Chairman's Address

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, it is my pleasure to welcome you to the Senior Prizegiving and present this report of our activities during 1994.

We live in a world of changing technology and must be prepared to give our students the opportunities to experience these technological changes and learn an adaptability which will be such a useful asset in their lives.

The Board was pleased to see the usage made of the new computer facility which became operational in February. For the staff it was a challenge to which they rose admirably.

This was an attempt by the school to change the emphasis from the teaching of computer studies to the use of computers in the various subjects. For reasons of cost effectiveness and security, the computers needed to remain within designated classrooms but these were bookable by teachers so they could become their classroom for that period. It is pleasing to note that the rooms were fully booked with a demand for even more availability.


With this in mind, the Board asked the staff and their computer committee to come up with plans for further developments in 1995. The Board has budgeted \$60,000 for this exercise and at this stage it would seem that there will be a further computer room available next year, as well as a new technology centre where specialised equipment such as scanners can be housed and used to complement the teaching of various subjects.

This will mean that in 1994 and 1995 this school will have spent a quarter of a million dollars in upgrading its computer based technology. This money has largely come through the school's own efforts. The boys have held two very successful workdays and almost all of the parents have contributed their school fees.

Along with computers, the most exciting project for this year has been the planning of a technology centre. The education authorities are considering a new technology curriculum and this school has made submissions on its content. However it's the belief of the staff and the Board that to adequately teach in a changing environment, we need to adapt some of our classroom areas and add some purpose- built space. With this in mind, the D block area has been looked at and the Board has commissioned Halstead and Adams to come up with plans and costings based on the initial staff ideas.

We then hope to take this concept to the Ministry of Education and the Minister, suggesting that Westlake Boys High School should pilot some of these changes. Webelieve this school has the academic record, the enthusiastic and capable staff and the right environment to lead in these changes.

The emphasis of my report to you tonight has been on technology and its relevance to our boys. However, we recognise the importance of a complete



education and it is pleasing to report that music, drama, art and sport have continued to flourish within the school.

Please read your copy of the school magazine when your son brings it home. I am constantly surprised at the variety of activities reported in the magazine. It shows the high percentage of boys who take advantage of these activities and also those who excel.

We see community education as an important part of Westlake's responsibility. Ken Simpson and all of the Community Education staff provide a varied and challenging range of educational opportunities. One of his innovations this year was to offer 15% discount to fee-paying parents of Westlake Boys.

The school has liaised with two businesses this year and would like to thank Adis Press and Turners Auctions for the opportunities which they gave our boys. Adis offered staff training, a seminar for senior pupils and an opportunity for a group of pupils to have hands on experience in putting together a publication in response to a client brief. The Board was most impressed with the professionalism and obvious enthusiasm with which Adis approached the project. The success of these liaisons will be analyzed and hopefully strengthened and expanded in 1995.

Next year you will elect a new Board. Many on the current Board will retire and I would urge you to consider standing for the Board and contributing to the Westlake tradition.

All the Board members have worked hard this year and I know their main satisfaction comes from seeing a school which runs smoothly, efficiently and successfully. The Board would like to thank the Headmaster, Colin Pascoe, who sets the tone for the whole school, our senior management, all our staff and the boys themselves. I would personally like to thank Colin and Alan York, the Board secretary. Their efficiency and good humour make my task as Board Chairman very easy.

This year we farewell one of our senior staff members, Mike Stanley. The Headmaster and others tonight will pay tribute to Mike. However the Board would like to thank him for his hard work, inspiration and enthusiasm. We hope that he won't be lost to teaching and we see this as a career move where he gains more experience. We hope that someday a position may come up at Westlake and we can entice him back.

The Board has a staff travel award which enables one of our teachers to travel overseas and study trends within their particular teaching interest. This year the staff travel award has been won by Mr Russell Brooke, Head of the Music Department.

Music is a special dimension in any school and Westlake Boys is very fortunate in the quality of music we experience. Russell has made very good use of the new facilities we have for music and drama and this travel award will give him the opportunity to visit Australia next year and bring back new ideas to enhance our music programme.

Tonight sees the end of a successful year for everyone involved with Westlake Boys High School. Some will gain prizes as a reward for their success. Your Board and the staff recognise the efforts of all pupils. It is because of this effort the Westlake tradition of excellence continues.

On behalf of the Board, we wish all those boys leaving Westlake success, and trust that their efforts are always rewarded.

To our visitors, staff, parents and boys we wish you a Merry Christmas, a restful and peaceful holiday and a New Year which you find stimulating and challenging.

Headmaster's Address

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen and Senior Boys of the School. It is a great pleasure for me to be associated with Dr King's opening words of welcome at this our 1994 Senior Prizegiving.

In presenting this Annual Report, I am sure you will soon agree that in this, the 33rd year of the School, there is much of which we can all feel very proud. The school roll rose again this year to an all-time high of over 1400 pupils. The increase of well over 300 boys over the past eight years may be viewed as a positive assurance of the demands for a 'Westlake' style of education on the North Shore.

In addition we welcomed back Mr Rob Noble
from teaching overseas, and were also very
grateful for the assistance of several teachers
in a relieving capacity like, Mr Simon Neal,
Mrs Susan Biggs, Mr Trevor Viljoen and Mrs
Heather McDonald.

Mr John Goldsbury was on leave during 1994, while there were several other changes during the year. Mrs Kaye Dalzell, from our main office, accepted a position at the new Massey University, Albany at the end of Term 1 and has been replaced by Mrs Sally York. Mr Mike Jones, an enthusiastic young Science teacher and sports coach left towards the end of Term 2 to teach in an International School in Indonesia. Mike has been replaced by Mr Chris Rein, an experienced teacher from South Africa. Mr Andrew Binnie, our Computer Support worker, also resigned during Term 3 and has been replace by Mr Brendan White.

Tonight we farewell one of Westlake's outstanding teachers - Mr Mike Stanley. Westlake's loss is Rowing's gain, as Mike has recently been appointed the Executive Director of the New Zealand Rowing Association. As our Sports Coordinator, a teacher of Senior Geography and as the driving force behind our Rowing Club, Mike Stanley will be sadly missed. We congratulate Mike on his significant appointment and thank him for his wonderful contribution over the past six years. I have asked Mike to speak to us during the sporting section of our Prizegiving and to present the Sports Awards. It would be my hope that on some future occasion he can be encouraged back into the teaching profession.

With an all up staff of nearly 100 we are veryfortunate with the stability of the staff here at Westlake and thank this dedicated and committed group for their loyalty and diligence.



End of year Prizegivings are a time to reflect back on the achievements of the previous twelve months. One of the first jobs we do at the start of each year is to analyse the previous year's Public Examination results and we were delighted with many very creditable performances. Outstanding results came from Nicholas Rattenbury, last year's Dux, and two boys from Form 6, Darren Hooks and Philip Kong, and these three names have been added to the Honours Board at the back of this Assembly Hall, for having achieved a level equivalent to the Scholarship winners of the past. For a sixth form boy, Philip Kong - to score the highest marks in New Zealand in Bursary Chemistry, 97, is a remarkable achievement for both the student and his teacher. There were 69 'A' Bursaries, 67 'B' Bursaries and 46 subject scholarships gained from Form 7.

At the sixth form level most students were in-

volved in the internally assessed 6th Form Certificate, but a pleasing number of boys took part in the Combined Schools Examinations.

School Certificate is the goal of 5th Form students and the first real academic hurdle. Special commendation must be given to David Song, Matthew Brown, Saul Parkinson, Richard Hickman and Michael Hudson, who achieved the top marks for Form 5 in School Certificate. Sadly however, each year there are a group of students who don't seize the opportunities of supportive homes, able and experienced teachers and an encouraging educational environment, and despite the advice of so many, it comes as a real shock to some of them when they hear from prospective employers that the world doesn't in fact, owe them a living. Over the next ten days our senior students undertake the 1994 Public Examinations and my hope would be that they could achieve to the best of their individual abilities, for noone fails if they have reached the best standard they are capable of.

Top boys in the 4th Form are invited to sit School Certificate in Mathematics and Science. When they receive marks like
Tony Kong - Mathematics 98, Science 96
Alex Whitworth - Mathematics 96, Science 91
Daniel Meikle- Mathematics 97, Science 90
I think one can reasonably assume that it is not taxing them too badly!

The encouragement of academic excellence was highlighted again this year by the presentation of Scholar's Ties to those students who met the stringent academic criteria. This year we were honoured to welcome back Mr Jonathan Cain, Head Boy of 1987, and a new member of the Board of Trustees, who spoke in a very encouraging way to the Senior As-

sembly and then made the presentation to the 24 students who had reached the required standard.

1994 has witnessed further change in all areas of education, with even more to come. With 'Tomorrow's Schools' more and more decision making and responsibility for managing schools has passed to the local level. This has probably brought more gains than losses - we have increased flexibility, we are more responsive and accountable, we have a greater community and parental involvement in schools and we have had to develop a mission, goals and objectives which have given schools a vision and a direction.

Most of the key administrative changes are hopefully in place now, and the focus has now turned to curriculum and qualification reforms. The School Curriculum is in the process of being completely re-written. New curriculum statements have been launched for Mathematics and Science and are beginning to be implemented in the classroom. Draft curriculum statements for English, Technology, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Spanish and Chinese are out for consultation, while work continues on drafts for Maori, Social Studies and Samoan, The new New Zealand Curriculum will also be supported by new assessment procedures to monitor student progress against its learning objectives. The Government's qualifications reforms and the new tertiary qualification - the National Certificate - will be progressively phased in over the next three or four years. The aim is to produce a 'seamless' education system. The whole process may well challenge schools to an even greater extent than the devolution and administration. The latest glossy is called "Education for the 21st Century", just to 'keep us on our toes'.

As you can see the education sector is in the business of implementing a sometimes bewildering array of innovations and policies simultaneously. Such changes inevitably threaten existing interests and routines, heighten uncertainty and increase complexity.

While schools have a major role in helping our students to achieve academic success, I am increasingly convinced that to facilitate this success, families must become more committed to the education of their children; they must also instil a respect for education and create within the home an environment conducive to learning.

