake is continuing to encourage and facilitate student and staff involvement.

Pressure on our sports fields, courts and other facilities continues to grow. While public amenities often have a "breather" between seasons, school facilities are being constantly used. A real effort is being made to upgrade the grass playing surfaces our teams use. A management plan has been sought and is now being followed. Hopefully similar improvements in other facilities will follow.

My best wishes to all sportsmen leaving Westlake. I hope you take fond memories of your time here with you and expect to see your skills, commitment and sportsmanship reflected in the wider communities' clubs, representative and National teams.





YACHTING

After the efforts of last year's team, we thought that it would be a hard act to follow.

Our goal for this year was to win the National contest without losing a race. We once again went through the round robin undefeated, and progressed through the finals until we had won the National title. However we still had one race to complete, the finals, which we lost to our old rivals Macleans College, it had no bearing on our result but affected the minor placings.

Before going to the Nationals in New Plymouth we had to sail in the Auckland Championships, which was basically Fleet racing. Westlake completely dominated this regatta winning six of the seven trophies at the contest. We lost the seventh trophy on a simple Port/Starboard incident.

Once again our stiffest opposition came from Rangitoto College in the zone finals. After the zone finals the team settled down to some regular training off Milford. Over Easter I took a group of three boys to Lake Macquarie which is just north of Sydney. Robert Cleghorn, Andrew Pardington and Brent Goldsworthy spent five days racing in the New South Wales Combined High Schools Regatta. Sailing borrowed Lasers, the trio sailed well under some unusual conditions. Robert sailed consistently to finish third, Andrew unfortunately could not sail on one day due to illness, otherwise he would have been well up also.

It was an interesting trip which gave me a chance to watch the "Pacer" dinghy sailing and observe the conditions in the area where the Westlake team would sail, if we won the National Contest in the May holidays. I was also able to meet some of the locals and see first hand the facilities available. This certainly made the trip to Australia for the Inter-Dominion contest a lot easier and took a lot of the tension out of the contest.

Lake Macquarie is the largest salt water lake in the Southern Hemisphere. The lake is fairly shallow with a maximum depth of 11 metres. The small channel which leads out to the ocean is also shallow and a few of the larger yachts are trapped in the lake, which has an area similar to Lake Taupo, with lots of bays and lovely anchorages particularly, in the southern end.

Whilst I was there at Easter, I was able to see first hand the tremendous damage caused by the earthquake in Newcastle, a short distance from Belmont. The earthquake received very little publicity because very few people were killed, but if the bus drivers had not been on strike a lot more people would have been killed as the verandah over the main bus terminus came down. Fortunately the city was almost deserted at the time. It is going to take several years to completely repair all of the damage caused by the quake.

The Belmont 16ft Sailing Club is an interesting place, they have 12,000 members, only 200 of these are sailing members who are in control of the club. The rest of the members who generate a turnover of \$A21 million per year via the bars, restaurants and gambling machines are social members. Membership for the club is \$7 per year. The sailing members have a budget of \$A200,000 per year, unfortunately very little of this goes to the

junior members. I couldn't help thinking "imagine what we could do at our yacht club in terms of training for juniors". The senior sailing members who sail a handful of 16ft skiffs which cost up to \$30,000 each are paid to start, more to finish and even more if you win.

Unfortunately for the Australians they have too many different classes and virtually no monotypes. At the Easter Combined High Schools Regatta there were over 40 different classes of yachts.

REPORT

This year has been a most disappointing one for a team that looked to have the ability to end near the very top of the schools' competition but from the outset they failed to achieve anywhere near their potential. A very strong batting line-up that looked as if it could go on forever, never got it together so that the bowling attack was always under pressure to keep the team in the game and this it did very well. The XI ended up in the bottom six of the competition for the second time this decade but the sceptre of relegation has been hopefully dispelled by two "coming right" wins following upon a promising performance in the traditional match against Tauranga Boys College.

The season got off to a less than promising start when we decided to bat first on a wet but fast drying pitch at Kings against a very good pace attack that got us on the rack early and never let us off. Kings played very well and put together an excellent performance to record their first win against us for years. The bowling attack wrecked Rangitoto College but then the batting got a good dose of the "jitters" against a competent slow left-armer who reduced us to the pushing and poking that wiped us out against Kelston back in the ------- for 100 but then we were wiped out on a "turner" by our own unwillingness to take the attack to their off-spinner. Foot-behind on the crease line, that is where we died for 51.