Part of this involves improving student motivation and removing the apathy that afflicts an increasing number of students inevery secondary school. For schools even to attempt this is an incredibly difficult task but in my mind many government policies over the past decade have worked unwittingly against the best interests of learning. Some of these practices (e.g. automatic progression through school, elective school curriculums, watering down syllabi, removing examinations) have allowed students to evade difficult academic tasks or undermined the need to make an effort. I have absolutely no doubt that such changes as the undeniable lowering of the Uni-

versity Bursary examination standard, less rigorous curricula and course content, reduced course requirements were all well intentioned steps to boost the educational progress of the country's less able students. However, they seem to me to have been counter-productive by making it easier for students to avoid hard work and difficult courses. Self esteem must follow, not precede, real accomplishment.

Schools and the school system are clearly in flux, but we at Westlake must endeavour in the midst of all this confusion to provide a positive learning experience for our students in a caring environment that stresses effort, commitment and hard work.

A recurring theme in recent years is that schools cannot any longer isolate themselves from the world around them. Currently there seems to be a readiness in the community to encourage schools and businesses to work together more closely in a partnership to achieve positive outcomes for both parties. This is a refreshing breakthrough which brings into focus the African proverb 'it takes a whole village to raise a child'.

This year Westlake Boys became involved in two very promising partnership programmes—with Adis International and Turners 1 Auctions. We would like to express our grateful thanks to both these organisations for their excellent cooperation in assisting groups of Westlake Boys. One year ago tonight Mr Paul Ferner was named to receive our Staff Travel Award for 1994. He used this travel award to visit the West Coast of the United States to observe the school/business partnerships and came back with many interesting ideas which may be useful for us to investigate in the future.

To return from the wider educational stage, two of our senior students will shortly report on the cultural and sporting sides of the school, so I will keep my remarks very brief - the MacMillan Centre provides a focus for Music and Drama in the school. Both these areas of the school are flourishing, thanks to the time and effort provided by the staff and the talent


and enthusiasm of the students. Some excellent work emerges from our Art Department, while it is always a pleasure when our Senior Debaters are able to out-talk our lady friends from down the hill! 1994 has been a superb year for Westlake sport! Indeed, I think we could reasonably ask the question; is there another school in New Zealand which has enjoyed so much successthis year in such a range of sports as has Westlake Boys?

The Senior Prizegiving is an appropriate time for me to thank publicly the various parent support groups operating within the school.

I am sure as you were listening to Dr King earlier on this evening, you would have realised how fortunate we are here at Westlake with the talent and experience of our Board Chairman and indeed this would also be true for all our Board of Trustees members. The commitment of time and ultimate responsibilities of Board members are considerable and so on your behalf I would like to express to Dr King, Mr Allan York - our efficient and hard working secretary, and all Board members our sincere thanks.

Early next year elections will be held throughout the country for Board of Trustees for all schools. This is a vital avenue of community service and I would ask that parents who will have boys in the school over the next few years to give the question of standing for the Board their careful consideration.

The 1994 Parent-Teacher Association has been led by Mr Stuart Vaughan and Mr Grant Stewart. The PTA has at all times been encouraging and supportive, and I would like to thank them for their excellent cooperation on so many occasions right up to this evening when they have provided the supper to which all are warmly invited at the conclusion of this ceremony. A special feature of the work of the PTA is the operation of the Trading Post which provides a valuable service in selling good quality second hand uniforms. As this will be her son's final year I would particu-

larly like to thank Mrs Bridget Crawford for her tireless work with the Trading Post and to thank her for many years of support with the PTA.

Apart from the Board of Trustees and the PTA I wish to place on record my very grateful thanks to parents who approach us quite regularly with gestures of goodwill and encouragement. To all those helpful parents, Old Boys and friends of the school by their attendance and support of report evenings, remedial reading groups, assistance with new immigrants, sporting and cultural activities and Prizegivings, our sincere appreciation and thanks

We would also pay tribute to Mr Ken Simpson our Senior Evening Class Supervisor, his assistant Mrs Betty Peirce, and to all our tutors for operating very efficiently a wide range of Community Education classes which we know are greatly appreciated by the wider Westlake community.

The Westlake library, clerical, cleaning and grounds personnel have made a most valuable contribution to the school this year. We would also record a very sincere vote of thanks to Mr Brian Jones, our PropertyManager, who has the massive task of caring for our school after hours. I can assure you that in these days of school fires and vandalism, people like Brian Jones are 'worth their weight in gold'.

I would like to acknowledge once again the good humour and professional commitment of the whole Westlake teaching staff and to my secretary Mrs Jan Howe, our office staff and our three strong and experienced senior administrators, Mr Ian Ready, Mr Don Johnson and Mr Brian Rivers, my very sincere thanks.

Finally I wish to congratulate all our prize winners this evening and to offer our best wishes to those who are leaving us at the end of this year.


2300 years ago - Aristotle wrote:

Head Boy's Address

Mr and Mrs Pascoe, Dr and Mrs King, guests, staff, parents and fellow students.

How do you review five great years in less than five minutes?

My time at Westlake actually began back in November 1989, when Mr Ready ended a meeting with my father on an out-of-zone entry application by saying - "he seems a promising lad - we'd be pleased to have him join us". Thank you for taking that gamble Mr Ready.

I know that for me that gamble has certainly paid off, as I could never have imagined that five years later I would be addressing you all this evening.

We all start our secondary schooling with a mixture of anticipation, excitement and confusion, but for me that first day was pure fear. My family had just moved from Levin, I knew no one and the sheer size of the school was overwhelming. I need not have worried, as within a couple of days

I had become friends with a great group of classmates, many of whom have remained close friends throughout the years here.

This tone of excellence has been perpetuated throughout all that we have achieved in the school. Culturally speaking, we students have definitely outdone ourselves this year.



The Old Boy's Award and Plaque for Head Prefect goes to Bryan Bothwell.


As you have already seen and heard Westlake Boys boasts many outstanding young men so to be chosen as Head Boy and to perform those duties remarkably well is an honour in itself.



This has meant that students have been able to look for both fiction and some non-fiction books by entering the title, author or just a subject. This has made it far easier to research a topic or just find a book by your favourite author. A multi-media computer has also been added recently. Students are able to borrow a variety of CD's such as the TVNZ Encyclopedia and the World Book and research their topics. Attached to this computer is a printer that the school was awarded for its efforts in the "Apples for Students" campaign run by Foodtown. This will enable students to print out information they have found for use in assignments and research. Although this has only recently been introduced, it has proved very popular. Thanks to Mrs Brown who was the co-ordinator of the Apples for Students campaign for this addition.

Thanks should also be given to the group of people who have nothing better to do with their lunchtimes than hang around in the library - the student librarians. Despite that fact that many are only in it for the warmth in the winter, and the free lunch with Mr Pascoe at the end of the year, we have had a good group of student librarians this year, many of whom were also involved in other school activities. Three librarians were involved in the school show, and Evan Short managed to take time out from fame, fortune and his successful rock band to do his duty every week. Also deserving a mention is Adrian Kwan who "volunteered" to take care of the school flag which is mounted on the library roof.



Technology

The library would not be able to function every day without the efforts of the two librarians, Mrs R Neary and Mrs L Noble. Their tireless efforts have ensured that the library runs efficiently and purposely. As well as this they have also worked tirelessly to continue updating the books on the database. We are also grateful for the assistance of Miss A Burney, the Teacher with library responsibilities who has done battle with those wanting to use the library to hide from the rain and also learn to use the new technology. Mr Williams and Mr Overend have also helped by giving up their lunch hours to supervise the library and to keep the unruly mob under control. Without the support of all of these people the library would not be able to provide the service to the school that it does.

In the coming year the library can look forward to more changes and improvements. Death of a Salesman

We liked it, we kept it, we loved it.
It worked! It worked for us.

This year, the surprising choice for the major combined production was Arthur Miller's Death of a Salesman. Potential cast members were at first shocked by the choice of a straight play instead of the traditional musical, but most were almost immediately won around by the potential of this powerful work, and the opportunity it gave us to find a show that allowed us to show our ability as actors. There are very many able actors in the two Westlake schools, who have not been given the chance to exhibit their acting talents, because they are not singers. For example, two of the best actors in either school are Monique Jonas and Mandie Gillette. For many years, Monique has slaved at set building and decoration because she is committed to the performing arts. Mandie has always been confined to the back row of the chorus despite her many professional television appearances. The choice of a straight drama allowed both Seventh Formers the starring role they had long deserved and long been denied. It was the best role either had ever played and was emotionally very challenging. For this reason alone, the choice of play was well justified. We also came to realise the benefits to be gained from re-organising the two school orchestras into one, the huge logistical exercise that prevented the Westlake Schools from mounting a full musical in 1994.

Rehearsals were long, tiring, but fun. There was the incident when James Hancox attempted to make Mark Wells a permanent part of the set with a staple gun. The play also required the smoking of cigarettes on stage. No one (cough cough) was allowed to inhale. Twins, Iain and John Stephenson were cast as Biff and Happy. The crew would not have been complete without the techies: James "the flash" Bell, Glen "the Greek Adonis" Winchester, Greer "Is there anything I can do?" Cullum and Garth "I want to join the army" Barnes

Traditions! Slushies, Big Macs, Placemakers, Minty Awards, Tyler's fleet of cars, the show spawned them all. Given a break for five minutes, the cast would turn up twenty minutes later, clutching a mound of crushed ice flavoured with preservative 205, 391 and 456, and decidedly more hyperactive than usual.

A dramatic production naturally acts as a magnet for some of the bigger personalities in any school, and *Death* was no exception.

Newcomer to a major role, Evan Short played Bernard and understudied Howard. In his one night on stage as Howard he played the role with tremendous authority, something not unexpected given Evan's serious approach to rehearsals. In fact, Evan's approach to just about everything was intensely serious, including setting off smoke alarms and noise complaints at the final cast party!

Mark Wells made the leap from boy soprano in Oliver to the nerd Bernard in stylish fashion. Rarely has anyone set the Westlake Girls assembly alight simply by saying the phrase, "Hi, I'm Bernard, and I play the nerd!"

Discoveries of the year were the two actors who played Willy Loman, Ivor Wells and Simon Vincent. Simon's approach to the role was intense and intelligent, but perhaps the palm for detail, believability and sheer talent would have to go to Ivor, who became Willy Loman the moment he put on his wire framed spectacles and red brocade waistcoat.

The role of the Boston Woman was played by Carlene Perris and Miriam Knight, headPrefect of the girls' School. We will be sorry to lose both of these Seventh Formers, who have given so much to both schools in the last four years.

Credit must be given to Mandie Gillette for her performance as Linda, the long suffering wife of the salesman. Mandie's commitment and courage resulted in excellent performances despite a lengthy and serious illness that handicapped her during much of the rehearsal process. Monique Jonas, who also played Linda is another natural actor, whose sense of detail, intense involvement in the role, and natural sympathy resulted in a very mature, sympathetic and powerful interpretation. Monique's good humour, warmth and professional attitude were an inspiration to all of us.

Others who must be mentioned for their sheer hard work and memorable performances were the two actors who played Uncle Ben. It is always difficult

to play someone who has been dead for two weeks but James Hancox and Brendon Patterson managed superbly! James' stage presence and Brendon's sheer hard work and eventual authority in the role must be mentioned. Other people to watch out for in the future are Kate Scott, and Jenny Millar and their feather boas.

Above all, we would like to thank Cameron Deyell. Cameron leaves Westlake next year as his family is going to Adelaide. He will be a loss. Not only did Cameron write every note of the music, and, under the guidance of Mr East, train the band, Cameron also acted as Musical Director throughout the show. His very real cool and professionalism inspired us all, and opened the eyes of our directors.

Finally, we would like to thank all of the staff who gave of their time and wore out their patience on us: Mr Holloway, Mr East, Mrs Roxborough, Mr Brooke and Miss Jennings, whose sickness prevented her from doing more than beginning the rehearsal process. We are glad she is better. Better luck next time, Miss Jennings!




Ulcer

Junior

Languages

The world is becoming progressively smaller as people become more and more mobile. This is demonstrated by the fact that tourism is now New Zealand's number 1 industry, ahead of traditional areas like agriculture and farming, and employing over 200,000 people in 1993. It is important to be able to respond appropriately to this demand and learning a foreign language is an ideal way of becoming aware of cultural differences and needs. (This includes becoming more aware of your own culture and how your own language works!)

Australia realised this in the mid-80s and in 1987 implemented its Language and Literature policy which aims to have all pupils learning a foreign language. (By 1993 in Queensland 97% of all form 2 pupils were already learning a LOTE - Language Other Than English). New Zealand has now also realised the value of learning foreign languages. In the latest publication from the Ministry of Education ("Education for the 21st Century") the following is stated:

"In school systems throughout the world, secondlanguage learning is seen as an important source of intellectual, social and cultural enrichment, and as a means of providing skills which are increasingly necessary in international trade and tourism. ... By 2001, all students in forms 1 to 4 in our schools will have opportunities to learn a language other than the language of instruction."

This national and international trend is reflected at Westlake Boys High School where from 1995 all 3rd form pupils will have a year of foreign language learning as part of their compulsory core.

This year 106 Westlake students joined 56,000 other students who sat the Australian Language Certificate. This is a certificate which is available in form 4 and form 6 and gives pupils an indication of their language ability internationally at that level. As this certificate becomes more widely known it is hoped that it will become a useful extra to a CV.

European Languages

Of course one of the best ways to become more proficient in languages is to apply what you have learned. Joseph Earles found this during his 2 month stay in Hamburg with AFS, as well as making some good friends who have since visited him in New Zealand. Ivor Wells and Andrew Harvey will also have the chance to put their skills into practice when they go to Germany with YfU and the Waikato University exchange scheme, as will Adam Tallentire who is going to France for 2months with AFS. There are several different exchange schemes and we also get requests for private exchanges or penfriends (including requests for "electronic penpals" with exchanges by computer). Fredrik Nyström, on exchange with AFS from Finland, showed what is possible by

taking 7th form German and coming second in class. (A notable achievement when you realise that it is his fourth language, after Swedish, Finnish and English).

This year we went into partnership with Westlake Girls High School, hosting exchange students from Lycée Jacques Aymot, Auxerre, in France, and Helene-Lange-Gymnasium in Hamburg. This will hopefully be the beginning of a permanent exchange scheme with these two schools so students from Westlake Boys will be able to go over to France or Germany and experience life there. We also joined Rangitoto College for their annual senior French camp with 4 of our 6th formers spending two days "immersed" in French. Here students were encouraged to speak in French the whole time and could earn extra "francs" for the auction at the end of the camp by visibly doing this. With the added help from the language assistants (native speakers from France) this proved to be a very worthwhile event and a good opportunity for "real" practice.

The annual German play at Auckland University this year featured 3 gruesome tales by the Grimm brothers and it was pleasing to see 3 recent Old Boys (Lars Wahlmann, Damon Wills and Simon Patterson) taking prominent roles in the cast. Senior French students had the chance to test their skills at the Auckland film festival and there was a trip to a German Konditorei for junior German students. Here there was a compulsory speaking test as the waitress only served those who ordered in German.

In the annual Alliance française exams, Murray Durbin gained a mention bien and Sam Thomas of form 4 was placed 5th in form 5. Félicitations, Murray et Sam!

Language Support **Programmes**

The number of students from non-Englishspeaking backgrounds has increased rapidly in the last five years. Today 16% of the school roll would be in this group, the majority coming from Asian

To provide support for the English language needs of some of these students, the school offers extra English classes at 3rd, 4th and 5th Form level, as well as opportunities for one-to-one, or small group tuition in English. Most of these new arrivals in New Zealand have had at least three years of English instruction in their home country, but adapting to a school environment where English is the language of instruction, and not simply a 1-period-a-day subject at school, is more difficult for some students than for others.

This year we have introduced an "E.S.O.L. Certificate in Practical English" Examination, which is available nationally. This is giving students an opportunity to measure their progress with students from other schools, and offers some recognition of achievement.

Parents from the Chinese and Korean speaking communities have met and a group of elected representatives are available for consultation on matters of concern, or to provide translators when interpreting or translating is required.

Reading Room

To most people at Westlake Boys High School, the "Reading Room" means a laminated notice on the door of a small room in lower F Block. Few have seen the furnishings, book-lined walls, pictures, plants, red carpet - and personnel! Even fewer have stepped inside this little haven. And this is as it should be. For only a very small minority of the school population have the privilege (and honour!) of receiving specialised help when reading and writing skills are not up to scratch. Stringent criteria ensure that only those who qualify may participate in the various programmes offered. Daily pleas of "Please Miss I can't read!" or "I'm no good at spelling" fall on deaf ears if it is suspected that the plaintiff might just want to get out of class! There seems to be no stigma to being one of the chosen few.

The Reading Teacher, Ms Angela Bradley, has specialised in remediation programmes for many years. Together with a small team of volunteer tutors (parents of other students) she encourages, reassures and teaches with enthusiasm, and with a genuine interest in her students. Her aim is to teach the students "payoff" strategies for helping themselves to become better readers and writers.

As a trained, practising Reading Recovery teacher, Ms Bradley finds relevance in the philosophy and some of the methods which have made Reading Recovery so successful in New Zealand primary schools. These are directed towards independence and a self-improving system of reading. Daily instruction, which is vital to the success of Reading Recovery, is not realistic at secondary level where the demands of a busy timetable mean that only one or two lessons can be offered.

Complementing this programme, parent tutors give free time to help some students overcome fluency problems. The tutors read "with" and "to" their students, teaching how to phrase appropriately to enhance fluency and speed.

If spelling is a big problem then the most deserving students, (often capable readers) are offered an 8-week course for groups which focuses on listening and sound-analysis. These students are weak in visual memory for symbols so another mode which emphasizes aural discrimination has been devised. Again, learning how to help themselves is the driving force behind these lessons. The course is popular with the boys and if they practise what they learn, the results can be spectacular.

Sharing the 2-room space with Ms Bradley is Mrs Val Stansfield, who with skill and experience, teaches special needs students one-to-one. This may involve liaising with the Correspondence School for selected studentsor

assisting boys who have extreme concentration difficulties in the classroom. She offers sensitive support to both students in her care and to their class teachers.

Exams for a few boys can mean demoralisation and defeat even before they get started.

Organising assistance for carefully selected students needing readers and/or writers for school and national exams is another service offered by the Reading Department. Students who have learned their subject matter can be unfairly disadvantaged by their slow processing skills. Reader/writer assistance can make the difference between success and failure (but is no guarantee). This service is gratefully acknowledged by students, parents and staff.








Relationships with Schools in Japan

The school has close friendships with three schools in particular in Japan.

Bisai

For the past four years we have developed close links with the Bisai Board of Education. Bisai is a small city near Nagoya and is famous among our students for its kind hospitality. Isesaki Higashi High School

This school in Gunma Prefecture (near the mountains one hour north of Tokyo) has become close to Westlake, thanks to Mr Masahiko Taguchi. Mr Taguchi taught at Westlake three years ago, and is now teaching English at Isesaki Higashi High School. This school has many similarities to Westlake. It is a boys' state secondary school with a role of around 1100 and an interest in rugby. It has a strong English Department. (Many of their English teachers have spent a year in New Zealand teaching Japanese.) In May this year we enjoyed the last five days of our trip at Isesaki. From Isesaki, we were able to enjoy a third homestay, visit a school again and visit the main attractions in Tokyo.

Kyoto Fushimi Technical High School

This school is well-known to our rugby boys as a famous rugby school in Japan (twice winners of the Hanazono All-Japan Schoolboy Rugby Tournament) and as the main organisers of their rugby tour to Japan three years ago. Because of the very generous help of Mr Ryoji Yamaguchi, the head rugby coach at this school, our boys were hosted to two wonderful days in Kyoto and were able to enjoy the attractions of the ancient capital of Japan. We will always be indebted to Mr Yamaguchi for his help while in Japan.

Japan Trip, May

The major event of the last year would have to be the trip to Japan in the May holidays. This was the second such tour of Japan, and it is proposed that we will take a group of about 30 every second year. This year's trip was judged to be an enormous success by all. Accompanied by Mr Pasoce, Mrs Short, Mrs Brown and Mr Hart, the boys experienced Japanese life first-hand for 17 days. Theymade many very good friends and I'm sure those friendships will continue long into the future. The tour was extensive. It included three homestays. The first homestay (7 days) was in the city of Bisai in Aichi Prefecture; the second in Kyoto (2 nights) with our friends from Kyoto Fushimi Technical High School's Rugby club; and the third (5 nights) in Isesaki City in Gunma Prefecture with the students of Isesaki East High School where Mr Masahiko Taguchi is now a teacher of English.

Mathematics

An Extract from Ye Ping Lim's Mathematics with Statistics Project with the aim to find the greatest cross-section of a certain channel containing liquid, given a constant wetted perimeter.



School/Business Partnerships

Sitting at a desk, listening to a teacher's advice and working your way through the exercises in a text book are common ways of learning in our school. The quality of the final presentation was beyond our expectation and has ensured the continuation of a blossoming partnership.