We needed to win against Rosmini to make the top six but the batting always struggled against an accurate medium pace attack that kept on keeping on.

The bottom half of the schools competition is characterized by teams that seek to win the toss and then set about batting as long as they can to ensure that they are not beaten. They never set out to win but rather to avoid losing and this was certainly the case in the matches against St Peters and Sacred Heart both of which ended mid way through the second day of the match with no possibility of an outright result because the first day had been so slow.

Tauranga Boys match was an opportunity to encourage the batting attack to adopt a more positive attitude and get it all together. From the outset we always had the initiative, a couple of declarations keeping the match alive but an over worked bowling could not finish them off to record an outright win.

None of the batting attack had a good year as evidenced by the aggregates but some had a depressing season. Rick Pierce had a year with the bat to forget forever but fielded as well as ever in the gully. Dean Parker found what can happen when you get on the front foot and scored a very sound 68* against SHC as a result. His spare parts bowling will be very handy next year. This should have been Matthew Reinholds year but an unlucky ankle injury kept him out until late March and how he was missed when he showed what he could do on an excellent batting track at SHC and took 107 off a very accurate attack. It was a

superb innings of a quality rarely seen at this level of cricket.

Paul Boyle captained the team with a rare maturity and kept his head when others were losing theirs! He played several vital, gritty innings to keep the batting together and it was never over until Paul was out. He is a most polished 'keeper, a clear thinker, very cool under pressure, an outstanding leader.

Andrew (Bacco) Buckton played every game as if it was to be his last. His well directed medium pace kept all batsmen under heavy pressure and he well deserved his 24 wickets in the first half. Bacco has scored less with the bat than he would have wished but he has had a great year for the XI.

Phil Anderson's leg-spinners bored holes in the head of every batsmen in the grade, his removal of the Kelston captain being a case in point, but he never managed to grab the big wicket bag of last year. He too played a couple of very good innings with the bat as against Rangitoto but his refusal to believe he can bat has resulted in under-achievement in this aspect of his game.

Kim Struthers' left-arm quicks have always had the batsman under pressure. He bowled very well against Rosmini and certainly showed a better return. Kim's hitting power never had a chance because he always seemed to come in when the team was on the defensive. These two have been the team adhesives who make everyone smile when the cricket is tight.

Richard Burgess' cricket has matured as the year has gone on, his 34 against Rosmini saving us all from acute embarrassment.

Shaun Perkinson joined late when the shortage of runs had to be solved. A batsman with a superb 'eye' he can tear any bowling attack to shreds in a very short time as he showed us against Tauranga but he has the ability to concentrate for long periods and build an innings as shown to outstanding effect against St Peters when he scored 61 very sound runs. Richard and Shaun will be the backbone of the team next year.

Glenn Morland and Scott Francis will look back on their introduction to 1st XI cricket and see it all as a bad dream. They are both very talented players but had to bat at critical moments in many games when the top of the batting had gone for too few runs and the team was struggling - a situation few would wish to bat in. Glenn has bowled well and kept a good line while Scott's 'keeping was superb when Paul was away. A tough start for both of them but they have the character to survive. Paul Hitchcock is a medium pacer of real promise and given the opportunity will show his real class as an opening batsman next year.

We hope to finish the season with some good wins in the future.





Ranging from third to sixth formers, the group had no trouble completing each tramp even though getting lost on occasions.


Mrs Rolls, an experienced tramper herself, joined the group for the occasional trip and proved fitter than some of the others in the group.

Meeting during Wednesday sports period, the club decided where to tramp that weekend and organize it during that time. Sometimes deciding where to tramp is a task in itself.


Unfortunately there was no tramping during the winter because Mr Tisdall was involved in hockey, but even though, the club covered a lot of ground during the summer.

The Tramping Club started in 1988 and could quite easily be one of the most gruelling sports at Westlake.



Thanks to tournament coaches Ian Gunthorp and Mike Ramsay whose expertise was greatly appreciated.