Adis also hosted two of our teachers, Chris Dakers and Les Paver, for three days of work shadowing. Valuable contacts were made and much of the knowledge gained has been passed onto other teachers and students.

During September a group of students also attended a half day seminar designed to give them an insight into what makes a modern company successful. Hopefully they will now have a greater understanding of the skills expected from modern employee after absorbing the information delivered by the variety of knowledgeable speakers.

Information Technology

At the end of 1993 the Board of Trustees allocated nearly \$200,000 for the upgrading of the school's computer facilities. This allowed the school to replace the current machines in C8, and convert C9 to a new computer room. The machines installed were "state of the art" 486 machines. This has allowed students in the senior computer studies classes to have a machine to themselves, and has also allowed the junior classes to operate in more comfort than in the past.

For the first time a full class was established at the 7th form level, with students from this class entering through the Auckland Institute of Technology examinations for units of the National Diploma in Business Computing.


This year has also seen the school increase its usage of the Information Super Highway, by providing access to the Internet to staff and students.

With the increase in availability of computers, many subjects have made more extensive use of the computer room in their teaching. The demand for use of the rooms has been such that the Board has approved a further room to be equipped with computers for the start of the 1995 school year.

Money was also spent extending the administration network to all blocks throughout the school, more than doubling the number of terminals around the school. This has resulted in a much greater usage of the system for the preparation of classroom materials, and improved efficiency in administration.

A network of terminals was installed in the library to allow the library's catalogue to be placed on line and this has now received extensive use.

With the increasing importance of this technology in the curriculum, our Board has allocated further funds for extra facilities for the beginning of the 1995 school year, bringing the total amount spent by our Board in this area to well over \$\frac{1}{4}\text{million}.

The day before we left, we went up to a farm to practise with the .243 rifle which we were going to be using to shoot deer. This rifle has a much bigger and much louder recoil than the smaller .22 rifles we use at the school's rifle range.

At about 4.15 on Thursday 29 October Mr Mullins and Mr Tisdall took us on our adventure. We arrived at the site around 9pm after stopping for dinner, then erected our huge tent fly for the seven of us.

On Friday morning, when we woke around 5 am, it was snowing. After tramping, for an hour and a half, we reached the highest point, denoted by a small hut. After four hours of easier walking, we had covered 12 kms. We crossed over a small footbridge by a river and set up camp.

The next night, we had to do a survival night which meant setting up camp and spending a night alone at least two minutes walk from any other person. Rizal Samsudin and I were the only ones to complete the night by ourselves without going back to camp in spite of steady rain.

Sunday morning was the long slog home, fighting against torrential rain and hail. We arrived back at school around 9.30 pm but were not too happy about the prospect of going to school the next day.

Altogether we all had a great time despite the weather and thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.



specific requirements.








The season started well with some comfortable wins in the pre-season. It is pleasing to note that the Premier team has only lost twice to North Shore schools in the last four years.

This year the School XI won the Auckland Secondary Schools Competition to record its sixth title since 1980. From the outset this year's XI had all the talent necessary to improve on the excellent third placing of last year's team in the Auckland Schools Championship, the result of a tense and exciting outright win over Sacred Heart College by 10 runs in the last match of the year. A most successful nine- match Development Tour of Australia pre-Christmas further fortified by a couple of excellent warm-up matches in January created a committed and dedicated team, keen to do well and they well deserve their success this year. Played 12, Won 11, Lost 1.

The year began with a comfortable win over Kelston and a crushing defeat of St Peters. The 294 put up against St Peters is the highest total ever scored in 45 overs in Auckland Schools Competition. The mayhem began with a very much in form Terry Crabb who hit the ball hard and often all around the ground on the way to an excellent 72. Richard Hart then carried it on in an amazing innings of 94 scored in 30 overs. None of us will forget the 6 that went clearly over the trees and on to the motorway as Richard lost his balance. It was a superb innings of fearsome power from a very confident in-form player. A very quick 54 from wicket-keeper Roger Noll rubbed salt in the St Peter's wounds.

The local derby against Takapuna Grammar was characterised by a lot of sledging and unpleasantness and ended on a sadly sour note but the narrow win took the XI into the top six of the competition. We should never have lost the Kings match after having posted a safe but not too secure total of 187 and then having their batting star back in the pavilion at 3.13 after a withering opening spell of fast bowling by Paul Hermon. But we stopped making it happen in the middle stages and the game drifted away despite a tense and exciting finish. David McBride (85*) continued his penchant for scoring runs against Auckland Grammar and set up the big total necessary for the win. Grammar were never really in the game from the outset and it was with some surprise that we posted a second comfortable win against them in two years.

The first of the two day matches against St Kentigerns was a near-run thing as was the second against McLeans College. 153 did not seem enough against an accurate but rarely hostile St

Kents bowling attack and we only reached a degree of respectability with a typically gritty 20* from Bevan Guest which gave us enough to defend. The Hermons then cleaned them out. Brian bowled with sustained accuracy and almost violent hostility and well-deserved his 5-37. It was a good win even if rather too narrow for comfort.

The decision was made to target McLeans College for an outright win at the outset and it was a magnificent game as a result. McLeans went cheaply in their first innings and by the end of the first day the XI declared a few ahead and then had McLeans 3-12 in their second innings. It took most of the second day to get them out again leaving the XI 139 runs to get in just over 90 minutes. A match that could easily have been lost came out as a superb win in virtual darkness with the last man in and an over to go. This was Paul Hermon's game - 11 wickets for 51 runs and a crunch 35 in the second innings run chase. Bevan Guest's 30* was an absolute vital to secure the win. It has been a most successful year and the team goes into the last three games with a substantial lead in the race for the Premier title.

The outright win over AGS was a superb victory. Grammar collapsed against bowlingof sustained accuracy from James Bolton whose 4-21 included the only hat-trick in 1st XI Cricket for years and the hostility of Mark Hyland (3-11) and James Cook. A substantial first innings lead was created by Paul Hermon (59) and Mark Hyland (46) as we teetered on the edge. The 65 runs to win in 12 overs was made easy by Terry Crabb's rapid 29. An excellent 8- wicket win.

We only needed to defeat Kings College on the first innings to ensure the Schools Title. Agressive as ever we won the toss, put them in to bat and the result was a batting collapse. Kings recovered from 3-1 to 6-28 and all out for 69, Mark Hyland destroying them in a devastating opening spell of 5-7. The win was secured by 4 p.m. on the first day by some solid batting in the top order led by David McBride (48). Reece Clarke 35 and Mark Hyland 26*. It was a good win and secured the Schools Championship for 1994, a title all the more significant as it may well be the last occasion when the School 1st XI plays in the Auckland Schools Championship. The creation of the North Harbour Cricket Association will surely force its removal from a unique competition in New Zealand. It has been a memorable experience for the School.

Reece Clarke quickly proved himself an astute, mature and decisive Captain who never shrank from the tough decisions. His batting came right against Grammar after a lean start while his offspinners could always be relied on to winkle out a stubborn batsman. His 38 against St Kents was a most attractive knock that kept the team together after the top fell off. The really big total still eludes Terry Crabb but he has scored a lot of runs this year with shots all around the wicket. He has a great future in this game especially with his left arm slows which give every bowling attack variety. His 3-4 finished St Peters. David McBride scored a lot of runs in Australia but failed to recapture the same form at home and so has

had a disappointing year so far. He remains Auckland Grammar's nemesis with an excellent 85* this year to go with his 88* last year.

Richard Hart has had an outstanding year. His 94 against St Peters ranks as one of the most memorable innings in recent years although his 41 against Kings was a more important effort. If he can get a good steady start he can turn a game, especially as he is most unwilling to get out cheaply.

Paul Hermon's cricket reached a new maturity this year. He has become a genuinely quick bowler capable of wrecking the best of batting line-ups, as McLeans College can testify. Paul's opening assault on Kings was really quick, accurate and very hostile and almost won the game in the first ten overs. The ability to score quick runs in tight situations assures him of a good future in this game. Bevan Guest is a batting talent who suffers crises of confidence in his own ability. Given a good start he can score a lot of runs. His 30* in the second innings against McLeanswas an outstanding knock in a pressure situation. Roger Noll is the latest in a long line of very talented wicket-keeper batsmen who have played for the School XI. He is a very skilled 'keeper and well deserves to top the batting averages this year. Together with Mark Hyland, Brian Hermon and John Cook he will form the backbone of the XI over the next few years.

Mark bowls medium fast with parsimonious accuracy and deserved many more wickets than he got this year whilst his batting suffered from the requirement to up the strike-rate in the lower middle order at vital times. His 46 and 3-11 against AGS was a match winning performance and heralded his arrival as one of the top performers next year. Brian Hermon is also a good bat but had few chances to set himself up before having to score as many as possible as quickly as possible. His bowling is genuinely sharp and most often very hostile as was well evidenced when he smashed over St Kentigern with 5-31. John Cook needs to tighten his line a bit but he moves the ball around a lot and has become an integral part of the bowling attack. John's superb spell in the AGS second innings (3-11) showed what he can do when we are under pressure. Next season these three will become real forms in 1st XI cricket as they will have a better chance to show their talents.

James Bolton is the team's workhorse who slogs away into the wind with his medium pacers whatever the conditions, so he has worked hard for his wickets this year. James seems to have a penchant for wiping out AGS and his hat-trick in 4-21 was vital in setting up a memorable win. A free-scoring batsman who loves playing shots he has also had few chances on the tail of the order. James has done a good job for the team this year.

Written Report Detailing Expedition

After arriving in Taupo and stoking up on a hearty lunch the group all rolled back into the cars and headed off for Sika Lodge.

On arrival we all pulled our packs from the

cars, re-arranged them a wee bit and piled them all into the back of a ute belonging to a nice chap who took us to the end of Clements Road ready for us to start our outdoor excursion. At the end of the drive



those of us in the back of the ute did not feel at all too well because we had to share the limited space with six other packs - very uncomfortable, but no harm done. Shortly after we recovered from the drive everyone heavehoed their packs onto their shoulders with a reawakened fervour.

WE'RE OFF!

We had decided earlier, that today we were going to tramp to the Cascade hut. Right at the beginning of the track I noticed a lot of fallen trees and was told that this was a result of very high winds which uprooted a number



of trees some years back. Also at this stage the condition of the track was quite good which made the going all that much easier. The weather was fairly cloudy but on the last

few tramps I have been on the weather has been perfect so I suppose I deserve my fair share of bad weather. Later on, as we got further and further into the forest the terrain got steeper and steeper. At one point the party had to rest

every thirty or so metres. When we finally reached the top of the ridge we had a slightly extended rest and it was here that it started to blow a gale. As a result we all donned our appropriate windproof gear and set off again since it was too cold to hang about. At the top I could finally see through the trees and look down at where I had

come from.

Forest is the Beech. This particular type of Beech had very small leaves about 1cm long and pale green in colour. Also, there was a large amount of green moss all over the place in large clumps. At one point we noticed a particular formation of moss that looked remarkably like an oversized green fantail. When we finally arrived at the Cascade Hut it looked rather small and uncomfortable.



However, once we were all inside and had a cosy fire going, it was really quite a nice experience. This part of the tramp

took us just over six hours, which meant it was getting on to five or six o'clock at night by the time we arrived.

The next day Mrs Durham was lucky enough to see two small blue ducks which we understood to be an endangered species. However, by the time she came and told us and after we had gone out to have a look they were gone. Another privilege our group was given was that the fantails in the middle of the forest did not know who we were to they were not at all frightened of us. This meant they could come right up close to us - almost to within one metre sometimes. Today, Tuesday 10th, we decided to tramp all the way to the swingbridge and camp under it. The going was relatively easy compared to the previous day for the first hour or so. However the terrain turned quite sour since we had to keep crossing and recrossing the same river. As well as this, there were many fallen trees across the track so sometimes we got a bit lost but of course we obviously managed to find our way safely. During the entire journey from the Cascade hut to the Oamaru Hut I

think we would have at least crossed the same river ten or eleven times. The types of trees were very much the same as the day



before and the moss was also present. We actually decided to camp out about twenty minutes before the swingbridge because there was a very well prepared campsite already there. The night was very pleasant after we managed to prepare an open fire which really raised the camping spirit in the team. Again

the fantails were quite happy about coming very close to us - that is before the fire was lit! This part of the tramp took approximately six and a half hours.



The next day was Wednesday 11th, and the obvious route to take was from the swingbridge over to the Oamaru Hut. This

tramp was very easy compared to the other few days because it was all flat or downhill. The trees were mainly Beeches again. However as we neared the hut there began to be more of a variety of trees. Today's lunch was really enjoyable because we had it right next to the river and the sound of the river was really relaxing. The Oamaru hut was quite good and this time there were already some other people there. It turned out that they were deer hunters staying there for about a week. It took another six hours to get to the hut.

The final day, Thursday 12th, was the day that we walked out. In order to do this we traversed a bog which was a lot of fun because every time I took a step my feet sank half a foot right up to my shins. After this we had to walk for another three hours along a gravel road which wasn't a very enjoyable finish to an excellent tramp through the Kaimanawa Ranges.



A mysterious mood of peace and tranquillity creates an illusion of eternal darkness, and the dampness of the dew weighs heavily on the





I made my way home thinking about the strange girl who thought she was God.


It wasn't until I was halfway home that I remembered Her words "Phil's fine" And I realised: I had never told Her Phil's name! God is black. Yes She is.







1994 saw Westlake Boys High score a hat trick in taking the Secondary Schools Dragon Boat Championship for the third year running.


42 school teams competed this year at the Viaduct Basin on February 12. Excitement was intense,




The best result was against Kings College where the team played good positional play with dedication holding them to only two goals.



Coach's Report:

1994 - A season of mixed fortunes.

On tour Australia's hard grounds bought out the best in our team. The forwards tore straight up the field, encouraging the backs to run it from anywhere. And they did so with more flare than Campese. Craig Harper, a team player at all times even took it upon himself to help the players in the Seconds. Whilst on tour he even shared his bed with one of them. Meanwhile on the Gold Coast, other inform players were Jerome, Jarrod and Bomber, who managed to show a little extra flare; which resulted in special treatment by way of an extra, early morning training.

Back from Australia, a rest wasn't on the cards. These games were punctuated by the traditional hammering against the Old Boys, Tauranga's game - which we narrowly lost, and a close but unlucky game against Matamata.

We ended the season in true style, however, beating a strong Massey side by 21 points to nothing. A tribute to the boys' true ability.

Not since 1984, 1985, did a 1st XI soccer team show such potential. The team was made up of experience and youth with experienced players such as Tony Church, Anton Gargiulo, Brendan Duske, David McBride, Hamish McKenzie, Martin Smith and Gary Anderson being joined by Roger Noll, Johnathan Smith, Chris Braithwaite, Patrick Lyons, Saul Parkinson and Cameron Deyell. As well, seniors such as Scott Rasmussen and Matthew Schollum, playing in their first year at this level, contributed greatly.

With so many players making their debut at Premier level it took a while for the team to settle and to believe in themselves. In the first round they dominated nearly all their matches but failed to score goals. It was not until they led the eventual competition winners Auckland Grammar 2-0 that they finally realised that they were a very good team. Although they eventually lost this game 4-2, they could see that there was no team that they needed to fear.

The second round saw the team make a charge for the championship. Having beaten Kelston 2-1 away from home, they were within striking distance of Auckland Grammar. The last few hectic weeks of the competition saw them play excellent football and in finishing 3rd in the Premier competition and unlucky losers on penalties to Auckland Grammar in the semi-finals of the knockout, the team looked forward with confidence to the New Zealand Premier tournament.

The team's placement in the Auckland Premier competition was all the more meritorious in that they suffered horrendous set backs. Brendan Duske, the driving force in the mid-field broke his leg against Auckland Grammar in the first round. Captain Gary Anderson left school to prepare to go overseas to have a shot at playing

professional football. At crucial stages in the championship, illness and injury robbed the team of solidity and stability. To further complicatematters, Michael Jones, the coach, left to take up a teaching appointment overseas and long time coach Frank Weston was forced through ill health to cut back on his coaching. It is to their credit that the team overcame these setbacks.

The highlight of the season was the New Zealand Secondary Schools Lotto Premier Tournament held at Avondale College. The team was greatly strengthened by the addition to the squad of Steven Lane who had been playing throughout the year for North Shore United. Steven's inclusion gave the team what they lacked the most, someone who could regularly score goals. As well as Steven, the squad was built up to 16 with the inclusion of Simon Vincent, Robert Old and Jason Best.

To reach the final of the tournament the team played attractive and at times inspired football. Brushing aside Macleans College 5-0 in the opening game, the team finished first in their pool with the only blemish being a 2-2 draw against Christchurch Boys. The teams most impressive game was against Wellington College who were flattered by being beaten only 1-0. The quarter finals saw the team comprehensively outplay De La Salle College, scoring 3 goals in the first 10

minutes and finally winning 4-1. A workmanlike effort saw them beat Avondale College 1-0 and so reach the final of the tournament for only the third time in Westlake's History.

Played in front of a crowd of over 2,000, the final was an exciting game. Although Palmerston North were the favourites, it was Westlake who twice had balls cleared from the line and who had a deliberate handball overlooked by the referee. The rest of the first half saw Palmerston, playing with a strong wind, dominate and they justly scored half way through the first half. Determined defending saw Westlake turn at half time only 1-0 down and with the wind behind them they were in with a royal chance of pulling off what many at the start of the tournament would have thought an unlikely victory. A Steven Lane goal 10 minutes into the second half brought the game to life and although Westlake created a number of chances they could not score and it was Palmerston who scored the goal of the tournament to take the final 2-1.

In reaching the final there were many in the team who played far above themselves. From the opening game, with the loss of Saul Parkinson in a freak accident at practice, the team had to play with two inexperienced fullbacks. True, Robert Old was a defender but not a full back while Cameron Deyell had to learn with each game. A

special mention must be made of Chris Braithwaite who became the team's most effective mid-fielderand the provider of many of Steven Lane's goal scoring opportunities. The centre of the defence was rock solid and Hamish MacKen zie and David McBride effectively limited the opposition to only 5 goals in 8 games. Up front Patrick Lyon gave Steven Lane the support for him to be effective while in the mid-field Tony Church, Martin Smith and Jonathan Smith dominated most matches.

Westlake provided two players for the Tournament team, Steven Lane and Jonathan Smith. As well, Steven was given the richly deserved honour of being the player of the tournament.

I would like to thank all the parents and supporters who provided help and encouragement throughout the year. My special thanks go to Mike Jones who left me with a team of rare ability and finally to Frank Weston who once again through his experience and enthusiasm ensured the team's success.

Obituary

Frank Weston 1925-1994

"Next year in Jerusalem" summed up Frank Weston's indomitable spirit. I remember Frank saying this in his report to the then Headmaster Neil Moss in explanation for yet another tournament disappointment - disappointment not in the spirit, the enthusiasm and the skill with which his team played but the way in which Westlake seemed to be perpetually dogged by bad luck, very often freakish in nature. A lesser man would have given up but such was Frank's love of football and so strong was his desire to share this love with Westlake's young men, that he turned up year after year, 16 years in all.

It is rare these days for any man to selflessly devote such a large portion of his time and energies for no other reward than to see the development of the sport he loved and the development of character in the boys he guided. Frank was extremely modest in his achievements. If a Westlake team did well the credit he said reflected not on him but on the boys, the school, the teacher in charge that year. Yet it was obvious to everybody that Frank's knowledge and love of the game rubbed off. Ordinary players became more than just competent, good players blossomed and in a few instances became great players, going on to represent Auckland and New Zealand. Frank's achievements with Westlake are many: at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Premier tournament a first, a second, two thirds and numerous top eight placings; an Auckland Secondary Schools title, a second and two thirds as well as winning the Peter Grubener Memorial trophy on three occasions; two semi finals in the Auckland Secondary Schools knock-out competition.

Yet it would be wrong to think of Frank only as a soccer mad pom. He was articulate, extremely well read and right up to his death he retained, an interest in a wide variety of subjects - peoples ancestry, music, literature and politics. Frank was a staunch socialist in the truest sense. To him the welfare of people mattered and any system needed to place people first. He hated the divisions in society that were becoming apparent.

Frank had many wonderful personal idiosyncrasies. He could rarely remember people's correct names. Even players whom he had coached for a number of years were rechristened daily at practice. He told the most appallingly long and unfunny jokes often two or three times. He had a knack of seeking you out to give you a tip on a horse that you knew would never pay a dividend but which you were obliged to back. He would keep his fellow coaches awake nights on end while away on tournaments with his snoring. In the end it is as much for his non-footballing traits that Frank will be missed as for his undoubted expertise and passion for the game.