It would be very easy to be disappointed in this years results, coming as they do after a couple of championship winning years, and a very successful tour to Canada and the USA in December, but really that would not do justice to this years team.

Our first game, and loss, was a pre-season fixture, curtain raiser to the North Harbour v Western Samoa game, and gave a rather accurate forecast of how the season was to progress. Westlake started strongly and dominated throughout the game. At half time we lead by 10-0 after a fine try and a couple of well kicked penalties. In the second half, in spite of continuing to dominate, we failed to capitalise on our many opportunities, missing several kicks at goal, and eventually lost 10-12. This then really was the story of our season a series of games in which we dominated, but failed to score.

The big game for the season came very early the day after Easter in fact, when we defended the Moascar Cup against Kelston Boys High School. Played in rain on a wettish field, we looked good in the first half, taking the lead with an early penalty, then missed a couple of kicks, before giving away a penalty, and going to half time equal at 3-3. The second half started disastrously when we let Kelston in for a soft try, but we recovered well, spending the rest of the game in the Kelston half, and much of it on their try line. We played this half very

much in the forwards, but in spite of crossing their line several times we never managed to force down for try. Right on full time, Kelston managed to break out, and raced the length of the field, to seal the game for them at 15-3. We were left to reflect on what might have been, but full credit must go to the Kelston defence for repeatedly keeping out attacks by Aaron Brewis, Travis Vincent, Simon Farland, and Blair Johnson.

The first round of the North Harbour Secondary Schools competition saw us winning our games comfortably, although the score did not always indicate this, and we did not always play particularly well, but the second round was a different story. After a 3 week break from games, the result of a default by Takapuna Grammar, and the sevens championship, we met Takapuna Grammar in the first of games of this round. Again we started strongly, but after missing two successive penalties from close to the posts, our game went to pieces. Takapuna Grammar kicked most of their possession away to us, but we did little with it, and then made mistakes at vital times, which Takapuna converted into points. We eventually lost 9-3, the first time for many years that we had lost to this school.

After a couple of well deserved but unspectacular victories over traditional rivals Rosmini and Hato Petera, we were beaten narrowly by Kaipara College (again) after the referee claimed he was unsighted twice when we scored, soundly beaten by Rangitoto College, a lethargic display - the after effect of the school ball, and then went down 4-6 to Northcote College after a poor performance by us.

We fared little better in our inter school fixtures, losing to Kelston Boys, Kings College, and Tauranga Boys College, beating Whangarei Boys, and drawing against Matamata College. We did however beat St Kentigerns College, and draw with Manurewa High School in the Rainbows End tournament to retain the trophy which we have held since the inception of this tournament.

Our biennial trip to the South Island this year by-passed Christchurch, as Shirley Boys were unavailable to play us, and instead we visited the deep south, playing Southland Boys and Verdon College in Invercargill, and Kings High in Dunedin. We lost narrowly to both Southland Boys and Kings and beat Verdon. Southland Boys and Kings High were the two South Island schools to play in the national "Top Four" tournament, so we were rather pleased with our performances against these two teams - with a little luck we could have beaten each of these teams.

The 1st XV hosted two overseas teams during the season, and in many respects these were our best performances. At mid term break we were visited by Brisbane Boys College. As is usual for this time of the year the weather was poor, and the game was played in what could rather accurately be described as a sea of mud. In spite of this we passed the ball with confidence, ran strongly, and shut out the much bigger Australians who never really came to terms with the conditions. Towards the end of July we hosted the champion Japanese school team from Fushimi Industrial High School. Again the field was muddy, but again our ball handling and running was superb, and for a change our gaol kicking was accurate, and we won 29-3.

In the past the Old Boys game has tended to be a 'graveyard' with our players struggling to come to terms with the older and more experienced opponents. This topsy turvy year however, we were in danger of winning for most of the game, showing a real commitment to team effort, but were pipped at the end to lose 38-32. Again this game was played in mud - ironically the only games we played on a hard ground were when we were in the South Island!

One further highlight of the season was the return visit to Westlake by the Nantymoel Youth Team from Wales. This was a club that we visited on our overseas tour in 1987-88, and we were pleased to be able to repay some of the hospitality they accorded us. It was an opportunity for many of the players who went on that tour to once again play together again, and against many of the boys we played against in Wales.