The school is indebted to Frank for his unflinching service over a great many years. Those whom he coached are indebted to Frank for skills he taught and the lessons about life he passed on. Those of us whoworked with him are indebted to Frank for the years of pleasure he has given us and for enabling us to share in his love of football and of life.

God Bless. May you rest in Peace.

Special thanks must be given to Roly Russell, our team Manager, for his great inspiration and determination on the court and his boundless laughter and generosity off the court.



At the time of writing, the North Island Championships have yet to be played but these players can be well proud that they are the first Westlake team to go to the Nationals.



News of Old Boys

We are very grateful to Mr Ian Hall who has spent countless hours researching what has happened to our Old Boys. We know that this information is very interesting to our Old Boys who read this magazine.

DAVID ABERCROMBIE (1969-1973) a 1st Rugby XV member in 1973, embarked upon a dentistry course at the University of Otago after leaving school, but after two years he decided to change tack. A year farming and boat-building was followed by study for a Diploma in Physiotherapy at the Auckland Institute of Technology from 1976-1979. After a short period locally, he moved to Hamilton for some six months, and it was here that he started his involvement in provincial rugby with the Waikato

In 1980 he travelled to Canada, and pursued a post-graduate course at Winnipeg, gaining a Bachelor of Physical Therapy Degree in 1987. He married in Canada and worked in Calgary for two years. Returning to New Zealand at the end of 1983, he set up practice in Forrest Hill Road, and after 5 years moved to his present site in Shakespeare Road.

David is well-known for his work as physiotherapist for the All Blacks from 1987 to 1991, and for North Harbour Rugby Team since their foundation in 1985.

IAIN ABERCROMBIE (1971-1975), a valued member of the 1st XV in his last two years at Westlake, achieved the double degrees B.Sc, B.Com at the University of Auckland. His early employment was in the field of marketing for Watties Ltd, based at Wiri. During this period he continued his rugby career, becoming one of New Zealand's top hookers. From 1978 to 1986, Iain played 73 times for Auckland, was an All Black Trialist, and was a reserve for the All Blacks in a Test against France.

There followed a year playing rugby in France, then four years in London working mainly for an American Food Company. He returned to New Zealand, was appointed International Marketing Director for Steinlager. At the instigation of Lion Nathan, he has more recently been the driving force behind the All Black Club.

COLINABERCROMBIE (1966-1970) attended Massey University after leaving school, and after trying various course options, graduated with a B.A. in English and History. He attended Teachers College in Christchurch, and had a teaching appointment at Westlake in 1978/79 before heading off overseas for some 3 years. A 9-month stint teaching at a Comprehensive School in London was quite an experience. 1982 saw Colin with a relieving appointment at Long Bay College.

His next move was to work for a MedicalPublishing Company for 5 years, and in 1988 he and a partner established their own business.

This business has recently been sold to an overseas interest, but they continue to administer it as well as establishing a further business in the medical publishing field. Colin now lives at Devonport.

DAVID ANDEWS (1980-1984) now lives in London. After completing a B.E Degree in civil engineering, he travelled abroad some 5 years ago. He is employed by a consulting engineer in the London area.

MURRAY ARMSTRONG (1978-1982) completed his B.Com Degree, and has for some years been involved in foreign exchange dealing in London, first with the Bank of Tokyo, and more recently with CIBC, a Canadian banking institution.

Before he left New Zealand, Murray was at different times the Auckland and New Zealand Starling, Flying Dutchman and Laser champion, taking part in a number of world championships. He has recently skippered a large yacht on a Mediterranean cruise.

These days a 'brolly and bowler hat man', he is keen to return to New Zealand. Amongst other things, he longs to be at the helm of a keeler!

BRIANARMSTRONG (1961-1965) who was a valued member of the 1st Soccer XI in 1962/63/64/65 (Vice-captain) and later represented New Zealand for many years, has had a full and varied career, yet is still comparatively young.

His University study saw him graduate with an M.Sc(Hons) in Mathematics. As a Fletcher cadet he realised that he needed accountancy qualifications, and he completed a B.Com Degree part-time. When the Hon J Walding left politics, Fletchers set up a consultancy and for some seven years Brian worked closely with Mr Walding in trade development with overseas countries, mainly in the Eastern European area. J. Walding looked after the political front, Brian worked in the trade aspect, and between them they spent much time in Russia, Poland, Hungary and Roumania, to name but a few countries.

Brian next had a period in Southampton, England, as an insurance salesman, selling life insurance to merchant navy officers. Returning to New Zealand, he ran an automotive component business for a 7-year period, and in 1985, at the age of 37, he had enough capital through his various interests to retire in comfort.

For the last 9 years he has been interesting himself in a wide range of projects, ranging from international investment, property development, farming, horticulture, beef fattening, deer farming, forestry, and the like. He is Director of the Kiwifruit Marketing Board.

Brian is a firm believer in a broad-based education, a range of work experience and an avoidance of too-early specialisation before determining a career.

IAN ARMSTRONG (1971-1974) has a farm at Katikati, but as a master mariner spends most of his time overseas operating a marine consultancy business. A captain of large ocean-going tugs, he has featured in a number of dramatic sea rescues. Much of his work is in the Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam areas, towing large oil-rigs and being involved in all types of support work for oil drilling. During the Gulf War he was seconded to the United States Navy to give advice on port facilities in the Gulf area.

MICHAEL ARMSTRONG (1960-1964), a talented Soccer player who had three years in the 1st XI, being captain in 1963 and 1964, gained his Master of Business Administration from the University of Auckland. He served his apprenticeship with Philips New Zealand, then travelled to London. Later he hitch-hiked to Rhodesia through Egypt, Ethiopia, Kenya and the Sudan, working for Philips for many years during the era when Ian Smith was Prime Minister. He married a Rhodesian girl, and their family spent their early years in that country before it was renamed Zimbabwe.

Returning to New Zealand, he had a change in vocation, becoming No.1 salesman for Colonial Mutual Insurance. Michael is now the New Zealand Manager of the Photographic and Optics Division of Canon New Zealand.

RONALD ARMSTRONG (1965-1969) played for the 1st Soccer XI in 1966, but then had dispensation to play Club Soccer; and coached the school Junior A team.

At the University of Auckland he gained a B.Sc Degree in Pure and Applied Mathematics, and has since had a busy career in many fields. He was Marketing Manager for Armourguard, Sales and Marketing Manager for N.Z. Sugar, and is at present Business Manager of the Customer Service Division of APV Engineering, a firm which handles processing equipment for the food industry.

Ron has had a top career in Soccer. He represented New Zealand from 1971 to 1983, played in the National League spanning many years, (he actually played in the first year and last year of the League). He has had a year coaching the Mt Wellington team, and this year has been coaching the Auckland team. He plays for the Corinthians, a team made up of past internationals who visit

schools and the like to encourage promising players.

BRUCE ARROLL (1966-1970) who was in the 1st Rugby XV in 1970, completed his M.B.Ch.B and later travelled to Canada, where he spent 6 years, much of it in remote areas, practising medicine. He also gained a Masters Degree in Epidemiology, a branch of medicine in the public health area. Back in New Zealand, Bruce completed a PhD in Epidemiology, and now is a Senior Lecturer in the General Practice Division of the Auckland Medical School. A notable task which Bruce has undertaken is to chair the Fred Hollows Foundation, in memory of the late Fred Hollows, who did such outstanding work in alleviating eye diseases in underprivileged areas overseas. He has recently returned from an overseas visit accompanied by his wife and three children, to Europe and Eritrea, where he was able to observe first-hand some of the fine work being done to assist these people.

NICHOLAS BAIN (1978-1979) had his 6th and 7th form years at Westlake after transferring from Wellington College. After graduating with an LLB, he travelled overseas, and is now well settled in London. His present position is Corporate Finance Manager for Abbey National Bank, which is concerned with asset-backed and syndicate loans. Nicholas, who has a staff of 14 solicitors, travels widely, and at the time of writing has just returned from Los Angeles. He occasionally pops over to France for lunch, all in the course of business! Some idea of the scale of the Bank's operation can be gauged from the fact that some 2 billion pounds is involved this financial year.

STEPHEN BAKER (1970-1974) had a year in Israel after leaving school, and subsequently gained his B.E. Degree before moving to England, where he completed his M.B.A. at Cranfield. For a period he was involved in chip design hardware, and he now operates his own software consultancy. He lives in Finchley Road, London, where he probably meets up with many other Old Boys from Westlake.

TREVOR BAKER (1974-1978) completed his B.E. Degree specialising in systems control. Since moving to Victoria, Australia he has achieved a Degree in English Literature and Drama, and is currently secretary of the Jung Society in Melbourne. Likes his brother Stephen, he is also involved in software.

JOHN BAKER (1961-1965) graduated from the University of Auckland with a B.A in English, and later completed a Degree in Sociology at Victoria University. there followed a one-year Teacher Training Course and teaching in the Wellington area, before embarking on overseas travel. He had stays in Kenya and Colombo, and finally arrived in London where he has been domiciled since.

John has taught at three schools in the London district at primary level, and is currently Deputy-Principal of St Johns Holloway School. His home is in East Finchley, and he often cycles to school across Hampstead Heath, sometimes stopping for a swim en route!

JONATHAN BAKER (1983-1987) gained a B.Mus followed by a B.Mus (Hons) at Victoria University. He subsequently studied for eight months in 1992 at Cleveland, U.S.A. and returned to work full time with the Auckland Philharmonia as well as occasionally playing the tuba in the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra. He is one of only two full time orchestral tuba players in New Zealand and leaves shortly for San Francisco to gain further experience.

Note: Jonathan was mentioned in the July 1994 Newsletter, when his academic record was quoted incorrectly.

PAUL BARKER (1966-1970), a member of the 1st Rugby XV at Westlake, gained an NZCE (Civil) at the Auckland Institute of Technology, and was employed for four years by Murray North and Partners, Consulting Engineers, before travelling overseas. He worked in England for 2 years before returning to Murray North, this time for a further nine years. Much of his work was in the drawing and design office.

Paul then branched out on his own, running a sales and service business in hydraulic hosing. Then followed a complete change in vocation. For the last seven years he has been a cabin crew member for Air New Zealand, and is currently mainly on overseas flights.

TIM BARKER (1968-1973) entered North Shore Teachers College and after graduating taught at Birkenhead Primary for two years. He then travelled overseas, and while in England did a one year course in organic gardening. This stimulated an interest in horticulture, and on his return to New Zealand he completed a Diploma in Horticulture at Massey University.

Since 1985 he and a partner have operated a flourishing business at Clive, Hawkes Bay, called the Tree Tops Nursery.

JARROD BEAMAN (1985-1989) gained his B.Com in Marketing at the University of Otago, and is now a Market Analyst for Nissan N.Z., based at Head Office. Jarrod, who had two years in the 1st XV at Westlake, played rugby for University in Dunedin, and represented Otago B in 1993. Unfortunately an injury has curtailed his season with East Coast Bays this year.

GLENN BEAMAN (1982-1986) entered the R.N.Z.A.F., completed his New Zealand Certificate in Engineering and is now an Air Force Engineer at Hobsonville with the rank of Flying Officer.

SHANE BEAMAN (1979-1983) studied at AIT for 2 years, and worked for a further two years as a computer-aided draughtsman. He moved to Sydney, and has been working since for Sealcorp, initially as a computer operator and now in computer marketing. He plans to return to New Zealand at the end of this year.

FRANO BOTICA (1977-1981) ball boy for the 1st XV in 1977, and a valuable member of the team in 1980 and 1981 (vice-captain in the latter year), has certainly made his mark in both Rugby and Rugby League. He was a foundation North Harbour Rugby Representative, achieved All Black honours from 1986 - 1989 and played rugby in both France and Italy. In between times he operated a courier business for a period, but then accepted an offer to play Rugby League for Wigan, where his exploits are well-known. He has also represented New Zealand in this code. At the end of the present English season he is joining the Auckland Warriors to complete his playing days.

Proud father of 3 children, the eldest a boy of 7, he will probably leave his Wigan home with mixed feelings. His family in New Zealand will be happy though - they have seen him twice at Xmas in the last 12 years.

NIKOLA BOTICA (1982-1985) had a period with the Bank of New Zealand before joining the New Zealand Police Force in 1987. His home is in Glenfield, and he is stationed at Onehunga. Also a keen rugby player, he has represented the police, but his main interests are basketball and surfing. He has been a N.Z Police Basketball Representative for the last four years.

JEREMY BOWDER (1968-1972) has been overseas for over 20 years now. Living in Camden, London, he has worked both for the BBC and the London Stock Exchange. At present he is Employment Officer for the Civil Service in London.

DAVID BRADY (1965-1969) - After a year at the University of Auckland, David travelled overseas, spent a period in Indonesia where he became familiar with the local language, and later studied in London for a Diploma in the Teaching of English as a Second Language. Moving to Spain, he studied at University there until the political situation forced a move back to London, where he subsequently completed an M.A. Degree, specialising in languages, particularly Spanish. He worked for the E.E.C. in Brussels for a number of years, and had a year in Tenerifebefore moving back to London. He has since specialised in computer science, and at present has a position which takes him to Luxembourg quite often.

GRAHAME BROWN (1961-1963) has had a full and varied career since leaving school. He trained as a marine engineer, and after much practical experience in this field, the Brown family sailed around the world for some 51/2 years.

Grahame has since widened his experience in engineering, and is at present manager of BTR Nylext Ltd in Auckland, a firm which specialises in automotive and refinery engineering. It would be no secret to say that Grahame itches to get back to sea.

GAVIN BROWN (1983-1986) having completed a B.Com Degree, took up an appointment in Germany teaching English. He now works with the New Zealand Consulate in Hamburg as a Marketing Assistant for Tradenz, which has its European headquarters in Hamburg. As can be imagined, he is now fluent in German.

CRAIG BROWN (1990-1993), who was in the school yachting team for 4 years, being captain in 1993, was a mere 6 years old when they left and 12 when they returned. Craig, apart from a period at school in Sydney, did much of his primary schooling by correspondence. He has recently been apprenticed to an air conditioning and refrigeration firm.

STEPHEN BUTLER (1985-1989) studied computer science at Carrington Polytechnic (now Unitech Institute of Technology), worked for a period at Tech Pacific, Albany, then with Microsoft for some 6 months before taking up an appointment in computer technical support for AST Computer Services.

NIGEL BUTLER (1983-1987) a fine goalkeeper for the 1st XI Soccer in 1985 and 1986, gained his B.Com, and worked for four or five years in auditing for Ernst and Young, Accountants. His next position was Assistant Financial Controller for Fletcher Construction. Nigel has recently moved overseas with the aim of furthering his experience and is now in London.

HAYDEN BUTLER (1979-1983) completed a B.Com Degree and worked in this field for some three years before spending a further three years in London on accountancy work. Now back in New Zealand, he has a position as Financial Accountant for Thomas Cook.

DON CASTAING (1961-1965) has been in Australia since 1969. Living in Avalon, Sydney, Don operates a cleaning contracting business. He is the proud father of two boys aged 11 and 9, one a rugby league enthusiast, the other a soccer fan. Don played hockey for Manly for many years, until a spinal injury forced him to give up.

At school Don was outstanding in hockey and cricket. He had 4 years in the 1st Hockey XI, was captain in 1964 and 1965, as well as gaining national secondary school selection. He also had 3 years in the 1st Cricket XI, being captain in 1965.

DAVID CRANEFIELD (1982-1986) trained as a physiotherapist at the Auckland Institute of Technology, and after qualifying with his Diploma in this field, he entered the Auckland Medical School, where he has now one year to complete the five year course.

STEPHEN CRANEFIELD (1980-1984) completed a B.Sc Degree at the University of Auckland, and subsequently trained in veterinary science at Massey University. After gaining his B.Vet.Sc, he practised at Te Awamutu and Otorohanga. Now married, he has recently travelled to England for a two-year period to further his experience.

MICHAEL CULPAN (1960-1963) has lived in Sydney for over 25 years now. He worked initially for NRM (the equivalent of our AA), then transferred to Qantas Airlines on administrative work. He is now head of all Qantas administration, both domestic and international, at Sydney Airport. He is married, lives in Putney. Sydney, and has one son.

STEPHEN CULPAN (1963-1967), who, was one of the early students at Auckland Medical School, is now a well-known Auckland medical practitioner. As the official doctor for the New Zealand Rugby League team, he toured Britain with them in 1993. He has also been appointed official doctor for the Auckland Warriors.

CHRISTOPHER DARLOW (1965-1969) graduated LLB from the University of Auckland and has for the past 20 years been a hard-working solicitor in Auckland. Chris has his own practice, and his legal work has seen him involved in most of the major insolvencies of recent years including Chase Corporation and TV3 amongst others.

GRAHAM DARLOW (1968-1972) who was mentioned in the Westlake Newsletter this year, had some 10 years in Australia after graduating B.E.(Civil). He had a period in Perth where he was involved in pipeline work, constructing a waste outfall into the Indian Ocean, followed by a similar task in Bass Strait, south of Geelong. As mentioned previously, he was a consultant on the Clyde Dam project in Central Otago, and is now Project Manager for the New Zealand Museum construction in Wellington.

Graham was a keen sportsman in his Westlake years, playing in the 1st Rugby XV, and in the Senior Rowing Eight for three years, being captain in 1972.

KEITH DICKSON (1972-1976) graduated with a B.E.(Civil) and apart from two extended trips abroad to England and Europe, has been employed by Tonkin & Taylor, Consulting Engineers. During this period he has spent some two years at Glenbrook Steel Mill on engineering work.

SCOTT DICKSON (1984-1988) with a B.Com and ACA had a two year cadetship with Coopers Lybrand, Management Consultants. A capable accountant, he has taken a break from this vocation to try his hand as a professional yachtsman in U.S.A.

CHRIS DICKSON (1975-1979) is well known for his yachting expertise. He has taken a leading part in America's Cup challenges at Perth and San Diego, and skippered the New Zealand-sponsored Tokio in the 1993-94 Round the World Race. He has also been three times the Junior World Champion in two-handed sailing, as well as three times World Match-Racing Champion.

ANTHONY DICKSON (1976-1979) became one of the top financial dealers for the Bank of New Zealand, based in Wellington. He has recently transferred to Tower Corporation, Tony lives in Karori, Wellington.

DONALD EWART (1970-1974) had a year in Tokoroa, training to be a Forest Ranger. The wide world beckoned, however, and he travelled overseas. Scotland attracted him, and it was here he met his wife-to-be. They lived in Brodie, south of Inverness, for some 10 years. Don became a horticulturist, growing raspberries and strawberries. About 5 years ago they moved to New Zealand and they are growing raspberries,

tayberries, gooseberries and red currants on a 12 hectare property near Geraldine in the South Island. They have four fine sons, three of whom were born in Scotland.

ROBERT FRIS (1962-1966) who was Head Boy in 1966, and a keen all-round sportsman, representing the School in rugby, basketball and athletics, subsequently graduated MBChB from Otago University. He was a House Surgeon at Auckland Hospital, then did surgical training in both Canada and Scotland. After some 17 years away, he returned to New Zealand in 1991. He has also had further surgical experience in U.S.A.

His qualifications include F.R.C.S.(C) and F.A.C.S, and his specialisation in keyhole surgery puts him among very few in this country with this expertise. He is in private practice.

Robert has a daughter at Westlake Girls and a son commencing at Westlake next year.

MURRAY GIFFORD (1969-1972) who was Head Boy in 1972, achieved a B.E. (Hons) in Civil Engineering. He gained early experience in England, working for a period on the well-known Thames Barrier project. Now employed by Holmes Consulting Co, Wellington, he has been involved in a range of challenging tasks in the Wellington area. Putting in new foundations for the old Parliament Buildings was a major operation, where the whole building had to be jacked up and put on bearings. Murray has three children and lives at Churton Park, Wellington.

JOHN GIFFORD (1971-1975) completed an M.Sc in Botany, and has since been engaged in research in the forestry area. His work at the Forestry Research Institute in Rotorua has been largely concerned with effluent problems at wood processing plants and pulp and paper mills. He has presented papers on this subject in both Finland and Canada. He resides in Rotorua.

ANDREW GREENSMITH (1983-1987), trained at Otago Medical School, graduated MBChB, and is currently a first-year House Surgeon at Tauranga Hospital. He has been accepted as one of 10 successful applicants who will begin training at Auckland at the end of this year under the surgical training scheme. He has yet to determine which area of surgery he will specialise in, but first his goal will be to pass the primary exam at the end of 1995.

NICHOLAS HALL (1983-1987) has been very much in the news this year as the leader of the New Zealand Badminton Team at the Victoria Commonwealth Games, and especially as the winner of a Bronze Medal in the singles, the first ever from New Zealand in singles competition at this level.

Nick has been No 1 in the New Zealand Badminton team for over 4 years now. At the end of 1987 he was the top Under 15 player, and was selected for the national squad. He has played in many world venues. In 1990 he was a member of the Commonwealth Games squad in Auckland. Early in 1993 he had a successful tour of the United Kingdom and Europe, and also in 1993 he

was in the team which represented New Zealand in the world championships in Birmingham. During the European tour for the Thomas Cup earlier this year he achieved a world ranking of 53, though he lost it after his return to New Zealand. Still only 24, he has a bright future in the game.

Nick is a realist, and combined study with sport. He gained a B.Sc Degree, majoring in Mathematics, and is employed in research development by Watties, who have been generous in their support for Nick's badmin

GAVIN HALL (1980-1984), a member of the Senior Rowing 8 at Westlake, graduated from the University of Auckland with a Bachelor of Engineering Degree in Civil Engineering. He then joined the Melbourne staff of Beca Carter Hollings and Ferner Ltd, a firm which covers a wide range of engineering services. Gavin is working in structural engineering.

For the last two years Gavin has been an Australian rowing representative, and competed at the Commonwealth Regatta, winnings silver medal as a member of the Australian eights, and at the recent World Rowing Championships as a crew member of the Australian light-weight eights. He lives in Richmond, Melbourne

SIMON HALL (1982-1986), obtained a Diploma in Quantity Surveying from Carrington Polytechnic and has recently resumed employment with Mainzeal. Property and Construction Ltd. A more than useful rugby five-eighth, he has had several seasons with the Takapuna Senior Team, and celebrated his 100th appearance for them this year. He also gained North Harbour Representative honours, both in the 15-a-side and 7-a-side teams.

Simon has also managed to fit in two season in France, playing in Bordeaux, not far from where former Head Boy, Ron Williams was situated when also playing in France.

ROB HARLEY (1967-1971) had a year at the University of Auckland after leaving school, his initial plans being to pursue a law career. He had a rethink, however, and after a year at various manual jobs, entered the Auckland Technical Institute, where he completed a Diploma in Journalism. There followed a year with Radio Hauraki, a further year with Radio I, and from late 1975 until 1979 he worked for TV One. Rob then travelled abroad, and did an 18 month stint with BBC Radio in London.

Returning to New Zealand in mid-1980, he had 18 months with TVNZ News, and since 1982 has been a current affairs reporter with TVNZ. It would be fair to say that Rob has distinguished himself in this field; it has been said that he has never presented a poor programme, and his reporting, which has often taken him to distant shores, is invariably of the highest order.

RICHARD HAY (1965-1969) joined the Guardian Trust in Shortland Street, Auckland, and studied at the Auckland Institute of Technology,

obtaining professional accountancy qualifications. He has remained with the Guardian Trust, through successive appointments at Napier, Palmerston North, Tauranga, and for the last nine years, Inver cargill, where he is the local Manager.

Richard, his wife and two boys love the outdoors, do much skiing, and spend as much time as possible at Tekapo in the summer months. Richard still enjoys his game of soccer.

JEREMY HAY (1979-1983), who was also a competent coxswain, coxed the Senior Rowing 8 in 1983, Maadi Cup winners. His first employment was with NZI Insurance, and after gaining experience in that field, like so many others, he travelled to Britain. He obtained an appointment with G.Bowness Insurance as an Underwriter, in Southend on Sea, Essex, some four years ago, and apart from a break back in New Zealand in 1992, has been there since. He is managing to fit in much cricket in England, in an inter-firm competition, playing in places like Chelmsford and Colchester. At the moment of writing he and his wife are cruising off the coast of Turkey, and they plan to settle down in New Zealand at the end of this year.

DOUGLAS HAY (1966-1970), who enjoyed his cricket and soccer in his Westlake years, was tragically killed in a motor-cycle accident two years after leaving school.

ANDREW HAY (1977-1981), a promising rugby player at school, but never big enough to make the 1st XV, made his mark in rowing. Cox for the Senior 8 in his last two years, he was cox of the World Championship winning eights in 1982 and 1983, and also coxed the crew at the Los Angeles Olympics. He had a break in 1985, but was back for the Commonwealth Games eight and also the World Championship in 1986.

Andrew, who loves the outdoors, was for a time Groundsman at Westlake Girls High School, and he now holds a similar position at Northbridge Retirement Village, Northcote.

PETER LAWTON (1961-1964) has been away from New Zealand for some 20 years, and lives in Surrey, England. After he left school he did publicity work for Air France, and was later with Air India for several years. He is a consultant on natural resources and is very much involved in conservation work. A member of the Rathambore Trust Board, he is actively involved in the "Save the Tiger" campaign, and has appeared on BB2 and SKY television in connection with this cause.

Peter has worked for many years for the Marie Stokes World Population Service, and at the time of writing is on the way to Hanoi from Sri Lanka in connection with this work.

JEREMY MCQUAID (1977) who came to Westlake from Dilworth School, qualified as a motor mechanic in Devonport, where he was also a Fire Service Volunteer. He decided to pursue a career in the Fire Service, and is now a Senior Station Officer in Wellington, being one of the youngest ever to achieve this rank.

CHRISTOPHER MCQUAID (1970-1974) is now Prosecutions Officer with the Dog Registration Branch of the Auckland City Council. A former racing commentator with Radio Pacific, he is a qualified umpire in cricket and also a netball referee. The Auckland Cricket Umpires Association voted him the "Umpire of the Year" for the 1993/94 season.

MICHAEL MERRIMAN (1980-1984) completed his medical studies, then had two years at Palmerston North Hospital. For the last two years he has been doing locum work at various hospitals in Scotland (and seeing the world!) He returns in November to take up a position as Senior House Officer at Auckland Hospital, with the aim of specialising in Opthalmology.

STEPHEN MILLEN (1964-1966) joined the staff of Seabrook Fowlds after he left school, and later worked as an interior decorator before following his real interest in cars and saloon car driving. He has had a most successful career not only in endurance races, but also as a businessman. His home is at Newport Beach, California, and his flourishing car business employs 42 people.

Steve's most recent victories include the 24 hour Daytona and 12 hour Sebring events, and he was also first in his class and fifth overall in the famous 24-hour Le Mans race in Paris. He is recovering well from severe injuries received in a crash a few months ago.

RODNEY MILLEN (1964-1967) did a survey technician course after leaving school and his employment with Williams and Partners included a period in Fiji. He subsequently headed for the United States, where he has been domiciled at Newport Beach for the last 15 or 16 years.

A well-known rally driver, Rod has featured in many stirring races over the years, with some notable successes. A recent one which gave him much personal satisfaction was the Pikes Hill climb in Colorado. Driving a Toyota Celica which he and his boys built, he won this challenging event, a race which begins in the dust and heat of the lower level and finishes in the snow at 14100 ft.

Rod also has a thriving business, a major component of which is building Toyota 4-wheel drive trucks. (Rod has also driven these trucks in races over the past 2 years). It is of interest to note that he has a contract to design and build trucks for the United States Army.

Both Steve and Rod feature in the Wall of Fame at Motorsport of New Zealand in Wellington.

BRUCE NANCEKIVELL (1960-1964), who was a 1st Rugby XV member in his last year, gained a B.E. Degree in Civil Engineering, and an early experience was working on the Poutu Canal at Turangi, part of the tunnel diversion for the hydro-electro scheme in the early 1970's.

There following a 3-year period working for a London engineering firm, and on his return to New Zealand he spent 5 years in Wellington, working for three different firms. One was Fletchers, another the Tze Group. He moved with the Tze Group to Auckland, and after some two years he went into business on his own. He and his partner Peter Williams run the firm of Nancekivell and Williams, Civil and Structural Engineers, Browns Bay.

NOEL NANCEKIVELL (1967-71), Deputy Head Boy in 1971, 1st Rugby XV member in 1970 and 1971 (Captain), and a SeniorRowing Team member, completed a New Zealand Certificate in Engineering (Civil) and worked for five years for the well-known consulting firm Murray North and Partners, mainly on traffic engineering.

At this stage Noel took a break from engineering and for over ten years was engaged in small farming projects in the Helensville and Coromandel areas. Returning to civil engineering he is now employed by the North Shore City Council, where his work is mainly concerned with road engineering.

PETER STANLEY (1977-1978) attended University, initially to study languages. He has completed the Cambridge University Qualification in the Teaching of English as a Second Language, and for a time taught English at a boys school in Mexico.

MICHAEL STANLEY (1971-1975) has always excelled as a sportsman and leader. While at school he captained the 1st Rugby XV in three successive years, 1973/74/75. A top rower, he was in the Senior Rowing Team in 1974 and 1975; in the latter year he was stroke in the eight which was a close runner-up in the Maadi Cup.

Mike, who incidentally, comes from a large family of eight, seven boys and a girl, studied at the University of Auckland, graduating with a B.A. in Geography. Following his teacher training he taught at Long Bay College for some years, and for the last seven years has been Sports Master at Westlake. Rowing has always been a major interest. Mike stroked the World Championship Winning Eights in 1982 and 1983, and he also attended the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics with the New Zealand Eight. He has had long involvement with the North Shore Rowing Club and has been a media commentator at many championships.

Chairman of the Westlake Boys High School Foundation since 1992, he has worked hard in establishing a base for long-term development of this important Trust. A keen angler, he has expert knowledge of the gear, lures and conditions for successful trout fishing, tutoring on this subject.

In November Mike takes up a new position as the first full-time Executive Director of Rowing New Zealand, charged with developing new standards at every level of the sport.

Proud father of two boys and a girl, Mike could well be one of those cheering parents in a few years!

JOHN STANLEY (1975-1979) was an allrounder in his Westlake years. Head Boy in 1979, he was 1st Cricket XI Captain in 1978-79, a secondary school cricket representative, 1st Rugby XV Captain in 1979, and Senior Athletics Captain.

John studied at the University of Auckland, graduated M.A. in Political Studies, and has for the last seven years lived in San Francisco, where he is a teacher at Vaca Peña Junior High School. He is the proud father of four boys, three of whom are triplets!

DAVID STANLEY (1971-1972) came to Westlake from Upper Hutt College, entering Form 6. Vice-captain of the 1st Rugby XV in 1972, he studied for a time at University. However, the business world beckoned, and one of his early ventures was to operate a take-away business in Queen Street, with the unusual name "On the Run". 
